
Grabber Arm

What's in your kit


- Card
- 7 paper fasteners

What you need

- Scissors
- Ruler
- Pencil
- Glue/tape



- Cut the cardboard into seven 2 x 15cm sticks. Cut one stick in half
- Make holes in the sticks as shown.
 Each hole needs to be big enough for the paper fasteners to go in and be able to rotate
- 3. Assemble the grabber arm using the sticks marked 1, 2 and 3 in the picture. Connect sticks by pushing paper fasteners through the paper sticks. Open and push the paper fastener arms down on the other side so that the paper sticks can't come apart



- 4. Finally, glue or tape the two half sticks to the ends of sticks 3 as shown
- 5. Can you make a grabber arm on a larger scale? What materials will you use? Share your creativity with us on Facebook!

Engineer like a Buccaneer

- 3. Plan it Make a list of materials. Draw a diagram with labels
- 4. Create it Follow your plan. Create a model
- 5. Improve it Did it work? Can you make it better? What could be done differently?

What's in your kit

- Pegs
- Wool
- Paper

What you need

- Markers
- Glue
- Other things to decorate your pirate




What to do

- 1. Use the markers to draw on a pirate face and maybe even a peg leg
- 2. Wrap your wool around the peg and in between the legs to make the

pirate clothes and secure the ends with some glue

- To make the pirate hat fold your paper as directed in the picture
- 4. Decorate your pirate hat
- 5. Glue hat to the pirates head
- Sail peg pirates on the ship you made in the 'Engineer like a Buccaneer' challenge

What's in your bag

A blue paper with a leaf on it

What you need

- Scissors
- Markers, pencils, crayons

What to do

- 1. Cut out your leaf
- 2. On the blank side of the blue leaf page trace around your hand and cut it out
- 3. Decorate your leaf and hand however you like, with pictures, paint, writing, stickers, materials from around the house, anything!
- 4. Bring your leaf and hand print to your City of Melville Library and add it to our Blue Tree display

Real Authentic Fake Pirate Treasure Map

What you need

- Paper
- Pens
- Cold tea
- Candle
- Cotton wool
- Piece of ribbon



- 1. Draw a map of the school
- 2. Draw a skull and crossbones in the top right-hand corner of the paper
- 3. Draw a compass in the left-hand corner
- 4. Write 'North' at the top of the map, 'South' at the bottom, 'East' on the right and 'West' on the left
- 5. Mark fake treasure location with an 'X'
- 6. Crumple up the paper. Flatten it back out. Crumple it up again. Flatten it out again. Crumple it up again. Flatten it out again
- 7. Use cotton wool ball to dab cold tea on it. This will give your map an authentically old brown look
- 8. Light the candle and carefully burn the edges of the paper. This will give your map a truly authentic burnt-edge pirate map look. You will need help from an adult because it is very easy to accidently set fire to the map (Just ask Newton)
- 9. Dry fake treasure map with a hair dryer
- 10. Roll it up and tie with a ribbon. This is how pirates always did things because rubber bands weren't invented yet
- 11. Hey, presto you're done! Now you are the proud owner of a real genuine authentic fake pirate treasure map!

Treasure Slime

What you need

- 1 cup PVA glue
- 2 teaspoons Bi-carb Soda
- 1/2 cup water
- 4-6 teaspoon saline solution (must contain Boric Acid)
- Glitter
- Assorted gems and pearl beads
- Pirate gold

What to do

- 1. Mix together the glitter and the glue
- 2. And in Bi-carb soda and mix well
- 3. Stir in the water
- 4. Gradually add in the saline solution until it is as runny or firm as you like it
- 5. Now work in your gems and beads and pirate gold
- 6. Store your treasure slime in an airtight container

Banana DNA Extraction

What you need

- A ripe banana
- A zip lock bag
- Hot water
- Salt
- Washing up liquid
- Rubbing alcohol
- Filter paper or coffee filter
- A tall glass
- Popstick for mixing

- 1. Place rubbing alcohol in the freezer a few minutes before you start
- 2. Add half the banana to the bag, seal, and mash it up into a paste
- 3. Add a teaspoon of salt to 1/2 cup of hot water and add this to the bag
- 4. Close the bag and gently massage it to mix the water into the banana
- 5. Add 1/2 teaspoon of washing up liquid to the bag and gently mix
- 6. Pour contents of the bag through filter paper into the glass. Throw paper away
- 7. Tip the glass to one side and slowly drip the rubbing alcohol down the inside of the glass until it forms a layer on top of the liquid at least 2cm thick
- 8. Wait 10 minutes
- 9. Can you see some cloudy, white stuff moving around inside the alcohol? That's the banana DNA!

Lolly Crystals

What you need

- 3 cups sugar (sucrose)
- 1 cup boiling water
- food colouring (optional)
- flavouring (optional, try cherry, peppermint, or cinnamon)
- clean glass or plastic jar
- wooden skewer or cotton string
- A helpful adult


- Dissolve the sugar in the boiling water. You can heat the sugar solution on the stove or in the microwave if you have trouble getting the sugar to dissolve. Get help from an adult
- 2. Add a few drops of food colouring and flavouring if you want
- 3. Allow the solution to cool a bit before pouring it into your jar. You don't want to get burned!
- 4. Pour the sugar solution into a jar. Place a wooden skewer into the jar or else hang a string into the middle of the jar, tied to a pencil or popstick
- Place the container somewhere it won't be disturbed. Cover the jar with a paper towel or coffee filter to allow evaporation while keeping bug's and dust out
- 6. Wait! It may take a few days to get good crystal growth. If you see crystals forming on the top of the jar, you can remove them and eat them. If you leave them, these crystals will compete with your stick or string for sugar and will reduce the size of your crystals
- 7. Remove the crystals and enjoy them! If you want to store the crystals before eating them, keep them in an airtight container




