

### CSS



The CSS is a highly visible, 24-hour mobile patrol service, acting as extra eyes and ears for the community and police.

### Did you know they?

- Can be contacted 24/7
- Provide high visibility patrols 24/7 to observe, monitor and report suspicious behaviour to police
- Share information and work with police

- Patrol hot spots to deter criminal activity
- Provide holiday watch patrols while you are away
- Detect and report graffiti, vandalism and abandoned vehicles
- Can give information on safety and crime prevention

## **Holiday Watch Patrols**

For security and peace of mind register for a CSS holiday watch patrol at no extra cost. Our CSS Officers will patrol your property regularly during the day and night while you're away.

We will leave you a calling card after the last patrol with a reference number. You can call us and quote this number and we can tell you anything we noted about your property whilst you were away.

CSS Officers also drop off calling cards to properties who haven't registered for a holiday watch patrol. These will contain crime prevention tips to improve the safety and security of your property.

## **Holiday Safety Tips**

- Register for a holiday watch patrol a few days before you leave
- Ensure all doors and windows are locked
  including pet, garage and shed doors
- Let neighbours know you are away – ask them to watch out for your property and collect your mail
- Cancel deliveries such as newspapers
- Consider installing automatic timing devices for lights and radios

## **Party Safety**

### **Party Preparation Checklist:**

- Let police know, register your party at police.wa.gov.au
- Inform the CSS on 1300 653 643
- Don't open invite on social media
- Invite your neighbours or let them know use the City's Friendly Neighbourhoods card at melvillecity.com.au/friendlyneighbourhoods
- Consider your neighbours and the noise from your party. For more information on acceptable noise, visit melvillecity.com.au/noise
- Serve alcohol responsibly
- Make sure you consider security measures

### **Graffiti**

Graffiti vandalism is all forms of graffiti defacing public or private property without the property owner's consent.

The City offers a rapid removal service on both public and private property for graffiti vandalism that is visible to the public. Prompt removal helps defeat vandals as it diminishes their level of recognition.

### What Gets Left is an Invitation for Theft!

Theft from cars may only take a few seconds - a broken window, a quick grab, and the thieves have gone.

Whether it's a mobile phone, bag, or loose coins, thieves will take it, and will damage your car in the process.



### **Car Security Tips:**

- Always lock up
- Close windows and don't leave keys in the ignition, even if you are only going to be a few minutes
- Never leave loose items in view in your careven if they are not valuable to you!
- Pay attention to where you park
- Park off the street and in a well-lit area preferably in a car port or garage
- Secure car keys when at home. Don't leave them where they can be seen

### **Improve Home Security**

Don't make it easy for criminals to get into your home. Deter crime and complete our online checklist.



- 1. Security sensor lights
- 2. Landscaping allows unobstructed views
- 3. Street number clearly visible
- 4. Security Screens
- 5. Alarm
- 6. Trees and shrubs maintained

You can reduce the chance of being burgled by applying Designing Out Crime (DOC) Principles to your property.

Many crimes are preventable.

Follow these tips to deter burglars:

- · Lock doors and windows
- Always make it look like someone is home
- Don't leave valuables in view from windows and doors
- Mark your property marked property is harder to sell and easier to return if found
- Record serial numbers of TV's, mobile phones, tablets etc.

### **Improve Personal Safety**

Take these simple steps to make your life more relaxed when you're out and about.

- Stay alert and be aware of your surroundings
- Walk in well lit, busy areas, confidently and at a steady pace
- Keep clear of walking close to overgrown bushes or trees
- Walk against the flow of traffic to avoid vehicles driving slowly alongside you
- Walk with a friend or group wherever possible
- If you regularly walk by yourself, consider varying your route
- Have someone accompany you to your car
- Plan ahead how are you going to get home?
- Tell your family, friends and colleagues your whereabouts and when you expect to return.
   If you change your plans let them know
- Turn down the volume on your earphones
- Practice what you would do in a real life threatening situation with a friend or consider taking self-defence lessons



### **Online Safety**

The Internet can be a great place and there is a lot you can do to ensure you have safe and positive experiences online.

The Office of the eSafety Commissioner is responsible for promoting online safety for all Australians. The website contains information, resources and support to help protect you and your family online.

### **Emergency Management**

## Where can I access up to date information during an emergency in my local area?

- emergency.wa.gov.au
- Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) public information line 13 33 37 and ABC Radio: 720AM
- Bureau of Meteorology (BoM) recorded information line on 1300 659 213

#### Where do I go if I have to evacuate my house?

Evacuation centres are determined by the Department for Child Protection and Family Support. Once determined you will be informed of the location via ABC 720AM radio.

#### What will happen to my pets?

We have an agreement with other councils and vets for housing pets during emergencies. Call Ranger Services on **0418 943 219** for further information during an emergency.

#### What support can I access during the emergency?

You can access financial support through the Lord Mayors Disaster Relief Fund, the Department for Child Protection and Family Support and the State Natural Disaster Relief Fund if applicable.

### **Road Safety**

As drivers, we are all responsible for safety on our roads.

### **Road Safety Tips:**

- Share the road
- Look out for vulnerable road users
- Put your mobile phone on the back seat when you are driving
- If you are turning, give way to pedestrians
- Slow down if you approach a stationery vehicle with flashing lights. Move over (if possible) and pass at 40 kilometres per hour
- Drive to the road conditions
- Slow down and enjoy the ride
- Buckle up and stay safe
- Don't drink and drive
