6 PUBLIC QUESTION TIME

At 6:33pm, the Presiding Member opened Public Question Time.

6.1 Questions Received with Notice

6.1.1 Dr J Stevens, Bicton

As Dr Stevens was not in attendance, the Presiding Member ruled that the questions and responses would be included in the minutes of the meeting and not read out, in accordance with clause 6.7(7)(d) of the City of Melville Local Government (Meeting Procedures) Local Law 2022.

Question 1:

How many motions and public questions put to the City were rejected prior to the meeting and/or were not heard by electors at the meeting?

Response to Question 1:

One motion and four questions were not accepted prior to the Annual General Meeting of Electors, and one motion was withdrawn at the meeting and not heard by the electors in attendance.

Question 2:

Who can decide to reject any motions and questions?

Response to Question 2:

In accordance with *City of Melville Local Government (Meeting Procedures) Local Law 2022*, the Presiding Member for the meeting may determine that a motion or question shall not be considered. In the case of an electors meeting, the Presiding Member is the Mayor.

Question 3:

Under what specific legal authority can the Mayor or City Officers reject EAGM motions and questions before the meeting?

Response to Question 3:

Section 5.31 of the *Local Government Act 1995* and *Regulation 18 of the Local Government (Administration) 1996* sets out that the person presiding over the electors meeting determines the procedure to follow for the meeting and this extends to the motions and questions that can be accepted and presented to the meeting. In accordance with section 5.30(1) of the *Local Government Act 1995* the Mayor presides over the electors meeting.

Question 4:

Why were any motions and questions rejected?

Response to Question 4:

In accordance with section 21.6 (3) of the Meeting Procedures, motions may be declined where:

- They are objectionable in nature; or

- If carried would breach any written law; or
- If carried would be incapable of being actioned or implemented by the local government.

Questions at an electors meeting are dealt with in accordance with section 6.10 of the Meeting Procedures, and may not be responded to where the question:

- a) Is the same or similar as one asked at a previous meeting, a response provided and the answer has not changed; or
- b) Relates to a matter for which a council or committee meeting will or could be closed to the public; or
- c) Relates to the private activities of any person; or
- d) Relates to a matter currently before a court or the State Administrative Tribunal; or
- e) Is making a statement; or
- f) Would contravene any written law; or
- g) Would divert a substantial and unreasonable portion of the local government's resources away from other functions; or
- h) The Presiding member is of the view that the question has already been answered or the matter adequately dealt with or;
- i) Seeks information which would not be made available if it was sought under the Freedom of Information Act or otherwise is required to be kept confidential.

The City is aware that the motion and questions submitted by you are related to a matter which is currently before the State Administrative Tribunal and is not appropriate to be considered at this time in a public forum.

Question 5:

How many electors attended in person.

Response to Question 5:

There were 30 members of the public in attendance at the Annual General Meeting of Electors, 29 electors and one non-elector.

Question 6:

How many electors attended on-line?

Response to Question 6:

The software used to live stream the meeting does not provide individual attendee details. During the meeting there were 62 live views, with the average length of each view being 28 minutes.

Question 7:

Why couldn't on-line electors vote, as perceived they could from the EAGM adverts and past on-line voting?

Response to Question 7:

Recent reforms to the Local Government Act, effective from 1 January 2025, introduced a legislative requirement for local governments to livestream Council's public meetings. These reforms do not require local governments to provide online public participation. This means there is no obligation to facilitate online public questions, statements, or voting, which were temporary measures introduced during the COVID-19 pandemic to support public safety.

When developing the livestreaming requirements, the Department of Local Government considered whether online participation should also be mandated. However, this was not pursued due to the significant logistical challenges and the substantial administrative burden it would place on local governments.

In addition, recent technology changes at the City mean that the venue used for the Annual General Meeting of Electors is not currently equipped to support online participation in a practical or reliable way. Accordingly, public notices for the AGM have advised that individuals registering for online attendance would have view-only access for the meeting.

6.1.2 Mr R Staszewski, AttadalePreamble to Questions 1 to 2:

I am a resident of Attadale. My questions today are not regarding the technical merits of a specific compliance file or the conduct of any individual officer. Rather, I am seeking clarification on the City's official governance policies regarding Administrative Impartiality and the integrity of the statutory consultation process. These questions go to the heart of public confidence in the City's delegated planning functions.

Question 1:

In instances where a retrospective development application triggers a statutory requirement for neighbour consultation under the R-Codes, does the City have a policy that permits delegated officers to provide an applicant with written assurances of a positive outcome, offer fee waivers, or an expedited processing timeframe, prior to the commencement of that required consultation?

Question 2:

Where a material error has been identified in the City's own building or planning processes, what independent oversight or internal audit mechanisms exist to ensure that the subsequent remedial application is assessed with total impartiality, rather than being determined by the same department responsible for the original error?

Response to Questions 1 and 2:

Thank you for the questions.

In relation to the first question, the City does not have a policy that permits officers to pre-determine the outcome of a development application or to provide assurances of approval prior to the completion of any required statutory processes, including neighbour consultation under the R-Codes.

Where statutory consultation is required, all submissions are considered on their merits before any determination is made. Any administrative actions taken in relation to fees or timeframes are managed in accordance with the City's Fees and Charges and customer service practices and do not influence, predetermine, or replace the statutory assessment of an application.

In relation to the second question, where an error is identified in the City's building or planning processes, the City has established governance measures to ensure continued impartiality and integrity in decision-making. These include internal reviews, senior officer oversight, legal and governance involvement where appropriate, and clear separation between operational assessment and governance assurance functions.

All development applications are assessed against the relevant planning framework and legislation by suitably qualified officers acting under delegated authority and in accordance with the City's Code of Conduct, regardless of any prior administrative issues.

Council is not the decision maker for individual housing developments or compliance matters. Its role is to ensure that appropriate governance frameworks, policies and delegations are in place to support lawful, impartial and transparent administration.

6.1.3 Mr G Wieland, Bicton

As Mr Wieland was not in attendance, the Presiding Member ruled that the questions and responses would be included in the minutes of the meeting and not read out, in accordance with clause 6.7(7)(d) of the City of Melville Local Government (Meeting Procedures) Local Law 2022.

Preamble to Questions 1 to 2:

My question relates to the current City of Melville "Fencing Local Law 2025" (working copy not gazetted) with specific questions relating to what constitutes "a sufficient fence"

This question is also based on phone contact with a CoM planning officer who could not provide guidance regarding this question and told me to receive an answer I was informed that I would need to fill out a "Request for written planning advice" at a cost of \$73, I regard that this is unfair for a very basic dividing fence question and I believe the question to be basic planning knowledge and the requirement for residents to pay \$73 for a simple dividing fence question to be an unfair situation for the CoM ratepayers, thus this question and its outcome hopefully creates a more easily understood "sufficient fence" policy information guide.

Question 1:

The dividing fence act states that local government decides what is a "sufficient fence" (please see attached) with the current City of Melville dividing fence policy stating that a sufficient fence can be constructed of the following materials: timber, colour bond, brick, stone, concrete or a combination of these (please see attached). In relation to the materials that are stated as being a sufficient fence material it was my understanding and the general public's is that in past years in relation to the materials that constitute a sufficient fence a sufficient fence was either timber or colour bond (or many years ago a Hardi fibre fence), but within the current policy if one neighbour wishes to have either brick, stone or concrete would that require the other neighbour must pay for a fence above the basic timber or colour bond even if they do not want this?

Response to Question 1:

The City's Fencing Local Law defines what may be considered a "sufficient fence" for the district. It does not determine how costs are shared between neighbours. The City's definition is consistent with the WALGA Model Local Law and includes a range of acceptable materials such as timber, Colorbond and masonry.

Materials vary significantly in cost, disagreements between neighbours can occur. However, the Fencing Local Law is not intended to regulate cost sharing arrangements. These matters are civil issues between landowners and not determined by the City.

Material costs and installation standards also change over time, which is why the definition of a "sufficient fence" does not attempt to prescribe how costs should be apportioned.

Where neighbours cannot reach agreement, cost sharing disputes are dealt with under the Dividing Fences Act 1961 as a private matter between landowners and may be resolved through the Magistrates Court if necessary.

Question 2:

If this is not the case then should the newly developed fence policy be reviewed to separate both the basic materials for a "sufficient fence" and a separate line item dealing with what materials are acceptable for a fence within the CoM?

Response to Question 2:

The local law itself does not require amendment, however the City could improve clarity for residents by providing a clear information guide.

Such a guide would explain what is meant by a "sufficient fence" and clearly state that disputes about materials and cost are resolved under the Dividing Fences Act via the Magistrates Court, not by the City.

The City will take this feedback on board and develop an information guide.

6.1.4 Mr M FitzGibbon, Melville

As Mr FitzGibbon was not in attendance, the Presiding Member ruled that the questions and responses would be included in the minutes of the meeting and not read out, in accordance with clause 6.7(7)(d) of the City of Melville Local Government (Meeting Procedures) Local Law 2022.

Preamble to Question 1:

Referring to the question by Mr Charlton at the recent AGME regarding the unannounced lapsing of the Road Safety and Travel Smart Working Group.

Question 1:

On what date did the lapse commence, and did the lapse coincide with the withdrawal/reduction of funding of WALGA's Road Wise program by State Government around September 2023?

Response to Question 1:

The last meeting was held on 12 April 2022. The cessation of the meetings was not linked to any changes in funding of the WALGA's Road Wise program. The group was advised that the meetings were placed on hold while the status and framework of the group were reviewed.

6.1.5 Mr D Morley, on behalf of Ms A Douglas, WillageeQuestion 1:

Why did council change the 10 free plant allocation to a lottery? I'm trying to grow a native garden in my front yard and I signed up to the 2025 lottery (last year was the first year council had the plant lottery) the day it opened and I missed out on getting 10 free plants.

Response to Question 1:

As the City has a set budget for our free native plant give away, the lottery system was introduced in an effort to make it more equitable. Previous methods allowed those individuals who were first at the pick-up point to obtain a high percentage of the available stock. This limited accessibility to the broader community. The lottery system gives everyone interested in our free native plant give away equal opportunity to partake.

6.1.6 Mr D Morley, WillageeQuestion 1:

With the WA Government rolling out its Urban Greening Strategy and the 'Let's Grow' Action Plan, it'd be great to hear how Melville plans to fit into that picture. Specifically, which bits of 'Let's Grow' might we rally behind here in Melville? And on a practical note, I'd love to understand what kind of support, financial or otherwise, the City can offer local community groups to boost that urban canopy.

Response to Question 1:

The City supports the objectives of the WA Government Urban Greening Strategy and Lets Grow Action Plan. We will continue to be members of the WALGA Urban Forest Working Group, collect tree data and work with researchers as outlined in the Action Plan. We will be looking into the State Governments Lets Grow grants program to assess the opportunities it provides local community groups to increase our Urban Forest.

6.2 Questions Received at the Meeting**6.2.1 Mr R Staszewski, Attadale**Question 1:

Just for clarity, so if a team makes a material error on an application, that same team could subsequently approve an application without any independent oversight or input?

Response to Question 1:

There are multiple officers at the City with delegation to determine applications. Where errors have been identified, appropriate measures are put in place to ensure there are checks and balances on any retrospective approvals that are put forward.

6.2.2 Mr D Morley, WillageeQuestion 1:

The situation that exists at the moment, the lottery system is still in place? Is that the status quo?

Response to Question 1:

Yes, the lottery system is still in place.

Question 2:

Is there any intention of changing that policy in the near future back to the original that it used to be?

Question 3:

Is there an intention from the City to appoint a liaison officer as detailed in the Urban Greening Strategy and Let's Grow Action Plan?

Response to Question 2 & 3:

This question was taken on notice in accordance with section 6.8(1)(b) and 6.9(c) of the *City of Melville Local Government (Meeting Procedures) Local Law 2022*. The question and response will be provided in the Agenda for the March 2026 Ordinary Meeting of Council to be distributed on Friday, 27 February 2026.

6.2.3 Mr G Waugh, Bull CreekPreamble to Question 1:

Here is a [ten year old picture](#) of the Mayor presenting to an international dignitary in the memorial garden not mentioned in E26/87. This single example alone shows the inadequacy of the City's records and capability shortcomings in providing advice to Council.

Question 1:

What is influencing Councillors and Council's practice to determine against its community by functionally, excluding community from advisory and deliberation processes to persistently rubber stamp employment sustaining policy in visual obstruction to facilitating informed community merit-based decision making?

Response to Question 1:

This question was taken on notice in accordance with section 6.8(1)(b) and 6.9(c) of the *City of Melville Local Government (Meeting Procedures) Local Law 2022*. The question and response will be provided in the Agenda for the March 2026 Ordinary Meeting of Council to be distributed on Friday, 27 February 2026.

Preamble to Question 2:

ABF response to E26/87 quoted "The City is currently developing a comprehensive policy framework etc."

Question 2:

Why was this major ratepayer funded initiative or its cost / risk / benefit analysis not published in the Annual Report as is required by legislation? particularly as it was a reinvention of the wheel both in replication of the City's recent Governance Framework and in recreating a Policy Framework that Council has possessed since 2021?

Response to Question 2:

The policy framework is not a requirement under the legislation, but it is a good governance practice to guide Council's decision making and the process around approval of policy. Certain policies do require advertising, and part of the Councillors' role is that if the community has a particular view, it's quite clear in section 2 of the policy that Councillors' do articulate that view as part of the decision making process, and we welcome that as to determine the best policies for the district.

In relation to your questions about non-compliance, whilst that is your opinion we have no evidence of non-compliance. The Act is very specific in its wording, and where the Act is not specific or does not provide a clear requirement, it does leave it open for the best judgement practices and good governance judgement to determine what is most appropriate for the City of Melville to determine their practices. If you are able to point out particular sections where the City is non-compliant, I am more than happy to have a discussion with you in relation to that.

At 6:48pm, the Presiding Member, in accordance with the *City of Melville (Meeting Procedures) Local Law 2022*, declared that question 3 would not be accepted.

6.3 Questions Taken on Notice at Previous Meeting

6.3.1 Mr D Morley, Willagee

As these questions were received without notice at the December 2025 Ordinary Meeting of Council, in accordance with the *City of Melville Local Government (Meeting Procedures) Local Law 2022* sections 6.8(1)(b) & 6.9 (c), they were taken on notice and a response is now provided below.

Preamble to Questions 1 to 3:

These questions are a response to the Melville City Council's Officer Advice provided tonight to councillors by the Director of Planning. The questions relate to the alternate motion to item UP25/93 (Trees on Private Land) to be moved tonight in support of the adoption of the WALGA tree-policy model by Melville City Council in tonight's council meeting when considering approving drafting of a LPP for Trees on Private Land.

Question 1:

Given Melville's 2021 climate emergency declaration, why is officer advice prioritising engagement, financial, and legislative concerns over resident health especially when canopy loss contributes to heat stress and respiratory illness— and how will Council avoid repeating the City of Kalamunda's situation where a watered-down WALGA Local Planning Policy model harmed community trust and led to petitions for stronger protections?

Question 2:

How do engagement risks like reduced workshop flexibility outweigh the public health risks of delaying a retention-first policy, especially when Kalamunda's weaker approach eroded trust and triggered backlash?

Question 3:

What cost-benefit analysis compares the upfront costs of arborist assessments with long-term health and climate benefits, given Kalamunda's underinvestment has already led to community frustration and calls for reversal?

Response to Questions 1 & 3:

The City recognises the importance of tree canopy for community wellbeing, urban cooling and environmental outcomes.

Officer advice seeks to balance these objectives with legislative authority, financial impacts and the City's ability to implement and enforce any policy effectively and fairly. These considerations are intended to ensure that any tree protection policy adopted by Council is lawful, practical and sustainable.

The WALGA model provides a framework and does not prevent Council from considering a wide range of protections. Changes affecting private land require appropriate consultation and assessment to avoid unintended consequences and ensure community confidence.

Planning assessments and additional controls have cost and administrative impacts for residents, which must be weighed alongside long term environmental and health benefits. A staged and evidence based approach is recommended.

6.3.2 Mr L Cesconetto, Bicton

As these questions were received without notice at the December 2025 Ordinary Meeting of Council, in accordance with the *City of Melville Local Government (Meeting Procedures) Local Law 2022* sections 6.8(1)(b) & 6.9 (c), they were taken on notice and a response is now provided below.

Preamble to Question 1:

Bassendean, Cambridge, Fremantle, Nedlands, Sth Perth, Vic Park, Peppermint Grove, Bayswater, Cockburn, Claremont, Mosman Park and Northam have adopted or are progressing to adopt the WALGA Model Tree Retention Policy.

Question 1:

The City's Urban Forest Strategy (2024) makes it clear that growing or even simply preserving the City's Tree Canopy cannot be achieved on public land alone. The 2025 decision of SAT supports this critical policy imperative. Therefore, what are the specific issues/obstacles that is preventing Melville City Council in adopting this same commitment to boost tree canopy and manage urban green spaces in Melville?

Response to Question 1:

The City acknowledges the importance of private land in achieving canopy outcomes. Controls on private land involve planning legislation, resourcing, implementation and equity considerations. Council has resolved to progress a Local Planning Policy, informed by professional advice and community engagement, to ensure any approach is considered, proportionate and deliverable.

PURPOSE

The City’s Annual General Meeting of Electors (AGME) was held on Monday, 2 February 2026, at which, seven motions were submitted for consideration. One motion was withdrawn at the meeting and six motions were presented by the community for consideration, and carried at the meeting.

This report presents the motions carried to the Council, along with officer comments and recommendations, for consideration and acceptance.

BACKGROUND

The 2024-2025 Annual Report was accepted by the Council at the Special Meeting of Council held on Tuesday, 16 December 2025.

Following this, the AGME was held on 2 February 2026 in accordance with section 5.27 of the *Local Government Act 1995*, which requires one to be held each financial year not more than 56 days after the local government accepts the annual report.

Additionally, the meeting was held in accordance with the *Local Government (Administration) Regulations 1996* Regulation 15, which prescribes that the matters to be discussed at a general electors meeting are firstly the contents of the annual report and then any other general business.

The minutes of the Annual General Meeting of Electors are available on the City of Melville [Agenda and Minutes](#) website page.

CONSIDERATION

The motions carried at the AGME meeting are presented below with officer comments for the consideration of the Council:

AGME Motion 1

At the AGME, the meeting resolved:

“That the Council:

- 1. Recognises that the National Climate Risk Assessment and National Adaptation Plan identify extreme heat, heat-island effects, and infrastructure vulnerability as foreseeable risks requiring local government action.***

2. **Acknowledges relevant Australian legal precedents — including *Bushfire Survivors v NSW EPA (2021)*, *Sharma v Minister for the Environment (2021)*, and *WHS heat-exposure cases* — which show governments may be liable when foreseeable climate risks are not addressed.**
3. **Accepts that urban tree canopy is a low-cost, high-impact adaptation measure that reduces heat, protects public health, and strengthens the City's legal defensibility.**
4. **Commits to aligning City planning, asset management, and risk management with the National Climate Risk Assessment and National Adaptation Plan by:**
 - a. **adopting stronger, measurable canopy-growth targets (currently 15% by 2036);**
 - b. **implementing proactive canopy-protection measures on public and private land (including reconsidering recent Melville City Council decisions not to amend policy - and to draft Local Planning Policy in 2026 that prioritises the retention of mature trees on private land over clearing land for development;**
 - c. **embedding canopy and heat-mitigation into all planning, development, and asset-management frameworks;**
 - d. **reporting annually on canopy protection and expansion.**
5. **Resolves to treat tree-canopy expansion and protection as a core governance and risk-mitigation responsibility to safeguard the City, its workforce, its residents, and its long-term financial position."**

Officer Comments

The resource implications for increasing the City's tree planting in terms of human resources, quality stock availability, water availability and cost, and long-term management of existing and newly planted trees are considerable. A long term sustainable urban forest is developed over years, to ensure adaptability in response to tree trials, climate resilient species and to provide age diversity.

Given the City's existing commitments in relation to climate change including, declared climate emergency, current investment in climate-related infrastructure and workforce capability, and the ongoing implementation of Council-endorsed plans, it is considered that the AEM motion does not necessitate immediate additional Council action. Any broader review of national frameworks and potential policy or governance changes would need to be scoped and prioritised through the City's future budget and planning processes.

Reasons for Officer Recommendation

Trees are one of the best ways to reduce the impacts of climate change within an urban environment. The City has progressively increased, monitored and managed the urban forest canopy. Actions include current progress on preparation for a policy to manage trees on private land. Results are seen in the medium to long term not immediately. The City's *Urban Forest Strategy Review – 2024* documents a planned and achievable approach regarding increasing urban canopy.

The matters raised in the AGME motion relate to climate risk, resilience, and adaptation — areas that the City has already been actively addressing through established, Council-endorsed strategies and governance frameworks.

The City has declared a climate emergency and is investing in infrastructure, systems, and staff capability to address sustainability and climate-related risks and opportunities in a structured, evidence-based manner.

The City has developed and adopted both Corporate and Community Climate Action Plans, informed by a comprehensive vulnerability, risk, and opportunities assessment, public and professional engagement, and consideration of relevant local, national, and international scientific data. These plans have been endorsed by Council and are being progressively implemented.

As a result of this work, climate mitigation and resilience considerations are already included within the City's:

- strategic and corporate planning process
- procurement practices
- asset management planning
- risk-management frameworks
- annual business-planning and budget processes
- direct emission carbon accounting

This integrated approach ensures that climate-related risks are considered in a balanced, proportionate, and financially responsible manner, alongside other organisational priorities and statutory obligations.

The national assessments, adaptation frameworks, and legal precedents referenced in the AGME motion relate to complex and evolving scientific, legal, and policy domains. The City continues to monitor emerging guidance and research and is actively working to understand the implications of this material for local government. Where appropriate, and where organisational capability, resourcing, and statutory authority allow, relevant learnings and identified risks will be incorporated into broader decision-making processes.

Climate risk — including matters such as heat impacts and infrastructure vulnerability — is not considered in isolation, but through the City's established governance systems, ensuring responses are defensible, evidence-based, and sustainable over the long term.

AGME Motion 2

At the AGME, the meeting resolved:

“That the Council due to proven capacity issues with Canning Highway, and before the draft LPS6 is presented to Council:

- 1. Replaces Canning Highway as the Primary transport corridor with Leach Highway,***
- 2. Increases residential density along Leach Highway and between Leach Highway and South Street to provide urgent, equitable, reasonable, sustainable and affordable housing opportunities.***
- 3. Postpones density increases along Canning Highway and in feeder suburbs between Stock Road and Reynolds Road and reconsiders when appropriate infrastructure capacity is available.”***

Officer Comments

The City has commenced a review of Local Planning Scheme 6 (LPS6). To date this process has included the preparation of proposed changes to the Scheme together with preliminary engagement on the draft concepts for density. These preliminary concepts include proposals in the vicinity of Canning Highway.

The current and next stages of the review of LPS6 are outlined in the adopted Project Staging and Implementation Plan which was considered by Council at the December 2025 Ordinary Meeting of Council. Current actions involve a review of initial stakeholder engagement, additional technical investigations and refinements to the early concepts for density. This work includes particular focus on the capacity of Canning Highway, impact of proposed changes on transport infrastructure and exploration of other areas for possible density increases, including Leach Highway and South Street. Results of these current investigations will be presented to Elected Members through a series of workshops commencing in February 2026. Findings will also be shared through a further round of preliminary engagement scheduled for mid-2026.

Accordingly, the LPS6 review program will include a specific response and assessment of each of the items raised in the Motion.

Reasons for Officer Recommendation

The LPS6 review program provides a comprehensive framework to investigate and respond to each of the items raised in the Motion. Concerns relating to capacity of regional roads and consideration of areas for additional residential density as alternatives to Canning Highway are central to the review program. Noting of the Motion and recognition that the matters will be addressed through the LPS6 Review are recommended.

AGME Motion 3

At the AGME, the meeting resolved:

“That the Council:

- 1. RECOGNISE ongoing, capacity issues at Applecross Senior High School (SHS), to which currently proposed Local Planning Scheme 6 density increases will add significant additional pressure. In particular:***
 - A. Recognise that Applecross SHS enrolments have grown significantly year on year with the school now operating well beyond its built capacity of 1,563 students (i.e. more than 25% with 1,962 student enrolments by Semester 2, last year; a 14% increase over the past 5 years and over 400 students since 2018).***
 - B. Recognise that the Applecross SHS site is now severely constrained - now reliant on 24 temporary transportable classrooms to try to alleviate overcrowding, but has now exhausted remaining space - no more is available.***
 - C. Recognise that Applecross SHS student enrolments have consistently been underestimated by the Department of Education (DoE).***
 - D. Recognise that although the DoE is progressing a major upgrade plan for built capacity of 2500 students in the medium term, the current trend of rising enrolments (an average increase of 61 enrolments per year) will consume all of this extra capacity within 10 years.***
 - E. Recognise that Applecross SHS also faces additional demand from developments either already zoned, approved or underway in its intake area, such as at Canning Bridge and R100 high density zoning, along Almondbury Road - including the recent DAP-2024-13 (for 57 apartments) which was rejected by the City but then overruled and approved by the Department of Planning at 7 storeys (instead of the precinct 4 storey limit).***
 - F. Recognise that due to such ongoing pressures, there is little to no capacity currently or in planned future Applecross SHS upgrades to accommodate proposed LPS6 density increases; 51% of which are, at this time, within the Applecross SHS intake area.***

- 2. RECONSIDER proposed LPS6 density increases with the Applecross SHS catchment including:**
- A. Conduct robust and detailed assessment of future ASHS capacity to support any proposed LPS6 density increases.**
 - B. Provide a detailed report on such assessment supported by credible, robust and reliable lines of evidence. This shall include:**
 - i. A cautious review of predictions concerning student numbers and any other advice provided by the DoE. This shall include specific assessment of uncertainty concerning any predictions and any other advice provided by the DoE.**
 - ii. For any LPS6 density increases which are proposed within the Applecross SHS intake area, provide credible, robust and reliable evidence which demonstrates beyond reasonable**
 - iii. doubt that Applecross SHS will have capacity to accommodate them.**
 - iv. Recommend removal of proposed density increases for which future Applecross SHS capacity cannot be demonstrated beyond reasonable doubt.**
 - C. Provide this detailed report to elected members and to the community for review, resolution of questions/concerns and where required, revision prior to Council endorsement.**
- 3. Revise LPS6 proposed density changes so that any proposed density increases within the ASHS intake area are matched to Applecross SHS capacity which has been demonstrated beyond reasonable doubt to actually exist.”**

Officer Comments

The City has commenced a review of Local Planning Scheme 6 (LPS6). To date this process has included the preparation of proposed changes to the Scheme together with preliminary engagement on the draft concepts for density.

The current and next stages of the review of LPS6 are outlined in the adopted Project Staging and Implementation Plan endorsed by Council at the December 2025 Ordinary Meeting of Council. Current actions involve review of initial stakeholder engagement, additional technical investigations and refinements to the early proposals. Technical studies are including examination of the capacity of infrastructure and the impact of proposed changes on this infrastructure. Work to date has explored capacity of schools throughout the City including dialogue with Department of Education planners and demographers. Further investigations of the Applecross Senior High school capacity will occur in response to Motion 3.

Results of these current investigations will be presented to Elected Members through a series of workshops commencing in February 2026. Findings will also be shared through a further round of preliminary engagement scheduled for mid-2026.

The LPS6 review program includes specific response to the impact of proposed changes on infrastructure, including schools. The extent of proposed changes in the catchment of Applecross Senior High School is noted, and the impact on the capacity of that school is forming part of the LPS6 Review.

Reasons for Officer Recommendation

The LPS6 review program provides a comprehensive framework to investigate and respond to the matters raised in the Motion. Concerns relating to capacity of Applecross Senior High School are

receiving specific attention in the review program. Noting of the Motion and recognition that the matters will be addressed through the LPS6 review are recommended.

AGME Motion 4

At the AGME, the meeting resolved:

“That the Council use the WALGA Tree Retention Policy as the minimum standard of tree retention policy on private land, to create its own tree policy.”

Officer Comments

At the Ordinary Meeting of Council held on Tuesday, 9 December 2025, the Council resolved as follows:

“That the Council:

- 1. Notes the community feedback indicating strong interest in improved management of tree loss on private land; and***
- 2. Requests the CEO prepare a draft Local Planning Policy relating to trees on private land, with an overarching objective of encouraging the retention of mature trees, while allowing reasonable development to proceed, and ensuring any necessary removal is appropriately managed to support long term urban tree canopy growth; and***
- 3. Requests that the content of the draft Local Planning Policy be workshopped with Elected Members, prior to being presented to Council for consent to advertise.”***

Work has commenced on the preparation of the draft Local Planning Policy (LPP) with respect to the management of trees on private property. An Elected Member workshop to consider content for a draft LPP is scheduled for early 2026, with a draft policy expected to be presented to Council by mid-2026 for the purposes of public advertising. The WALGA policy template and guidelines relating to tree retention will inform the Council’s consideration of content for the draft LPP.

It is recommended that the Motion 4 direction, to use the WALGA policy content as the minimum standard in the City’s draft policy, be noted as part of Council’s consideration and assessment of policy options.

Reasons for Officer Recommendation

The Council has resolved to prepare a LPP relating to the management of trees on private land. The process to prepare a policy has commenced. The policy preparation process provides a suitable framework to note and consider the content of Motion 4.

AGME Motion 5

At the AGME, the meeting resolved:

“That the Council:

- 1. Increase its target canopy to 30% by 2040, in alignment with the Western Australian government’s urban greening strategy; and***
- 2. Engage a suitably qualified specialist organization, such as arbor carbon, to investigate and advise on practical mechanisms, programs and policy options the city can implement to achieve this revised canopy target.”***

Officer Comments

As part of the Urban Forest Strategy review, the City undertook an analysis of potential locations to expand the Urban Forest on public land and impact of development on potential canopy cover. This provided an achievable canopy cover target. An increase in the target canopy cover would require increased financial, water and resource investment.

Reasons for Officer Recommendation

The resource implications for increasing planting in terms of staff resources, quality stock availability, water availability, cost, and long-term management of existing and newly planted trees are considerable. The City's *Urban Forest Strategy Review – 2024* was undertaken by Arbor Carbon and the review stated, *"This analysis indicates that a 30% target is unrealistic and unachievable for the City of Melville"*.

AGME Motion 6

At the AGME, the meeting resolved:

"That the Council amend the verge treatment policy to remove artificial turf from the list of approved or permissible hard surface treatments, in recognition of its negative impacts on urban heat, stormwater infiltration, biodiversity and long-term environmental sustainability."

Officer Comments

In addition to the City's Verge Treatment Policy, the use of artificial turf is also approved in the City's Activities in Thoroughfares, Public Places and Trading Local Law. The current *Local Law* reads:

***"2.9 (3) A permissible verge treatment is –
(a) the planting and maintenance of a lawn or synthetic turf"***

Should the Council choose to modify the Verge Treatment Policy, then it would also be necessary to revise the Local Law. It is noted that the Thoroughfares, Public Places and Trading Local Law is scheduled for review in 2026.

Reasons for Officer Recommendation

The City's Verge Treatment policy is due for review in 2026, allowing Council to consider the advantages and disadvantages of artificial turf, to inform the Council's direction moving forward.

ENGAGEMENT

In accordance with the *Local Government Act 1995*, the date, time, location, and purpose of the Annual General Meeting of Electors was advertised:

- On the City of Melville website page [Local and Statewide Public Notice](#) and website banner (from Wednesday, 14 January to Monday, 2 February); and
- On public notice boards at the City of Melville Civic Centre, and City of Melville libraries and LeisureFit centres (from Wednesday, 14 January to Monday, 2 February); and
- Via the Melville Matters eNews (Wednesday, 14 January 2026); and
- Via the City's social media platforms; and
- Via the Herald (Saturday, 17 January 2026).

The advertisement and holding of the AGME provided electors of the City an opportunity to participate in discussions, question time and voting on the motions. In preparing the responses to each motion, engagement has occurred internally with City officers.

SUSTAINABILITY IMPLICATIONS

There are no sustainability implications presented as part of this report.

Response to Question 2:

You'll see there are six officer recommendations, each recommendation relates to one of the motions that was proposed, and there are a variety of actions within those recommendations.

Question 3:

There were some queries about how the people that were online weren't able to vote. Is it expected that there will be some sort of facility to enable that for next year's Annual General Meeting of Electors?

Response to Question 3:

Yes, we are going through a process of looking to upgrade the AV equipment in the Conference Room. BACKGROUND

The National General Assembly (NGA) provides an opportunity for local governments across the nation to unite, build relationships with the Australian Government and influence the national policy agenda through the submission of motions for debate at this national convention.

The theme for this year's NGA is "Stronger Together. Resilient. Productive. United." This theme encourages the submission of motions that encourages debate on how Councils and local governments across Australia can become more resilient, contribute to the nation's productivity agenda and present a united voice to the federal government on key issues in the national sphere.

CONSIDERATION

Two motions have been received for consideration by the Council for submission to the 2026 Australian Local Government Association National General Assembly. These motions are attached and outlined below:

NGA Motion 1

Full Support for Food Organics / Garden Organic Systems

Category Environment

Motion

This National General Assembly calls on the Australian Government to provide \$200M support for Local Government and the Resource Recovery Industry to implement new, and improve existing, FOGO systems including by investing in infrastructure, market development and community education and behaviour change.

National Objective

The National Waste Policy Action Plan (2024) includes targets of 80% average resource recovery rate from all waste streams and halving the amount of organic waste to landfill by 2030. For Local Governments, where it is feasible, one of the key approaches is implementing a Food Organic Garden Organic (FOGO) system. However, Local Governments ability to implement FOGO is undermined by contamination, limited processing infrastructure and market acceptance. Consistent support is needed from the Australian Government to address these issues.

Officer Comment

Officers support the intent of the proposed motion advocating for the establishment of a dedicated National Organics Recovery Program, and note that:

1. The City was an early adopter of Food Organics and Garden Organics (FOGO) and has made significant capital and operational investments to support implementation, including infrastructure, service changes, and ongoing community education.
2. FOGO has delivered demonstrable benefits, including reduced organic waste to landfill, reduced reliance on landfill disposal, and a contribution to city-wide emissions reduction through the avoidance of methane generation from landfilled organic material. This delivers against the Carbon Neutral Target in the City's Corporate Climate Action Plan and the Net Zero target in the City's Community Climate Action Plan.

3. The ongoing effectiveness and sustainability of FOGO systems are constrained by factors largely beyond Local Government control, including contamination risks, limited processing capacity, emerging contaminant concerns (such as PFAS), inconsistent quality standards, and uncertainty in end-markets for processed organics.
4. While State Government funding has supported aspects of FOGO implementation and infrastructure development, Local Governments continue to carry the majority of financial, operational, and reputational risk associated with ongoing service delivery.
5. A sustained Australian Government-led program would protect existing Local Government investment, improve product confidence through nationally consistent standards, support processing and market development, and materially assist in achieving the National Waste Policy Action Plan (2024) targets and the objectives of the Western Australian Waste Strategy 2030.

NGA Motion 2

Motion Subject: Local Government as a Key Partner in Biosecurity

Category – Environment

Motion

This National General Assembly calls on the Australian Government to:

- Reform the National Environmental Biosecurity Response Agreement, and associated arrangements, to include Local Government as key partners
- Fund the long-term management and containment of the Polyphagous shot-hole borer (PSHB) to protect urban canopy and biodiversity across Australia.

National Objective

Local Governments are on the front line of biosecurity. However, are not included in the national response structure or funding arrangements. This weakens any response effort, as decisions about feasibility and funding for eradication of new biosecurity threats (e.g. Polyphagous shot-hole borer) are made with very limited engagement with Local Government. Eradication of PSHB has failed and now long-term containment and effective management is the only option. If PSHB spreads outside the current Quarantine Area (QA) the potential impact on urban canopy and biodiversity across Australia will be considerable.

Officer Comment

In relation to becoming a partner in the National Environmental Biosecurity Response Agreement, the funding and resourcing obligations of becoming a partner in this Agreement are unknown and Local Governments may be obligated to provide resourcing if entering the Agreement.

Federal funding of the long-term management and containment of the PSHB would be a significant benefit for local governments. The removal of tree canopy caused by the polyphagous shot-hole borer (PSHB) impacts the local government environment. PSHB infestation has already led to the removal of trees in the Perth metropolitan region, coinciding with canopy decline across parks and streetscapes.

Tree canopy plays a critical role in moderating urban heat, improving air quality, supporting biodiversity, and enhancing community wellbeing. As these trees are lost, local areas may experience increased urban heat island effects, reduced shade, poorer air quality, and diminished green space, all factors known to negatively influence public health by exacerbating heat stress, respiratory conditions, and mental health impacts.

The canopy loss documented across Perth for the reasons highlighted above coupled with the losses due to PSHB, will likely drive declines in public health resilience unless rapid restoration and long-term management strategies are implemented.

Criteria for submitting motions

To be eligible for inclusion in the NGA Business Papers, and debate it on the floor of the NGA, the following criteria must be met:

- Motion has not been debated at an NGA in the preceding two years.
- Motion is relevant to the work of local government across the nation, not focused on a specific location or region, unless the project has national implications.
- Alignment of motion with the policy objectives of your state and territory local government association.
- Propose a clear action and outcome on a single issue, calling on the Australian Government to take action.
- Motion does not seek to advantage one or a few councils at the expense of others.
- Avoid being prescriptive in directing how the matter should be pursued

Motions endorsed by a Council are to be submitted by the deadline of 27 February 2026.

Resolutions of the NGA will be referred to the relevant federal Minister as an outcome of the NGA.

ENGAGEMENT

There is no specific community engagement associated with this report, however the motions proposed for submission to the NGA are in alignment with the outcome areas of the City of Melville Council Plan.

SUSTAINABILITY IMPLICATIONS

There are no direct sustainability implications associated with this report.

LEGISLATIVE AND POLICY ALIGNMENT

There are no specific legislative or policy matters associated with this report.

This review has identified several areas that require amendments to the 2025-2026 Annual Budget which need Council approval by Absolute Majority Decision for adoption.

The City has also identified the need to make additions to the 2025-2026 Fees and Charges Schedule, in relation to recreation services fees and charges, which require Council approval by Absolute Majority Decision for adoption.

BACKGROUND

The City of Melville reviews its actual versus budget position on an ongoing basis and a budget variation listing is submitted to Council in the monthly Statements of Financial Activity Report.

The Financial Management Regulations (33A) requires local governments to undertake a review of their 2025-2026 annual budget no earlier than 31 December 2025 and no later than 28 February 2026. The review must be submitted to the Council on or before 31 March 2026 and subsequently submitted to the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries within 14 days of the Council meeting. The City of Melville has undertaken the budget review within this period based on the financial year to date revenue and expenditure position as at 31 December 2025 and as a result, has identified budgets that require amendments.

The City has also identified the need to make amendments to the 2025-2026 Fees and Charges Schedule in relation to replacement of key/access cards and off season training in the Recreation Services area.

CONSIDERATION

2025-2026 Mid-Year Budget Review

A review of budgets has been undertaken by budget responsible officers and then reviewed by Financial Services and the management and executive leadership teams.

As presented, the amended financial position for the City as at 31 December 2025 will have no impact to the closing position. This is the net result of both positive and negative variances across both operating and capital budgets and funds to be set aside and funds to be used from specific purpose reserve accounts.

The following table is a summary of the 2025-2026 Mid-Year Review results, with positive variances shown as \$xxx and negative variances shown as (\$xxx) i.e. in red parentheses:

Key findings are shown below, and amendments are shown in line with the adopted budget format in Attachment Mid Year Review Summary Amendments.

Whilst the reporting levels adopted by the Council when adopting the 2025-2026 Budget, at its Ordinary Meeting of Council held on 17 June 2025, were 10% or \$100,000 (whichever is greater), some commentary has been provided on variances less than these amounts where considered necessary to gain a full understanding of the amended net position resulting from the Mid-Year Budget Review.

Key material findings in the Operating Budget:

General Rates - \$350,000 Positive Variance

Increase of \$350,000 to commercial interim rates income budget due to additional interim rates earned from commercial developments particularly at the Hospital Building at 5 Bedbrook Row, Murdoch.

90% of the above increase has been set aside into the Community Facilities Reserve and New/Upgrade Works Reserve.

Grants, Subsidies and Contributions \$174,368 Positive Variance

- Increase of \$39,000 to tied grant income budgets includes additional income from Lotterywest for Melville Storylines, Melville Summer Music series, Melville Mid Winter series and the 'For the Best' community based story gathering project to be run at the Main Hall.
- Increase of \$21,602 to contributions income includes additional contribution from the Perth Festival towards the Point Walter Concert scheduled for March 2026.
- Increase of \$113,766 to Federal Assistance Grant income budgets in line with the finalised Federal Assistance Grant allocations for 2025-2026.

Fees and Charges \$960,995 Positive Variance

- Increase of \$440,831 to income from the Community Safety service area with an increase of \$750,000 from Parking Fines due to the introduction of number plate recognition technologies, which has resulted in a much higher capture of offending vehicles than previous monitoring methods. Offset with a reduction of \$284,469 to Parking Fee income particularly at Canning Bridge Precinct On Street parking, Raffles Underground car park, Mount Pleasant On Street parking and Parking Station 13 car park. The availability of parking in the Canning Bridge precinct has been restricted due to development works in the area, resulting in a loss of parking income during this time.
- Increase of \$137,159 to income the financial services service area relates mainly to the credit card surcharge fee income.

- Increase of \$255,135 in the Healthy Melville service area mainly a net increase of \$272,850 to membership fee income budgets for Leisurefit Booragoon to align with actual trend and the impact of the delay in opening the Health Lounge.
- Increase of \$224,172 to budgeted income from refuse and recycling collection relates mainly due to more residents opting to upgrade their 140L general waste bin to a 240L general waste bin.

Service Charges (\$402,934) Negative Variance

- Reduction of \$421,350 to service charges income budgets due to a rectification to the original service charge estimates for the Willagee/Myaree/Melville underground power project. This reduction is offset by a corresponding reduction in other expenditure, related to the resulting decrease in cash calls required to be made to Western Power.

Interest Revenue \$302,000 Positive Variance

- Increase of \$45,000 to budgeted interest income from investment of municipal funds due to lower municipal funds balances being available for investment and variations in the market interest rates.
- Increase of \$255,000 to budgeted interest income from investment of reserves funds due to higher reserves funds balances being available for investment. This increase has not been set aside to reserves.

In order to balance the closing position for the mid year budget review, an amendment is required to be made to the amount of interest set aside for reserves. The amount of interest set aside to reserves is reduced from 100% to 89% as part of the mid year budget review. This is a deviation from the City's Accounting Policy CP-025 to which the 2025-2026 adopted budget was aligned.

Other Revenue - \$253,783 Positive Variance

- Increase of \$191,534 relates to unplanned income from the Resource Recovery Group for the transfer and processing of records, data management and storage, compliance and governance.

Employee Costs – (\$487,098) Negative Variance

- Overall employment costs have increased by 0.7% for the financial year compared to the adopted budget.
- The vacancy factor as part of the adopted budget has been reviewed and adjusted accordingly, resulting in an \$395K reduction in the budgeted for savings from vacant positions.
- Several business units currently have unfilled vacant positions. In some cases, these vacancies have required an increased reliance on casual labour to maintain service delivery. This can result in higher employment costs compared with filling the roles with permanent staff. Other business units required an increase in casual labour due to increase in memberships, such as Healthy Melville. The Healthy Melville additional increase in employment costs is offset with increase in revenue due to increased memberships.
- Reduction of \$150,000 to labour hire cost budgets across all waste programs in the Resource Recovery and Fleet service area to align with actual trend.

Materials and Contracts (\$2,366,612) Negative Variance

- Overall materials and contracts have increased by 5.1% for the financial year compared to the adopted budget.
- Contractor costs have increased across several maintenance areas, particularly within Natural Areas and Parks. Based on year-to-date expenditure, an uplift in budget is required to ensure that current service levels can be maintained. Recent procurement processes have highlighted that some contractor price escalations exceed standard inflationary movements. While the City continues to pursue best value-for-money outcomes through competitive procurement, opportunities are limited in certain specialised industries where there are few qualified contractors able to respond to tenders.
- Increase of \$668,260 in the Information Technology service area. This is predominately due to increase in software licensing which in some cases increase by up to 39%. This substantiates the need for a Digital Strategy and consolidation of software systems used into the future.
- Increase of \$241,125 in the Strategic Urban Planning service area mainly relate to professional consulting costs for the CPS5/LPS6 Review and the Riseley Activity Centre Plan Review. This increase is offset by an increase to the funds used from the Special Projects reserve.
- Increase of \$80,000 in Legal, Governance and Risk is mainly due to the additional cost to be incurred for the Extra Ordinary election to be held in March 2026 to fill the vacancy in the Palmyra-Melville-Willagee ward. The increase for the additional election costs is offset by an increase to the funds used from the Special Projects reserve.
- Reduction of \$933,440 in the Resource Recovery and Fleet service area is mainly due to the reductions in the overhead cost component of the gate fees applicable for the disposal of domestic waste and FOGO collection resulting from the finalisation of the waste disposal arrangement with the Resource Recovery Group.

Utility Charges (\$151,978) Negative Variance

The increase to utilities charges budget is mainly due to higher street lighting costs resulting from a delay in the completion of the LED smart street light project.

Other Expenditure \$32,184 Positive Variance

- Reduction of \$250,000 due to the removal of the one off contribution from the City to the Edge Riviera Library project from the 2025-2026 budget and being re-budgeted in the 2026-2027 annual budget due to developer delays.
- Increase of \$209,000 due to reallocation of budgets from the Community Sporting and Recreation Facilities (CSRFF) fund budget to the Active Spaces Infrastructure Grant Fund budget for the sport and recreation clubs in supporting sustainable community clubs and facilities.

Key material findings in the Capital Budget:**Capital Grants, Subsidies and Contributions (\$2,248,117) Negative Variance**

The net reduction to the Capital Grants Subsidies and Contributions budget is due to;

- Additional grant/contribution income totalling \$761,062 - Significant increases include;
 - \$124,000 for the Peter Ellis Court resurfacing - Department of Education
 - \$100,000 for the Men's Shed Modifications - Melville Community Men's Shed
 - \$100,000 for the Changeroom Upgrade at Len Shearer – Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries
 - \$198,458 for the Main Hall Upgrade - Lotterywest
- Reduction of grant income totalling \$775,123 is due to grant funded projects being completed under budget/unsuccessful grant applications. Significant reductions include;
 - \$100,000 for Bus Shelter DDA Compliance
 - \$466,667 for Preston Point Road - Waddell Road - Roundabout
- Reduction to grant income totalling \$2,234,055 due to reallocation of budgets for committed grant funded projects to the 2026-2027 annual budget based on the expected project delivery and cashflow. Significant amounts include;
 - \$500,000 Changeroom Upgrade – Beasley Reserve
 - \$250,000 Changeroom Upgrade – Troy Park
 - \$325,000 Changeroom Upgrade – Winnacott Reserve
 - \$259,055 Renewal Energy Projects
 - \$900,000 Kardinya Netball Morris Buzacott

Payments for Property, Plant and Equipment - \$6,389,924 Positive Variance

A summary of budget amendments to Capital Works Expenditure is included in the Attachment 2025-2026 Significant Capital Works Expenditure Budget Amendments.

Payments for construction of infrastructure \$1,978,993 Positive Variance

A summary of budget amendments to Capital Works Expenditure is included in the Attachment 2025-2026 Significant Capital Works Expenditure Budget Amendments.

The delivery of the capital works program by the end of the financial year is still subject to the timing of procurement processes, availability of contractors and various other unforeseen events and factors beyond the control of the City. Therefore, based on historical trends it is possible that a portion of the capital works program budget will be carried forward to the next financial year.

Key material findings in relation to Reserve Accounts:Transfers from reserve accounts (\$5,123,169) Negative Variance

The majority of changes to reserve accounts result from the changes in capital works projects. A summary of budget amendments to Capital Works Expenditure is included in the Attachment 2025-2026 Significant Capital Works Expenditure Budget Amendments.

Transfers to reserve accounts \$34,396 Positive Variance

Significant amendments include;

- The majority of changes to reserve accounts result from the changes in capital works projects. A summary of budget amendments to Capital Works Expenditure is included in the Attachment 2025-2026 Significant Capital Works Expenditure Budget Amendments.
- Reduction of \$465,578 to budgeted interest set aside to reserves – this is to offset the adverse impact to the budgeted closing position caused by the midyear budget amendments. This amendment will reduce the budgeted interest set aside to reserves from a 100% to 89% of the interest earned from investment of reserves funds. This is a deviation from the City's Accounting Policy CP-025 to which the 2025-2026 adopted budget was aligned.
- Increase of \$554,265 to budgeted funds set aside into the Rates Equalisation reserve – this represents the actual opening surplus for the 2025-2026 financial year of \$304,265 being set aside to reserves as per council approval C25/287 Consideration and Adoption of the 2025-2026 Budget and the set aside to of \$250,000 to be drawn down in 2026-2027 to fund the one off contribution of \$250,000 from the City to the Edge Riviera Library project.

Amendments to the 2025-2026 Fees and Charges Schedule

The following amendments are proposed to align fees with the recreation services user needs.

- The existing \$150 fee for Key Replacement to be discontinued.
- The introduction of a new \$150 fee for Key/Access Card Replacement.
- The introduction of a new fee for Off Season Training - \$25 per session.

The proposed additions to the fees and charges schedule, if approved will be advertised by way of public notice prior to taking effect.

ENGAGEMENT

There are no applicable engagement considerations presented as part of this report.

There are no applicable sustainability implications presented as part of this report.

LEGISLATIVE AND POLICY ALIGNMENT

Local Government (Financial Management Regulations) 1996:

33A. Review of budget

(1) Between 1 January and the last day of February in each financial year a local government is to carry out a review of its annual budget for that year.

(2A) The review of an annual budget for a financial year must —

(a) consider the local government's financial performance in the period beginning on 1 July and ending no earlier than 31 December in that financial year; and

(b) consider the local government's financial position as at the date of the review; and

(c) review the outcomes for the end of that financial year that are forecast in the budget; and

(d) include the following —

(i) the annual budget adopted by the local government;

(ii) an update of each of the estimates included in the annual budget;

(iii) the actual amounts of expenditure, revenue and income as at the date of the review;

(iv) adjacent to each item in the annual budget adopted by the local government that states an amount, the estimated end-of-year amount for the item.

(2) The review of an annual budget for a financial year must be submitted to the council on or before 31 March in that financial year.

(3) A council is to consider a review submitted to it and is to determine whether or not to adopt the review, any parts of the review or any recommendations made in the review.*

**Absolute majority required.*

(4) Within 14 days after a council has made a determination, a copy of the review and determination is to be provided to the Department.

The Review has been conducted in accordance with the City's Council Policy CP-025 Accounting Policy using the nature and type classifications and CP-008 Financial Sustainability – Forward Financial Planning and Funding Allocation Policy.

The Review includes a deviation from the City's Accounting Policy CP-025 in relation to Interest earned on Reserve Investments, to which the 2025-2026 adopted budget was aligned.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

After taking into account the various positive and negative variances and Reserve Funds adjustments, the Mid Year Budget Review has identified an overall balanced budget after Reserve transfers.

However, this is based on the accrual accounting concept and not necessarily reflective of the cash position. At the time of writing this report, the City had outstanding debtors of \$36m. The cash position of the City will continue to be monitored to ensure there is adequate cash flow to fund operations.

Furthermore, it must be noted that a balanced budget has been achieved by a deviation from accounting policy CP-025 thereby placing reduced interest earnings into reserves. While in the short term this approach presents as practical, a continuation of similar measures in the longer term is not financially sustainable and not recommended. A key focus of the current review of the Long Term Financial Model is to ensure the City is operating in a sustainable manner over the long term.

CONSEQUENCE

The 2025-2026 Mid-Year Budget Review has identified several areas requiring budget amendments. Overall, the net impact of the 2025-2026 Mid-Year Budget Review is a balanced budget after Reserve transfers.

If the Council chooses to not approve the recommended budget amendments, it will need to identify reserve transfers or operating/capital programs it wishes to alter instead.

If the Council chooses to not approve the proposed additions to the 2025-2026 Fees and Charges Schedule, the proposed fees will not take effect.

Question 1:

If there was a budget amendment for a project that was not delivered and was carried over to the next year, does that mean some of that budget can be used to fund something else within that area?

Response to Question 1:

In short, that would be possible. What actually happens if a project has been deferred, the monies are not transferred from reserve so they sit there. It would require a formal decision of Council by absolute majority to authorise that expenditure.

PURPOSE

To report on the performance of the City’s investment portfolio for the month of 31 December 2025.

The City’s investment portfolio is invested in highly secure investments with a low level of risk yielding a weighted average rate of return of 4.24% to 4.30% which exceeds the benchmark three month bank bill swap (BBSW) reference rate of 3.71%.

12% of the City’s investment portfolio is invested in authorised deposit taking institutions that do not lend to industries engaged in the exploration for, or production of, fossil fuels. This compared to 12% in November 2025.

Future investment earnings will be determined by the cash flows of the City and movements in interest rates on term deposits.

BACKGROUND

The City of Melville (the City) has cash holdings as a result of timing differences between the collection of revenue and its expenditure. Whilst these funds are held by the City they are invested in appropriately rated and liquid investments.

The investment of cash holdings is undertaken in accordance with Council Policy CP-009 - Investment of Funds, with the objective of maximising returns whilst maintaining low levels of credit risk exposure.

CONSIDERATION

The following statement details the investments held by the City of Melville as at 31 December 2025.

The City’s total investments amount to \$184.91M, made up of the Citizen Relief Fund (\$0.25M), Municipal Funds (\$51.63M) and Reserve Funds (\$133.02M) which are restricted to the defined purpose for which the reserve account was established.

Key Points

- Most of the funds (\$154.05M) are in Term Deposits, ensuring secure and stable returns.
- Short-term investments include 11AM accounts (\$12.26M) this account is a money market deposit that allows the City to access funds for daily financial needs if notice is given before 11AM, and call deposits totalling (\$18.6M). These funds allow the City to meet financial obligations, including suppliers’ payment and other debt repayments, without disruptions to its services.
- The portfolio is low risk, with 71% of funds in AA Category rated institutions and 29% in A Category rated institutions.
- There are no investments in AAA-rated and BBB+ institutions and effort are undertaken to invest in accordance with Council Investment Policy CP-009.

The City’s investments were invested within the limits allowed within each category rating for 31 December 2025.

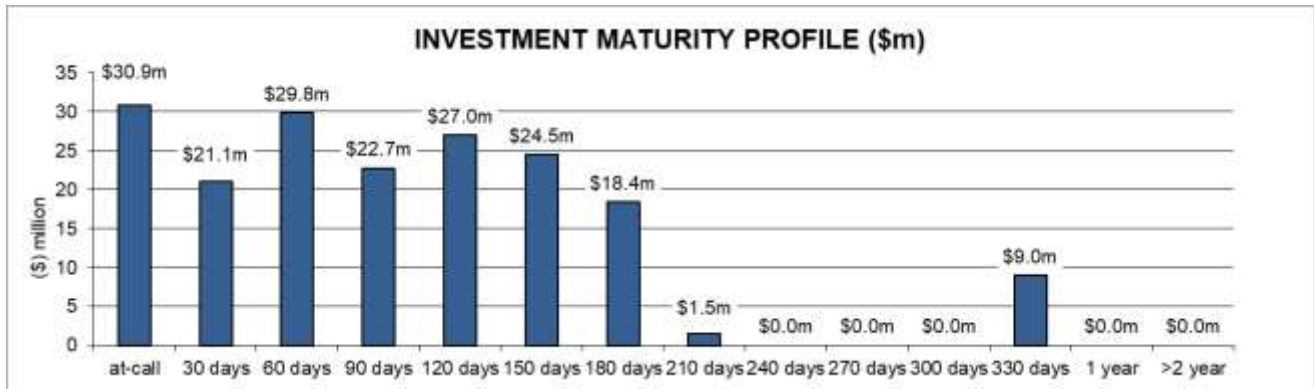

The below graph summarises the maturity profile of the City’s investments at market value as at 31 December 2025. The immediacy of the demand for funds depends on the particular fund or reserve Account(s) of the City. The maturity profile provided in the table above meets the liquidity requirements of the Council policy.



The above Investment Maturity Profile graph for December 2025 provides an overview of the City's investment portfolio, categorising term deposits based on their maturity periods. The maturity profile of the City's investments is aligned with Council's investment policy, cash flow requirements, and prevailing market conditions. Interest rate fluctuations will continue to influence the term of the reinvestment decisions to ensure optimal financial outcomes.

The City’s current investment approach prioritises short-term liquidity to meet operational needs and unforeseen expenses rather than focusing on long-term yield opportunities. A substantial portion of funds (\$12.3M) is available for immediate use, ensuring sufficient liquidity for day-to-day operations. This allows the City to meet financial obligations, including suppliers’ payment and other debt repayments, without disruptions to its services.

Investments are well-distributed across various short- to medium-term maturities, with notable allocations in 90 days (\$22.7m), 120 days (\$27.0m), 150 days (\$24.5m), and 180 days (\$18.4m), 210 days (\$1.5M) and 330 days (\$9.0m). This structured approach ensures financial stability while balancing liquidity needs and optimising returns. The estimated average cash outflow requirement of the City is between \$13M to \$16M per month.

The majority of the investment portfolio is concentrated in short- to medium-term maturities, with limited allocation beyond 210 and 330 days. A small portion of the portfolio matures at 330 days (\$9M), reflecting selective investment opportunities where competitive rates were available for Green Investment with Westpac Bank. There are no long-term investments beyond one year, as the City's investment strategy is designed to align with its annual revenue cycle, which is predominantly driven by rates revenue. The recent RBA interest rate cut on 12 August 2025 by 0.25 to 3.6 per cent and remained unchanged at the RBA meeting on 9th December 2025. The changes to the RBA interest rate has contributed to reduced competitiveness of longer-term deposit rates, influencing this maturity profile.

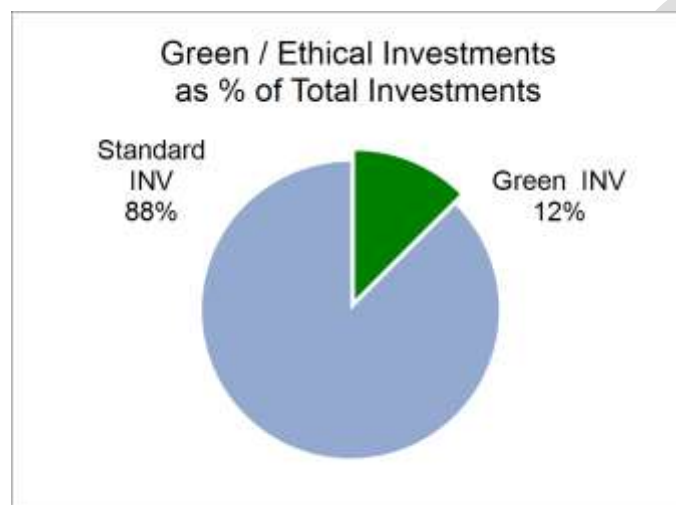
Additionally, the City maintains a balanced risk exposure, diversifying investments within shorter timeframes to mitigate financial and interest rate risks.

The City exercises a deliberative preference in favour of green/ethical investments. This preference will however only be exercised after the foremost investment considerations of credit rating, comparable rate and risk diversification are fully satisfied.

“Green investments” are authorised investment products made in authorised institutions that respect the environment by not investing in fossil fuel industries.

Environmental, Social & Governance Term Deposit (ESGTD) is a similar product to Green investments. ESGTD’s provide the opportunity to invest in products that seek to mitigate environmental and social risks.

The total investment in authorised institutions as at 31 December 2025 was \$23,100,000 or 12% of total investment holdings being in non-fossil fuels institutions, compared to \$23,100,000 (12%) in November 2025. The total investments holding for December and November were \$184,905,524 and \$194,805,524 respectively.

The Green investments are allocated across the two banks mentioned above, in alignment with the Council’s credit rating policy.

The City continues to engage in active discussions with financial institutions regarding the availability of ESG Tailored Deposit (ESGTD) products. Westpac has offered AUD Green Tailored Deposits and AUD Social Tailored Deposits, however, there is no suitable investment due to low interest rates offered for these products. Westpac has offered a Social Tailored Deposit with a minimum deposit size of \$1 million and a minimum term of 1 year, extendable up to 5 years. The City’s has recently invested \$9M with Westpac, however current holdings with Westpac are already close to the Council-approved policy limit which precludes Westpac for more investment opportunities at this time.

While the City maintains a preference for green and ethical investments, this is only exercised after ensuring that all requirements related to credit rating, competitive interest rates, and risk diversification are fully met.

In addition, the City has held formal discussions with CBA, NAB and Bank of Queensland to explore potential ESGTD and Green Term Deposit options. At this stage, both banks are in the development phase of these products. Currently, there are no suitable ESGTD products available in the market that meet the City's Investment Policy requirement.

ENGAGEMENT

This report is available to members of the public on the City's website. A wide range of suitably credit rated Authorised Deposit-taking Institutions (ADI's) were engaged with during the month in respect to the placement and renewal of investments.

SUSTAINABILITY IMPLICATIONS

Strategic

The interest earned on invested funds assists in addressing the following key priority area identified in The City of Melville Corporate Business Plan 2024-2034.

Priority Number One – "Restricted current revenue base and increasing/changing service demands impacts on rates".

Risk

The Council's Investment of Funds Policy CP-009 was drafted to minimise credit risk through investing in highly rated securities and diversification. The Policy also incorporates mechanisms that protect the City's investments from undue volatility risk as well as the risk to reputation because of investments that may be perceived as unsuitable by the Community.

Environmental

When investing the City's funds, a deliberative preference will be made in favour of authorised institutions that respect the environment by not investing in fossil fuel industries. This preference will, however, only be exercised after the foremost investment considerations of credit rating, risk diversification and interest rate return are fully satisfied.

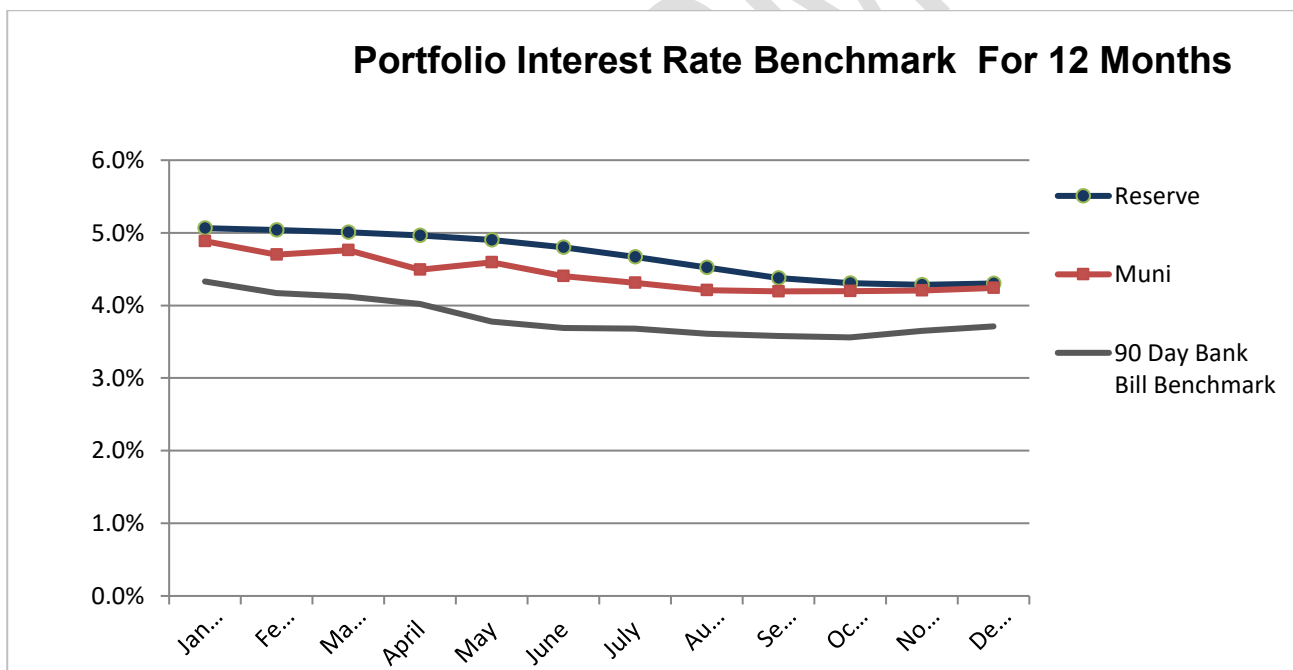
The *Local Government (Financial Management) Regulations 1996* (regulation 19C) allows local governments to deposit funds for a fixed term of three years or less. Deposits of greater than one year may, depending on the shape of the yield curve, enable the City to achieve better investment returns.

Council Policy CP-009 – Investment of Funds provides guidelines with respect to the investment of City of Melville (the City) funds by defining levels of risk considered prudent for public monies. Liquidity requirements are determined to ensure the funds are available as and when required and take account of appropriate benchmarks for rates of return commensurate with the low levels of risk and liquidity requirements. The types of investments that the City has the power to invest in is limited by prescriptive legislative provisions governed by the *Local Government Act 1995*, *Local Government (Financial Management) Regulations 1996* and Part III of the *Trustees Act 1962*.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

For the period ending 31 December 2025:

- Year-to-date Investment earnings on term deposits held in reserve accounts, money at call accounts and the municipal account in aggregate, was \$4,155,100 against a year-to-date budget of \$3,944,312 representing a positive variance of \$210,787.64 . This positive variance is primarily attributed to the deferral of planned capital projects, which has resulted in higher than anticipated cash balances.
- The weighted average interest rate for Municipal and Reserve Fund investments as at 31 December 2025 was 4.27% which compares favourably to the benchmark three month bank bill swap (BBSW) reference rate of 3.71%.

Overall Summary of The City's Financial Position

- The City's total investments holding for December 2025 amount to \$184.90M, made up of the Citizen Relief Fund (\$0.25M), Municipal Funds (\$51.63M) and Reserve Funds (\$133.02M) which are restricted to the defined purpose for which the reserve account was established. The detailed Investment Council Report will be tabled for the Ordinary Meeting of Council in February 2026.
- The investment in green/ethical term deposits as at 31 December 2025 was \$23.1m or 12% of the City's investment portfolio, compared to 12% in November, in accordance with the council investment policy.
- Rates raised as at 31 December were \$114.87M, compared to a year-to-date budget of \$114.54M.
- The total outstanding debtors (including all rates and sundry debtors) is \$34.98M as of 31 December 2025.
- The City tabled its Annual Report, including the Annual Financial Report and the Auditor's Opinion issued by the Office of the Auditor General, in December, prior to the statutory deadline of 31 December, in accordance with the *Local Government Act 1995*.

The City has signed and received the fully executed Community Energy Upgrade Fund grant agreement (\$518,110) on 3 September 2025. The procurement for Renewable Energy System Consultancy Support and Point Walter’s irrigation pump upgrade project have commenced, with larger Supply, Install and/or Construction tenders on pause until planning and designs are completed.

The City is very excited to progress these Energy Efficiency Projects (FY25/26 to FY26/27) that will bring energy and cost savings as well as emission reductions and climate resilience.

Money Expended in an Emergency and Unbudgeted Expenditure

There was no money expended in an emergency or unbudgeted expenditure for the month of December 2025.

Granting of concession or writing off debts owed to the City

Delegation DA-032 empowers the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) to grant concessions and write off monies owing to the City to a limit of \$10,000 for any one item. The CEO has partially on-delegated this to the Directors to write off debts or grant concessions to a value of \$5,000 and the Chief Financial Officer to a value of \$1,000.

Recovery Actions Undertaken

The City has taken the following recovery action

- 4 April 2024-The debts were referred to Recoveries Legal. A formal Letter of Demand was issued; no response was received.
- April 2024 – July 2025-The City continued to issue debtor statements and attempted contact using multiple phone numbers and email addresses, without success.
- August 2025- New contact details were obtained. A member of the Leisurefit team contacted the debtor by phone; but the call was terminated. Subsequent call attempts were unanswered. Further attempts were made via email with no response.
- 19 November 2025-Correspondence was received from CS Legal advising that all final follow-up attempts had been completed. The demand period had expired with no response and the owner, the individual had declared bankruptcy.

It is unlikely that Profutsal or the WA State Futsal League holds any recoverable assets, and no further recovery action would be pursued.

CS Legal advised that a fresh Letter of Demand could be issued after six months if the City wished.

Writing off debt of \$2,579.50. Individual cancelled membership in centre and received a refund for monies paid and then also filled a challenge on the payment with their bank, resulting in a reversal of the original payment. Effectively resulting in a double refund. After several attempts to contact individual by LeisureFit and CS Legal, the individual has not responded. Not economical to continue to pursue and request Write Off.

To report on the performance of the City’s investment portfolio for the month of November 2025.

The City’s investment portfolio is invested in highly secure investments with a low level of risk yielding a weighted average rate of return of 4.21% to 4.28% which exceeds the benchmark three month bank bill swap (BBSW) reference rate of 3.65%.

12% of the City’s investment portfolio is invested in authorised deposit taking institutions that do not lend to industries engaged in the exploration for, or production of, fossil fuels. This compared to 11% in October 2025.

Future investment earnings will be determined by the cash flows of the City and movements in interest rates on term deposits.

BACKGROUND

The City of Melville (the City) has cash holdings as a result of timing differences between the collection of revenue and its expenditure. Whilst these funds are held by the City they are invested in appropriately rated and liquid investments.

The investment of cash holdings is undertaken in accordance with Council Policy CP-009 - Investment of Funds, with the objective of maximising returns whilst maintaining low levels of credit risk exposure.

CONSIDERATION

The following statement details the investments held by the City of Melville as at 30 November 2025.

The City’s total investments amount to \$194.8M, made up of the Citizen Relief Fund (\$0.25M), Municipal Funds (\$61.5M) and Reserve Funds (\$133.02M) which are restricted to the defined purpose for which the reserve account was established.

Key Points

- Most of the funds (\$164.55M) are in Term Deposits, ensuring secure and stable returns.
- Short-term investments include 11AM accounts (\$11.66M) this account is a money market deposit that allows the City to access funds for daily financial needs if notice is given before 11AM, and call deposits totalling (\$18.6M). These funds allow the City to meet financial obligations, including suppliers' payment and other debt repayments, without disruptions to its services.
- The portfolio is low risk, with 72% of funds in AA Category rated institutions and 28% in A Category rated institutions.
- There are no investments in AAA-rated and BBB+ institutions and effort are undertaken to invest in accordance with Council Investment Policy CP-009.

The City's investments were invested within the limits allowed within each category rating for November 2025.

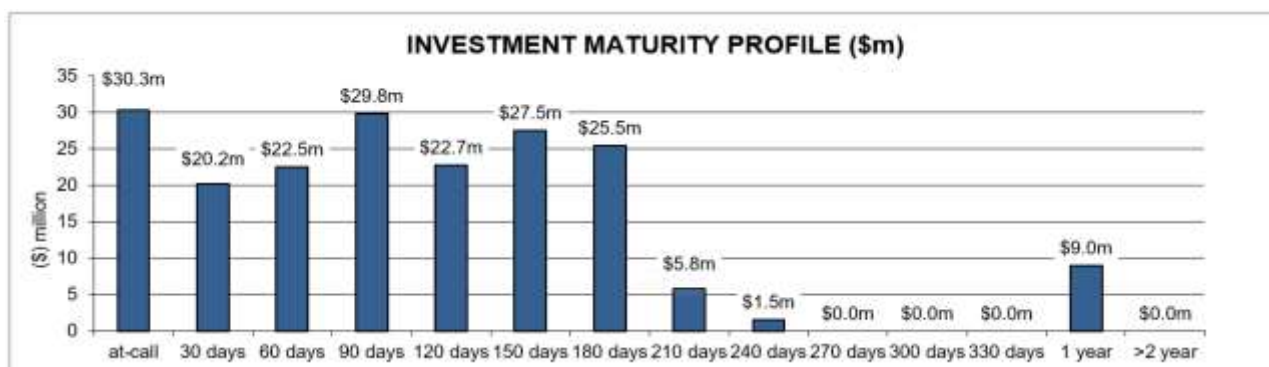

The below graph summarises the maturity profile of the City's investments at market value as at 30 November 2025. The immediacy of the demand for funds depends on the particular fund or reserve Account(s) of the City. The maturity profile provided in the table above meets the liquidity requirements of the Council policy.



The above Investment Maturity Profile graph for November 2025 provides an overview of the City's investment portfolio, categorising term deposits based on their maturity periods. The maturity profile of the City's investments is aligned with Council's investment policy, cash flow requirements, and prevailing market conditions. Interest rate fluctuations will continue to influence the term of the reinvestment decisions to ensure optimal financial outcomes.

The City's current investment approach prioritises short-term liquidity to meet operational needs and unforeseen expenses rather than focusing on long-term yield opportunities. A substantial portion of funds (\$11.6M) is available for immediate use, ensuring sufficient liquidity for day-to-day operations. This allows the City to meet financial obligations, including suppliers' payment and other debt repayments, without disruptions to its services.

Investments are well-distributed across various short- to medium-term maturities, with notable allocations in 90 days (\$29.8M), 120 days (\$22.7M), 150 days (\$27.5M), 180 days (\$25.5M), 210 days (\$5.8M), 240 days (\$1.5M), and 365 days (\$9M). This structured approach ensures financial stability while the balancing liquidity needs and optimising returns. The estimated average cash outflow requirement of the City is between \$13M to \$16M per month.

The majority of the investment portfolio is concentrated in short- to medium-term maturities, with limited allocation beyond 240 and 365 days. A small portion of the portfolio matures at 365 days (\$9M), reflecting selective investment opportunities where competitive rates were available for Green Investment with Westpac Bank. There are no long-term investments beyond one year, as the City's investment strategy is designed to align with its annual revenue cycle, which is predominantly driven by rates revenue. The recent RBA interest rate cut on 12 August 2025 by 0.25 to 3.6 per cent and remained unchanged at the RBA meeting on 9th December 2025. The changes to the RBA interest rate has contributed to reduced competitiveness of longer-term deposit rates, influencing this maturity profile.

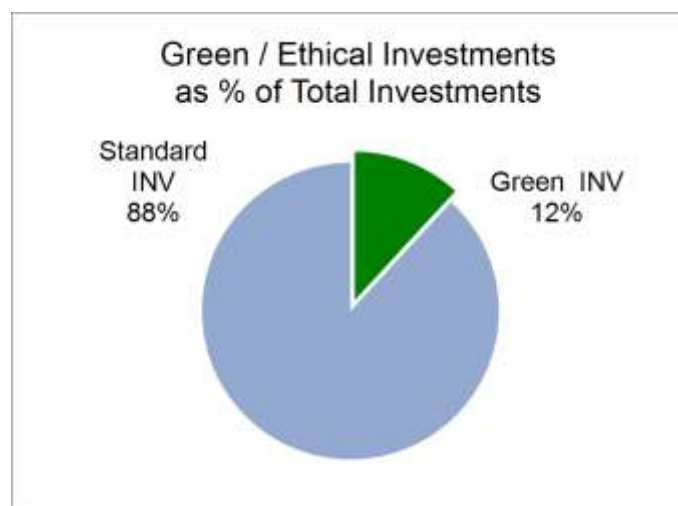
Additionally, the City maintains a balanced risk exposure, diversifying investments within shorter timeframes to mitigate financial and interest rate risks.

The City exercises a deliberative preference in favour of green/ethical investments. This preference will however only be exercised after the foremost investment considerations of credit rating, comparable rate and risk diversification are fully satisfied.

"Green investments" are authorised investment products made in authorised institutions that respect the environment by not investing in fossil fuel industries.

Environmental, Social & Governance Term Deposit (ESGTD) is a similar product to Green investments. ESGTD's provide the opportunity to invest in products that seek to mitigate environmental and social risks.

The total investment in authorised institutions as at 30 November 2025 was \$23,100,000 or 12% of total investment holdings being in non-fossil fuels institutions, compared to \$22,600,000 (11%) in October 2025. The total investments holding for November and October were \$194,805,524 and \$199,805,524 respectively.

The Green investments are allocated across the two banks mentioned above, in alignment with the Council's credit rating policy.

The City continues to engage in active discussions with financial institutions regarding the availability of ESG Tailored Deposit (ESGTD) products. Westpac has offered AUD Green Tailored Deposits and AUD Social Tailored Deposits, however, there is no suitable investment due to low interest rates offered for these products. Westpac has offered a Social Tailored Deposit with a minimum deposit size of \$1 million and a minimum term of 1 year, extendable up to 5 years. The City's has recently invested \$9M with Westpac, however current holdings with Westpac are already close to the Council-approved policy limit which precludes Westpac for more investment opportunities at this time.

While the City maintains a preference for green and ethical investments, this is only exercised after ensuring that all requirements related to credit rating, competitive interest rates, and risk diversification are fully met.

In addition, the City has held formal discussions with CBA, NAB and Bank of Queensland to explore potential ESGTD and Green Term Deposit options. At this stage, both banks are in the development phase of these products. Currently, there are no suitable ESGTD products available in the market that meet the City's Investment Policy requirement.

ENGAGEMENT

This report is available to members of the public on the City's website. A wide range of suitably credit rated Authorised Deposit-taking Institutions (ADI's) were engaged with during the month in respect to the placement and renewal of investments.

SUSTAINABILITY IMPLICATIONS

Strategic

The interest earned on invested funds assists in addressing the following key priority area identified in The City of Melville Corporate Business Plan 2024-2034.

Priority Number One – "Restricted current revenue base and increasing/changing service demands impacts on rates".

Risk

The Council's Investment of Funds Policy CP-009 was drafted to minimise credit risk through investing in highly rated securities and diversification. The Policy also incorporates mechanisms that protect the City's investments from undue volatility risk as well as the risk to reputation because of investments that may be perceived as unsuitable by the Community.

Environmental

When investing the City's funds, a deliberative preference will be made in favour of authorised institutions that respect the environment by not investing in fossil fuel industries. This preference will, however, only be exercised after the foremost investment considerations of credit rating, risk diversification and interest rate return are fully satisfied.

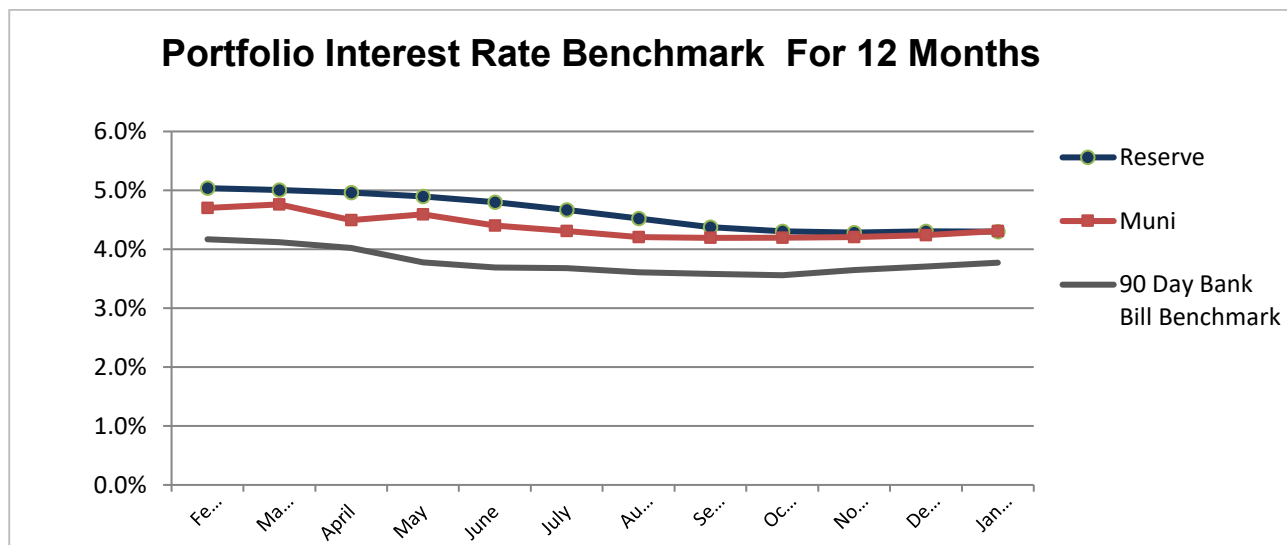
The *Local Government (Financial Management) Regulations 1996* (regulation 19C) allows local governments to deposit funds for a fixed term of three years or less. Deposits of greater than one year may, depending on the shape of the yield curve, enable the City to achieve better investment returns.

Council Policy CP-009 – Investment of Funds provides guidelines with respect to the investment of City of Melville (the City) funds by defining levels of risk considered prudent for public monies. Liquidity requirements are determined to ensure the funds are available as and when required and take account of appropriate benchmarks for rates of return commensurate with the low levels of risk and liquidity requirements. The types of investments that the City has the power to invest in is limited by prescriptive legislative provisions governed by the *Local Government Act 1995*, *Local Government (Financial Management) Regulations 1996* and Part III of the *Trustees Act 1962*.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

For the period ending 30 November 2025

- Year-to-date Investment earnings on term deposits held in reserve accounts, money at call accounts and the municipal account in aggregate, was \$3,457,512 against a year-to-date budget of \$3,309,083 representing a positive variance of \$148,429.
- The weighted average interest rate for Municipal and Trust Fund investments as at 30 November 2025 was 4.21% which compares favourably to the benchmark three-month bank bill swap (BBSW) reference rate of 3.65%.

BACKGROUND

The City has for a long period of time allowed personal memorials as a means of assisting the local community to grieve for loved ones, most recently memorials are in the form of a park bench with a plaque.

Personal Memorials are in addition to the War Memorial at Yagan Mia/Wireless Hill, Heath Ledger Memorial chess set at Goolugatup/Heathcote and the following located at Dyoondalup/Point Walter.

- Vyner Brooke Nurses Memorial
- Honour Avenue War Memorials
- Stolen Generation space.

There currently is no City Operational Policy or Council Policy on this subject at the City of Melville.

In 2024, the City temporarily paused accepting requests for personal memorials until a Policy could be developed. Historically, on average the City received approximately 15 requests per year, however this number has been as high as 30 requests, experienced in 2022. The City's Park Asset database identifies that there are approximately 225 memorial plaques in the City (based on the latest audit undertaken in 2023-2024).

In addition, there were challenges in placing bench seats in areas with high demand. Locations along the foreshore are particularly popular for those requesting a personal memorial bench which has resulted in these areas reaching a saturation point and essentially being overcrowded with memorial benches. Example below at Bicton Quarantine Park with red dots indicating memorial benches.



Prior to the City pausing personal memorial requests, the following process and assessment took place when an application was received:

- The City reviewed memorial applications when lodged and the team worked with the applicant regarding the suitability of the location requested
- The only criteria that had to be met is that the person that the memorial is named after must have lived in the City for 10 years. Vetting of the information for accuracy is problematic in some cases, with no rigorous investigation able to be completed to verify this criteria
- Once the City assessed and accepted the completed Application Form, a quote was issued, and an invoice raised for payment. The cost was approximately \$3,800 for a bench and plaque
- Ordering of bench and plaque was arranged by the City after payment had been received
- Upon receiving the bench and plaque, the City arranged for installation and notified the applicant that the bench had been installed
- Ongoing maintenance of the plaque is the responsibility of the applicant, noting the City maintains the seat
- There are no restrictions for length of time the plaque will be in place.

Many requests are for the same locations predominately Bicton Quarantine Park, Dyoondalup/Point Walter, Blackwell Reach Parade and other locations along the foreshore. As these locations are very popular, they have reached a saturation point with personal memorials.

As a result of the high number of existing memorials, officers are often advising applicants that space is no longer available which can cause distress for family members. Officers are also finding applicants are very particular with their requests and become emotional when their ideal location for the memorial bench is not able to be supported. The entire process can be very stressful for City officers managing the requests and for the applicant.

There are times when members of the community have raised concern that they do not agree with personal memorials being placed in public open space areas and believe they should remain in designated facilities such as cemeteries.

A key point to consider is the associated cost with purchasing the park bench and the plaque. As there is a significant cost involved with the current process, some people in the community can't afford it, raising the question of equity.

CONSIDERATION

A desktop review of what other Local Governments in Perth have in place for personal memorial requests has been undertaken, with varying results as indicated below:

- Town of Mosman Park – A commemorative plaque wall at a park which overlooks the Swan River that is added to over time.
- City of South Perth - Installation of a commemorative plaque on an approved structure or tree only.
- City of Joondalup - Installation of a commemorative plaque within an existing garden bed area or integrated with an existing tree.
- City of Nedlands – Planting of a tree with a plaque or dedicating items of amenity furniture.

With the above examples, there is a range of approval processes in each Local Government from the Council to CEO or a Delegated Officer as well as strict criteria and timeframes in which the plaque is to be left in ground and removed after a certain timeframe. All of these examples are supported by the respective Council Policy on this issue.

The City has considered a number of options for personal memorials including the following:

- An applicant could purchase any infrastructure located in a park, installing it as a memorial with a plaque, where such infrastructure meets the City's asset management requirements. Purchased assets could include infrastructure like trees, gardens, drink fountains, BBQs or even playgrounds in locations across the City. A plaque would be placed on or near these assets. There would be no upfront cost to the City as costs would be borne by the applicant, however as with bench seats at some point this will become an asset the City will have to renew or replace at ratepayers expense.
- Designate various locations to be utilised as a memorial – a wall/sculpture or similar structure could be established with names included on a centralised plaque
- Garden/space – Creating or designating a specific memorial garden or space

- Place a time limit on the plaques which could allow the plaques to be there for a designated timeframe (say 5 or 10 years) and then removed so the space can be reused for future applicants.
- QR codes or virtual memorials using other technological method. This would reduce the physical impact across the City and enable personal or other family members to be represented.

City staff recommend the following actions to form the basis for the Council Policy:

- Discontinue the practice of allowing the installation of Personal Memorials within Public Open Space areas.
- Create four *Reflection/ Remember Me spaces* across the City to allow for contemplation and reflection of loved ones' past. The space would not include specific names rather a commemorative/reflective phrase or similar and be funded by the City. These spaces would be installed at Bicton Quarantine Park, Jeff Joseph Reserve, Dyoondalup/Point Walter and Deep Water Point initially due to their popularity for such requests. More locations could be considered if requested or desired by the Council.

ENGAGEMENT

During November and December of 2023, the City undertook community engagement to better understand the level of support for memorials in public places and provided an opportunity for the public to share ideas on the future of the memorial process. Just under 1000 randomly selected emails were sent out to members of community via the City of Melville Sounding Board and the survey link was posted on social media platforms and 95 survey submissions were received.

Most responses preferred to keep personal memorial plaques on benches. However, there were comments that acknowledged the difficulties with multiple benches at sites such as "*There definitely needs to be a limitation on the number of benches and memorial plaques at public park locations as there was clearly a time when it got out of hand such as Quarantine Park Bicton where it has become a park of benches.*"

The next two preferences were memorial gardens and Remember Me benches.

There were several alternative suggestions including:

- Provision of memorial seeds that could be spread around the City of Melville
- Augmented reality options
- Bridge of memories or a lock bridge

Several comments suggested they do not agree with personal memorials at all and included:

"I don't believe ratepayers money (even indirectly through just allocation of resources to arrange a plaque etc) or council resources should be invested in memorials."

Engagement Snapshot provides a summary of the feedback and forms Attachment 2.

SUSTAINABILITY IMPLICATIONS

Social Sustainability

- Positive - Supports the Applicant's grieving process and wellbeing
- Negative - No longer allowing personalised plaques may lead to distress for those who would like to see a memorial bench installed at certain locations.

Environmental Sustainability

- Positive - Adds interest to locations which may further activate POS.
- Negative – Installation of new assets potentially increasing non-sustainable materials in public open space.

LEGISLATIVE AND POLICY ALIGNMENT

There are no legislative or policy implications presented as part of this report, noting that the Officer Recommendation is to adopt a policy regarding this matter.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

If the Policy is supported, 4 x *Reflection/ Remember Me spaces* would be installed which would require the City to allocate funding in the budget and Long-Term Financial Plan commencing in the 2026/2027 financial year. The installation of *Reflection/ Remember Me spaces* would be planned as follows:

- Dyoondalup/Point Walter – 2026-2027
- Jeff Joseph Reserve – 2027-2028
- Deep Water Point – 2028-2029
- Bicton Quarantine Park – 2029-2030

A budget of \$40,000 for each *Reflection/ Remember Me space*, a total of \$160,000 would be required over the four financial years from 2026-2027 to 2029-2030.

Ongoing operational budgets would be required as well as considering asset renewal costs associated with the new infrastructure.

CONSEQUENCE

If this Policy is not adopted and the Council retains the process of installing personal memorials in public open space the below will need to be considered

- There will be a reduction in customer satisfaction when applications are declined
- City staff wellbeing concerns will continue when managing requests that are declined
- Continued inequity as to who can afford to meet the cost of memorial bench installation
- Further proliferation of personal memorial benches in the Public Open Space areas

Question 1:

With regard to the questions asked by Mr Waugh this evening, is there anything that you'd like to expand on?

Response to Question 1:

Mr Waugh's questions were related to our policies in general. Mr Waugh's preamble to the question was making a distinction between adopting the policy and also Council adopting the procedures. There is a clear distinction in the Act that talks about Council adopting strategic policies and providing strategic direction, and the procedures are an executive function of the CEO to implement the policies. Our interpretation of the Act and interpretation of how policies are to be adopted would be making sure there is a clear distinction between the two; a clear distinction between a strategic policy of Council and an operational policy under the executive functions of the CEO within the Act.

Question 2:

Is there any chance you could email Elected Members that information?

Response to Question 2:

Absolutely.

Question 3:

The report mentions equity a lot, with the cost of a park bench listed as \$3,800. Does the report need to mention equity, as I don't think it's an equity issue? Can officers make comment on this?

Response to Question 3:

That was based on some of the feedback that was received by staff. In terms of \$3,800 being a lot of money, that probably depends. Different people would perhaps give different answers to that. I would certainly acknowledge it would be less than the cost of an average funeral, but people would potentially be paying for a funeral as well as paying for the cost of the memorial. It is probably a subjective matter as to whether or not \$3,800 is a considerable amount of money.

Question 4:

Just a further comment about something that was mentioned in the report: the \$3,800 was paid for by the applicant, would that be correct?

Response to Question 4:

Yes, that is correct.

Question 5:

It's got in here under community engagement, and it's highlighted, that several comments suggested they don't agree with personal memorials at all because they don't believe ratepayers' money should be invested in memorials. So would that be an incorrect statement?

Response to Question 5:

The statement is correct in saying that's the feedback that was provided as part of the consultation, and it may have been that people were unaware that the applicants were paying themselves. They may also have been referring to staff time involved in organising them and things like that, which may not be directly costed.

Question 6:

Given that the issue largely seems to be about oversaturation, which I gather from the diagram of Bicton Quarantine Park is about the number of benches and not necessarily the number of plaques, has consideration been given to having multiple plaques on a bench or putting plaques on trees?

Response to Question 6:

Yes, consideration has been given to that. Some of the issues with the benches is that some of them have already been installed and been paid for by one particular family, so it would obviously be quite stressful for the people and the staff involved in going and asking if it's alright to put another plaque on there. The report did also consider looking at the option of not just plaques on trees but plaques on other infrastructure as well, which could be barbecues, playgrounds or things like that, so that option was considered as well.

Question 7:

Was consideration given to other infrastructure that would be considered useful for our residents, for example jetties, upkeep restoration and water fountains?

Response to Question 7:

On page 79, one of the options was that purchased assets could include infrastructure like trees, gardens, drink fountains and barbecues. I'm not sure if jetties were specifically considered, but they would be grouped in the same group, so that was the consideration.

SUMMARY

- The Melville City Centre Structure Plan, now referred to as the Booragoon (Melville City Centre) Precinct Plan, is subject to a statutory ten-yearly review. The Western Australian Planning Commission (WAPC) has approved a two-year extension to allow completion of the review by 2027.
- To prepare for the review, a preliminary engagement phase has been completed, capturing feedback from the community, key stakeholders, Elected Members, and the City’s Senior Leadership Team. The findings from this preliminary dialogue with stakeholders is summarised in the Engagement Outcomes Report (Attachment 1).
- The preliminary engagement phase has highlighted opportunities for the City Centre and equally has noted a number of concerns, pre-requisites and delivery challenges, should future planning contemplate additional growth and intensity.
- Issues that would need to be addressed in the future City Centre include the need for upfront public realm investment, traffic and transport management, land assembly, tree protection, quality of design and built form together with effective stakeholder communication.
- Based on the preliminary work undertaken, an evidence-led, staged approach is proposed for the Booragoon (Melville City Centre) Activity Centre Plan review:
 - The review will be evidence-led and staged, drawing on technical investigations, the preliminary community engagement and progressing through Elected Member workshops prior to any draft plans being prepared.
 - Built form outcomes will follow a performance-based approach, with height and massing guided by context, community expectation and design quality rather than blanket zoning.
 - Early engagement with the Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage, Minister for Planning and the Western Australian Planning Commission (WAPC) will test feasible density scenarios, expectations, and delivery mechanisms before options are presented to Council.
 - Engagement materials will clearly communicate the expected impacts on traffic, housing diversity, and character.

- This approach recognises that while State Government legislation identifies Booragoon as a major centre within the metropolitan hierarchy, any movement towards that role and vision will require support of stakeholders and attention to the concerns raised during the preliminary engagement.
- Accordingly, a tailored planning review program is recommended which establishes the parameters, scope, and decision framework upfront, ensuring all decisions are guided by agreed technical evidence before any draft plans or maps are prepared.
- Council is recommended to note the Engagement Outcomes Report and endorse the evidence-led, engagement aligned and staged approach to the review.

BACKGROUND

The Booragoon Centre is a designated Secondary Centre under State Planning Policy 4.2 – Activity Centres, reflecting its regional role, concentration of commercial activity, and public transport function. The existing Melville City Centre Structure Plan (MCCSP), endorsed in 2014, guides development across land use, built form, streetscape, public realm, sustainability, and infrastructure servicing. The MCCSP is due for review in 2025, however, the WAPC has approved a two-year extension to allow completion of the review by 2027.

Recognising the range of stakeholders with an interest in the centre, (including Elected Members, the community, landowners, and special interest groups), the City undertook a preliminary engagement phase to understand community and stakeholder expectation, explore opportunities, constraints, and challenges. The engagement findings, summarised in Attachment 1, highlighted several key issues:

- Booragoon has strong regional economic importance but limited housing diversity and under-investment in the public realm.
- Stakeholders strongly support enhanced public realm, including expanded tree canopy, walkability, open space, and civic activation.
- Strategic use of City-owned land presents opportunities to unlock precinct renewal and align economic, social, and environmental outcomes.
- Clearer planning communication, consideration of precinct identity, housing diversity, transport accessibility, and economic activation are required.
- Engagement fatigue is a risk, requiring transparent processes, clear information and consistent messaging.

These preliminary investigations also included analysis of economic factors relating to the future of the Booragoon City Centre. The economic analysis explored expectations for the future of the Centre and identifies factors limiting future growth. Importantly, the economic analysis highlights issues and opportunities that would need to be resolved as part of any planned growth of the area. Key findings and recommendations include:

- The Centre is well located within the metropolitan area and features views, high property values, good public transport access, proximity to schools, open space and wide range of services.
- The structure plan area is dominated by the Westfield Shopping Centre and delays to the expansion are adversely impacting development throughout the precinct.
- Other negative factors include poor quality pedestrian environments, limited public realm investment, traffic congestion and general lack of centre identity.
- Existing Structure Plan controls are not reflective of the City's highest order centre. These restrictions together with market conditions are impacting development feasibility which is reflected in modest levels of recent development.
- Opportunity to review development controls to promote population and growth (relax height controls, relax use restrictions, extend precinct frame, promote improved design quality).
- Opportunity for the City to take on a leadership role in enhancing the precinct, including development of its landholdings, investment in public realm/streetscapes etc, promotion of the precinct/events etc and supporting the Westfield development.
- Opportunity for additional advocacy to State and Federal government for investment in infrastructure, transport, servicing, housing (social and aged care).

The preliminary community engagement, economic analysis together with lessons from Local Planning Scheme No. 6 (LPS6) and other precinct reviews, have informed the City's recommendations for an evidence-led, staged approach for the preparation of the Booragoon (Melville City Centre) Activity Centre Plan.

CONSIDERATION

The City proposes an evidence-led, consultative and staged approach to guide the ACP review and ensure decisions are grounded in technical analysis, realistic delivery, and with managed community expectations. This approach balances strategic vision with practical feasibility and aligns with State and local planning objectives.

The approach highlights the need to ensure that any proposed changes to development intensity in the Centre are linked to appropriate responses to identified concerns and challenges such as investing in supporting infrastructure, public realm improvements, economic realities and enhanced delivery/governance mechanisms.

1. Governance and Mandate

Before any drafting begins, Council's formal endorsement of the review's scope and parameters is essential. This governance step establishes what the ACP review will and will not cover, sets expectations for consultants, and ensures transparency throughout the process. Defining the mandate at the outset clarifies decision-making responsibilities and provides a foundation for a structured review.

2. Evidence-First Approach

The cornerstone of this approach is that all options must be evidence-based. This means ACP scenarios will rely on:

- Land economics analysis to test feasibility and typologies
- Demographic and population projection analysis
- Traffic modelling to 2050 to understand network and parking impacts
- Tree canopy assessments to balance built form with environmental outcomes
- Targeted agency input on utilities, education, transport, and servicing
- Additional community engagement on precinct vision.

No draft plans or recommended options will be advanced until this evidence has been presented and reviewed at Elected Member workshops. This ensures Council considers facts before forming positions or choosing a preferred direction.

3. Performance-Based Built Form

Built form outcomes will be context-sensitive and design-led, rather than determined by blanket zoning. Height and massing is intended to reflect the scale, character, and amenity of the precinct. This aligns with the principles of Local Planning Policy 3.1 – Residential Development, where additional height is discretionary and must demonstrate design quality, community benefit, and compatibility with surrounding development.

4. Two-Envelope Approach

To reconcile and balance short-term deliverability with long-term strategic ambition, the ACP review will separate options into two “envelopes”:

- Envelope A – Near-Term Delivery: Achievable mid-rise development with clear enabling infrastructure and public realm improvements. Triggers will ensure development occurs responsibly and in sequence with supporting works.
- Envelope B – Strategic Uplift: Taller built form and more intensive development may be considered only where State partnership tools, private investment, public realm enhancements and servicing allow. Without these enablers, higher density delivery may not occur before 2035+.

This structured approach ensures the review:

- Plans for growth realistically, based on market feasibility, infrastructure readiness and staging.
- Avoids premature or unrealistic density expectations, which could undermine community trust or lead to unimplementable plans.
- Aligns with State planning policy for Secondary Centres while ensuring uplift is introduced only where justified and deliverable.
- Responds to community expectations for well-designed, context-appropriate built form and managed impacts.
- Provides a clear pathway for both immediate improvements and longer-term opportunities, without committing the City to growth that cannot yet be delivered.

5. Decision Gates

To ensure disciplined governance, manage community and State expectations, and avoid premature or unsupported planning outcomes, the review will proceed through four clearly defined decision gates. Each gate represents a formal checkpoint at which Council confirms direction before any further work progresses.

Gate 1:

The first gate involves Council's endorsement of the review's scope and parameters, including the evidence-led methodology, the two-envelope approach, the performance-based built-form framework, and the required engagement deliverables. This establishes the foundational mandate for the project and defines the expectations that will guide all subsequent stages of work.

Gate 2:

The second gate occurs once the consolidated evidence base (land-economics feasibility, demographic projections, traffic and parking modelling to 2050, tree-canopy assessments, and targeted servicing advice from State agencies) has been completed and presented through a series of Elected Member workshops. At this stage, no options or draft scenarios are produced, ensuring Council has the opportunity to understand and interrogate the technical evidence before any planning directions are formed.

Gate 3:

The third gate is reached when multiple planning scenarios are presented to Council, each accompanied by clear and transparent trade-off information such as yield outcomes, traffic and canopy implications, built-form and character considerations, affordability implications, servicing capacity and infrastructure triggers, delivery feasibility, and preliminary State agency feedback. This comparative analysis enables Council to explore the implications of different strategic pathways, including both near-term deliverable outcomes and longer-term possibilities.

Gate 4:

At the fourth gate, Council provides explicit direction on the preferred planning approach. Only at this point do consultants commence drafting the Activity Centre Plan. Strategic uplift (Envelope B) is incorporated into draft content only where its feasibility has been demonstrated and where there is clear confirmation of State and private sector enablement through appropriate infrastructure and partnership mechanisms.

This gated process ensures that Council retains oversight at every critical point, makes informed decisions based on transparent evidence and option analysis, and avoids the risks associated with premature drafting or a “plan and defend” type outcome. It also provides the clarity and discipline required to manage community expectations, align with State aspirations, and ensure the resulting plan is both credible and deliverable.

6. Community and State Engagement

Engagement is central to building trust, transparency and legitimacy throughout the review. Preliminary engagement shows that community expectations remain closely aligned with the existing Structure Plan, particularly regarding traffic, character, tree canopy, infrastructure capacity and the overall scale of change. These expectations need to be managed carefully and respectfully. They cannot be dismissed, and a measured, staged and evidence-led approach is required to ensure future planning directions respond to community values while remaining realistic and deliverable.

To support this, simple impact sheets will be used to clearly explain the implications of each planning scenario, including traffic and parking outcomes, housing diversity, tree canopy effects, built-form transitions and anticipated changes to precinct character. These materials will help the community understand what may change, why change may be required, and the safeguards and sequencing in place to manage impacts. A broader community engagement program will need to be designed and implemented to support the next phase of the process and assist with informing the review.

Early and ongoing engagement with the DPLH, the Minister for Planning and the Western Australian Planning Commission will also be essential. This dialogue will test the feasibility of density scenarios, clarify expectations for Booragoon as a Secondary Centre, and identify the delivery mechanisms that may be required for any longer-term uplift areas. Integrating State feedback early will ensure the ACP aligns with broader planning priorities while remaining grounded in community sentiment and supported by clear evidence of feasibility and timing.

Together, this approach will help the City navigate differing expectations between the community, State agencies and market realities while ensuring the ACP progresses in a transparent, inclusive and well-governed manner.

7. Key Principles

The approach is tied to clear principles that provide both structure and flexibility for a credible and deliverable review.

The non-negotiables are an evidence first methodology, Elected Member workshops at key stages, a performance-based approach to height and built form, transparent assessment of trade-offs, and confirmation of State and private-sector feasibility before any strategic uplift is considered. These requirements keep the review grounded, objective and aligned with Council's governance expectations.

The negotiables include the boundaries of Envelopes A and B, the timing and phasing of public realm and infrastructure investment, and the housing mix and types. These elements can be refined as technical work progresses and as Council considers trade-offs and community feedback.

A key aspect of this framework is recognising that an evidence-led process may show that certain density options are not feasible, are not supported by State agencies, or require delivery mechanisms that are not yet available. In such cases, the City may stage or defer strategic uplift, or decide that some high-density outcomes should not proceed. This protects Council from committing to growth that cannot be delivered or is not accepted by community and provides a stable basis for decision-making.

Together, these principles guide consultants, support consistent communication with the community and ensure the ACP remains realistic, implementable and aligned with both community expectations and State planning requirements.

CONCLUSION

A different approach is proposed for the preparation of the Booragoon (Melville City Centre) Precinct Plan, having regard to the results from the preliminary engagement and the informing investigations. The proposed evidence-led, staged approach responds to the opportunities, challenges and concerns noted in the preliminary engagement and balances strategic ambition with practical feasibility. By grounding all options in robust technical evidence, including land economics, traffic modelling, and agency input, Council is positioned to make informed decisions before any draft plans are prepared. This ensures that outcomes are achievable, context-sensitive, and aligned with both City and State objectives.

Staging the review through defined decision gates provides transparency and accountability, allowing Council to consider trade-offs between different development scenarios while maintaining oversight over built form, density, and infrastructure delivery. The two-envelope approach further strengthens this framework by separating near-term, deliverable outcomes from longer-term strategic opportunities that depend on State partnerships, private investment or market conditions. This prevents over-promising, reduces delivery risk, and safeguards the City's credibility with the community and stakeholders.

The approach also prioritises community engagement and alignment with expectations established during LPS6, using explainable impact materials to clearly communicate potential outcomes, including traffic, housing, and character impacts. This transparency helps build trust, encourages meaningful input, and ensures that the preferred direction reflects community values alongside technical and economic considerations.

Overall, this evidence-led, staged methodology provides Council with a structured, disciplined, and adaptable framework to guide Booragoon's future development. It enables informed decision-making, mitigates risk, and ensures that any recommended changes are deliverable, sustainable, and responsive to both community and State requirements. Importantly, the approach emphasises that an Activity Centre Plan is not just a statutory development control tool, but is the framework to ensure delivery of private and public investment required to achieve the wider Plan objectives.

ENGAGEMENT

Preliminary engagement was undertaken in the first half of 2025 to share information with stakeholders about the process and the planning requirements, as well as to listen, and gather perspectives about how to get the planning right for the centre.

To effectively engage a diverse audience, a range of communication tools, messages, and materials were prepared in collaboration with the City. Key stakeholder groups included:

- State agencies
- Commercial landowners
- Community members
- Elected Members
- Senior Leadership Team

Communications materials were tailored to each stakeholder group according to their level of involvement and workshop participation. The full details of the comprehensive engagement activities and outcomes are provided in the attached Preliminary Engagement Outcomes Report.

The recommended next steps for planning of the Booragoon will include their own engagement phases. Feedback and statutory advertising will form part of the Structure Plan preparation and assessment process.

SUSTAINABILITY IMPLICATIONS

Planning and development within the precinct will be guided by principles that promote environmental, social, and economic sustainability, ensuring that the centre grows in a way that is resilient, efficient, and responsive to the needs of the community and future generations.

LEGISLATIVE AND POLICY ALIGNMENT

The City is required by legislation to review the existing Melville City Centre Structure Plan. A 10-year review of the Plan is currently due, with the WAPC directing that the review be completed by 2027. The proposed scope of works for the Structure Plan review aligns with statutory requirements.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Completion of the review of the Melville City Centre Structure Plan will require a combination of internal and external resources. Consultancy costs are estimated to require funding of \$250,000. Subject to Council's decision, it is proposed to request these funds through the 2026/2027 Budget.

CONSEQUENCE

The City is required to review the Booragoon (Melville City Centre) Precinct Plan. This item recommends an approach to complete the required review, while responding in detail to items raised from preliminary engagement. A more traditional ACP review approach could be pursued. However, this approach risks stakeholder misalignment and progress of a plan which may prove difficult to deliver. This could limit the City's ability to guide development, optimise precinct outcomes, and ensure delivery of well-integrated public realm, infrastructure, and community benefits.

Not adopting the staged approach may also delay engagement with key stakeholders, including State agencies, and restrict opportunities for coordinated development or strategic uplift. Development could occur in an ad hoc manner, potentially compromising precinct character, design quality, and long-term planning objectives.

Alternative approaches, such as delaying the review or proceeding without the staged, evidence-led methodology, would increase uncertainty, reduce control over outcomes, and elevate delivery risk. The City is required to complete the review of the Structure Plan by 2027. Not completing the review within the timeframe may result in:

- a) An outdated planning framework which may be given less regard by decision makers.
- b) The review and/or major amendments to the Structure Plan being undertaken by another landowner within the precinct.
- c) The Western Australian Planning Commission providing directions on alternative options to complete the review.

BRIEFING FORUM – FURTHER INFORMATION

At the Agenda Briefing Forum held on Tuesday, 10 February 2026 the following questions or requests for information were raised:

Question 1:

Could you please explain or give an example of the two envelope approach that is referred to in the report?

Response to Question 1:

The two envelope approach in the report references intensity of development subject to infrastructure upgrades and investment with the centre more broadly. Community feedback through the preliminary consultation indicated that there was an understanding and acceptance that the Booragoon Strategic Centre required density to meet the targets that are expected by the State Government, but for the community to accept the intensity of development it expected the infrastructure within the centre to be upgraded to withhold and sustain that intensity of development.

The two envelope approach provides an opportunity for the City to set density expectations at a lower range should the State Government and private sector not provide that level of expected investment, and should that level of expected investment eventuate, the City, Council and community can expect a high level of intensity. We're really trying to set benchmarks to ensure that the infrastructure for the area is commensurate to the intensity of development, as opposed to having the intensity of development and the infrastructure coming later.

Question 2:

So would we be seeking commitment from the State Government that they would invest in that infrastructure before we move forward with a certain density?

Response to Question 2:

There will be conversations had and hence the resolution has expectations to engage with the WAPC chair and the Minister for Planning, but it's not just the State Government, it's also the private sector. Scentre Group, Westfield are a major land owner within the centre and they have a key interest in the development outcomes and intensity of development within the centre. The community and the City also have a key interest in ensuring investment within the infrastructure that Westfield and Scentre Group own, so ensuring there is commensurate investment by the private sector and State Government, but also the local government as well with regard to footpaths, streetscapes and the like. All stakeholders have a key role to play in this centre to ensure its appropriate success depending on what intensity of development occurs.

Question 3:

Looking at the officer recommendation and the ACP review part (b), it says, "Built form recommendations will adopt a performance-based approach to height and massing with additional height being context appropriate". Does this mean our zoning will just be a temporary guide and the sky's the limit?

In part (a) and (b) I can't see anything in here about community benefit for so called performance-based approach to height, so are there going to be any controls or is it just going to be performance-based, and what are the community benefits?

Response to Question 3:

The response provided to Mr French earlier mentioned the Planning Regulations and changes that occurred in 2015. The City, through the Activity Centre Plan and precinct planning process, can set to understand and benchmark the height limits that are envisaged for the centre, however when applications are made and should they exceed those limits, decision makers such as the Development Assessment Panels or possibly the Western Australian Planning Commission do have the liberty to provide decisions that are higher than those anticipated through the structure planning or precinct planning process. That's legislation that is outside of the City's control and sphere of influence, and the nature of the planning legislation and framework in Western Australia is not something that we can augment at a local level. Notwithstanding, we can ensure that our plans are prepared in a robust manner, and that we undertake detailed community engagement and preliminary engagement – which was undertaken in this instance – to ensure that those expectations at a local level are understood and relayed across to the State Government and those decision makers. This also ensures that the plans are as robust as possible for when decision makers do have proposals before them, and that they are well informed by those local frameworks.

With regard to community benefit, the resolution is quite broad in its context and it speaks to a development being context appropriate. That does have regard for community benefit as well, and as part of the precinct planning process and guidelines, community benefits are a key consideration. If the City was to consider more intense development in the envelope B category, we would be expecting community benefits that are commensurate to the intensity of development as well.

Question 4:

So would this document be a due regard document, or what sort of category of document would it have?

Response to Question 4:

It would be a due regard document, as mentioned that's the way the Western Australian planning legislation is established. Notwithstanding precinct plans are a higher order document than another piece of planning instrument like a local planning policy for example. It's one of the highest orders of due regard documents that decision makers can have regard to.

Question 5:

How do we go about factoring in things like safety, congestion and traffic when we are required to meet State density targets?

Question 6:

What else can we do to address these issues that have been raised over and over and over again, not just by people in the Booragoon area but also around Melville Senior High School, around Santa Maria, around all the primary schools, what can we do to address that outside of the planning framework?

Question 7:

Whilst we have to meet these targets through the State Government's density targets, can we push back or advocate, or is there any other avenue that we can take to address our concerns and address these safety issues?

Response to Questions 5 to 7:

Broadly speaking we will be looking at traffic assessment and impact of any increased density, any infrastructure such as schools in that vicinity. Director Environment & Infrastructure will be looking at what we can do to work with the State Government and also private providers regarding traffic management and parking management around school precincts because that's something that's not just for the City of Melville to consider but it is a national issue and there have been papers and studies around that being a particularly difficult and challenging problem at the moment.

The Council Report on page 93 speaks to decision gates, and you will note that the precinct plan preparations in the City of Melville haven't necessarily undertaken the approach that's been proposed through this report and for this precinct. We've had a lot of community feedback through Local Planning Scheme 6, we've had a lot of community feedback through proposals around the Booragoon centre, particularly on Almondbury Road. As a result of that we've really taken stock through preliminary community engagement on this plan, we've also undertaken some technical investigations to inform where this prep plan preparation process will head. To quote a section of the report regarding decision gates:

"To ensure disciplined governance, manage community and State expectations, and avoid premature or unsupported planning outcomes, the review will proceed through four clearly defined decision gates. Each gate represents a formal checkpoint at which Council confirms direction before any further work progresses."

It's important that we note those different decision gates, engage with Council on those decision gates, and provide you appropriate technical information to guide us in the paths and directions that we take through this plan review.

There will also be work for Councillors to do at a State level to lobby your local members and the Ministers to make clear the community and City's expectations depending on the envelope that we choose this plan proceeds with.

Question 8:

We tried to get a meeting with a high school and they didn't want to discuss traffic concerns with the Council. When there's a situation where an education institution is not willing to take ownership of their students driving their cars to school and parking all over the surrounding streets, can we not go back and look at our policies and start doing no parking?

Question 9:

Can we start charging them to park their cars in the street to stop any future safety concerns?

Response to Questions 8 and 9:

There are traffic engineering controls that we have available to us regarding parking controls.

Question 10:

Is there a link or argument that can be made if we were to accept higher density and height limits in the Booragoon, Garden City Activity Centre?

Question 11:

In lieu of higher density in the surrounding residential suburbs, can the argument be made to concentrate that higher density and height limits in this commercial block?

Question 12:

What is the likelihood of WA Planning accepting that argument?

Response to Questions 10 to 12:

The intensity of development within the Booragoon precinct plan area will contribute towards the density targets for the City. Our engagement with the State Government is that density targets are a guide, and it may be 18 months or so ago now that the CEO, Director Planning and Deputy Mayor at the time, Cr G Barber, engaged with the Minister for Planning.

While intensity in our activity centres is a form of contribution towards density targets, other forms of density such as medium density anticipated within other parts of the City and adjacent to our activity centres are also considered important contributors towards the density target.

While we may consider more intense development in areas like Booragoon contributing a higher percentage to the density target, the State Government and particularly the current Minister for Planning has a view that there is a spectrum of density which needs to contribute towards those density targets.

It's not necessarily always apartment product, it may also be other lower forms of density such as medium density town houses or even aspects of lower density standard traditional suburban development as well.

Question 13:

Does the \$250,000 price tag take us all the way through to a final version of the Structure Plan?

Response to Question 13:

That is an estimate provided as part of the reporting. It will be subject to a tenders and quotations process which we can further engage with Council on through the budget process.

PURPOSE

This report makes recommendations of the proposed DRG members for Council’s endorsement following formal nomination and assessment by officers.

BACKGROUND

The City reviewed LPP1.2 in June 2023 and then subsequently under delegation appointed a new panel for two years with their term expiring in late 2025. The City has temporarily extended the existing panel’s tenure to facilitate the proposed revised structure and appointment process which considers alignment with the State Government’s new Guide to Local Government’s Design Review Guide which was released in June 2025.

Whilst the City’s LPP1.2 still under review (due to be presented to the Policy and Legislation Committee in Feb 2026 and then Council in March 2026), the City is proposing to rename the Design Review Panel to the DRG to remove association with the Development Assessment Panel (DAP) as the DRG provides advice only to assessing officers and decision makers. The City is also seeking to align with other local governments and have the DRG appointed by Council given the importance and value of the advice that the DRG provides assessing officers and decision makers.

The City sought expressions of interest from suitably qualified and experienced built environment professionals and academics, as well as community representatives with an interest in planning and development matters to join the DRG, previously known as the City's DRP. The City advised in the expression of interest that there is preference for local group members given their greater appreciation of context as residents.

The DRG is responsible for reviewing major development applications, major City projects and providing independent design advice to the City on a range of strategic planning matters. The DRG does not make any decisions on applications, nor does it liaise directly with applicants and other interested parties. The advice provided by the DRG is used to assist the applicants in refining and enhancing the planning proposals and by the City's officers in informing recommendations to decision makers.

The City intends to establish a core group of built environment professionals, including a Chairperson, Deputy Chairperson with at least one member being a community representative, for a two-year term. The City also intends to establish a list of sessional DRG members who have expertise in specific areas (see below list of areas) to enable greater breadth of advice where relevant and also to provide back-up members in case of conflict-of-interest or availability issues.

CONSIDERATION

Recruitment and Selection

Appointment to the DRG pool is subject to Council's approval of the City's recommend candidates. Prospective members applied to be part of the City's DRG through EOI process conducted by the City in late 2025 with documents used in the EOI process run in accordance with the attached Terms of Reference and in accordance with the State Government's Local Government Design Review Guide provided as Attachment 1. Invitations for EOI to join the DRG were advertised via local newspaper, website and social media with the EOI closing on Monday 8 December 2025. The City received 23 expressions of interest to join the City's DRG.

Each member is proposed to be appointed for a two-year term. Member expertise may include but not be limited to:

- Architecture
- Landscape Architecture
- Urban Design
- Planning
- Heritage
- Sustainability (including environmental design, systems ecology, urban water expertise)
- Accessibility and universal design
- Public and population health
- Transport planning
- Civil, structural and services engineering
- Public art

The EOI criteria was formulated in accordance with the State Government's Local Government Design Review Manual. The City's officers reviewed the applicants' submissions against the following selection criteria:

- Appropriate qualifications and demonstrated expertise in the relevant professional area.
- Ability to work in a multi-disciplinary team.
- Highly regarded among professional peers or community.
- Demonstrated expertise in design review, design critique or the provision of strategic advice on design quality issues.
- Knowledge or understanding of the State's Planning Framework, relevant local government policies, development controls and design issues in the local area.
- Ability to analyse, evaluate and offer objective and constructive feedback on complex design quality issues in design review, for evaluation of complex development applications and on strategic planning matters.
- Good written and verbal communication to ensure that advice provided to proponents is clear and concise.
- Where relevant, it is desirable that the applicant is eligible for registration with an appropriate professional body or organisation in Western Australia and/or holds good standing with the relevant professional body.

Additional criteria were provided within the manual for DRG Chairpersons, which is a demonstrated ability to:

- Ability to lead and facilitate meetings, including time management and strong verbal communication skills.
- Ability to manage strong or conflicting views in meetings.
- Highly developed written communication skills.

The aim was to have six core members and up to eight sessional members available within the DRG pool to be able to draw on the necessary skills required depending on the nature of the proposal being reviewed, ensure that conflicts of interest can be avoided and there is good availability to ensure a quorum of group members (which is three members).

Recommendation

Assessment of the applicants was undertaken by a panel of senior staff members who regularly engage with the Design Review process against the selection criteria. The panel was unanimous in their initial recommendation of the proposed DRG members and proposed Chair and Deputy Chair with the City's recommended core group members outlined in Attachment 2 of this report. This recommendation was altered from the initial decision based on further consideration of community concerns in relation to traffic safety in new substantial developments and therefore the recommendation was altered to include a traffic engineer specialist within the core group. The resultant recommendation is for seven core members comprising of:

- Two x Urban Designers
- A landscape architect
- An Architect who is also a local resident
- An Architect who is both practicing and an academic
- An Architect who is highly experienced
- A Transport Engineer

It is noted that there were additional applicants who are not recommended to be part of the City's DRG due to either not having appropriate qualification and expertise or not having enough relevant experience. However, should the Council wish to appoint alternate panellists, the other applicants are provided within Attachment 4 of this report.

Following Council consideration of the DRG selection, the members will be notified and if they accept then the DRG membership will be appointed and unsuccessful candidates notified. The final list of DRG members will be published online.

ENGAGEMENT

As this is an appointment process, there was not a Stakeholder Engagement process undertaken.

SUSTAINABILITY IMPLICATIONS

This is an appointment recommendation and therefore there are no direct Sustainability implications.

LEGISLATIVE AND POLICY ALIGNMENT

The City has given consideration to the selection criteria contained in clause 3.1 of the new Local Government Design Review Manual in its recommendation of DRG members. As well as proposed amendments to the City's Local Planning Policy 1.2 – Design Review with regard to the size and operational requirements of the DRG. The DRG will use the ten principles of good design outlined in State Planning Policy 7.0 – Design of the Built Environment to provide advice to applicants and officers.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

As per section 3.1 of the guide, and the City's Design Review Terms of Reference, a sitting fee is payable to each DRG member for preparation and attendance at the meeting. In accordance with Local Planning Policy 1.2 – Design Review Panel, the sitting fee is reviewed annually.

Remuneration of panel members is accounted for within the operational budget for Statutory Planning.

CONSEQUENCE

If Council does not elect to appoint the City's recommended, or alternative DRG members, the existing panel will be required to be retained to ensure that there is suitable coverage to review ongoing items. The existing panel was endorsed by the Chief Executive Officer as per the requirements of the current Local Planning Policy 1.2 – Design Review Panel.

BRIEFING FORUM – FURTHER INFORMATION

At the Agenda Briefing Forum held on Tuesday, 10 February 2026 the following questions or requests for information were raised:

Question 1:

Is an urban designer the same as an urban planner?

Response to Question 1:

An urban designer has skills associated with localised outcomes at the streetscape level, as well as human scale interaction between private development and the public realm. They have skills closely associated with architecture but not necessarily defined to a single building, particularly the interaction of those buildings with the public realm. Urban planners on the other hand have skills associated with urban design, which are generally around the process of developing plans. This is much broader than just the interface between the public and private realms – it also accounts for community consultation, infrastructure requirements and statutory planning processes.

COUNCIL'S ROLE

Legislative: Includes adopting local laws, town planning schemes & policies.

SUMMARY

- A request has been received to re-zone a portion of land adjoining the Alchera Living (Weeronga Retirement Village) from a reserve for Public Open Space (POS) (Winnacott Reserve) Lot 12759 (No. 33) Worley Street, Willagee, to Residential R60.
- The land was originally part of Winnacott Reserve. In 2017, Council permitted the use of the land to provide temporary site access to a proposed four storey apartment building at the retirement village. The temporary access was secured via an easement.
- Alchera Living subsequently sought to purchase the accessway land. In February 2021, Council resolved to seek public comment on the proposal to dispose of the portion of Winnacott Reserve.
- At its meeting of 15 June 2021 (P21/3920) Council considered the results of the public comment period and resolved to support the transfer of the ownership of the land to Alchera Living, approve the relinquishment of the Management Order over the portion of reserve and to support the amalgamation of the land into the adjoining site. Sale of the land from Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage to Alchera Living has subsequently progressed. A condition of the sale requires the purchaser to progress an amendment to rezone the land to Residential R60.
- An application has now been received to formalise the change in the reservation of the land as Public Open Space to Residential R60. The application is largely administrative given the previous Council support for the disposal and the progress of the land transaction.
- Accordingly the scheme amendment is considered to be a "basic amendment". Adoption of the amendment is recommended. It is further recommended that Alchera Living be requested to undertake improvements to the interface between the accessway land and the adjoining reserve with respect to fencing and drainage.

BACKGROUND

The City of Melville (City) has received an application for an amendment to LPS6 to amend a portion of Lot 12759 (No. 33) Worley Street (Winnacott Reserve) from Public Open Space to Residential R60. The subject site will be amalgamated into the Alchera Weeronga retirement village. The subject site is occupied by an existing vehicle accessway. The accessway provides vehicular access to the retirement village on Lot 50 from Worley Street.

This item relates to a portion of land adjacent to the southern boundary of Winnacott Reserve. In 2017 Council permitted the use of the land to provide temporary site access to a proposed four storey apartment building at the retirement village. The temporary access was secured via an easement from the Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage.

Alchera Living subsequently sought to purchase the accessway land for inclusion into their wider landholding. In February 2021, the Council resolved to seek public comment on the proposal to dispose of the portion of Winnacott Reserve:

“That the Council:

- 1. Notes that the City of Melville administration does not support the relinquishment of its Management Order over the portion of Winnacott Reserve 24683 being approximately 494 sqm in size which is currently subject to a temporary access easement granted to Alchera Living Inc. by the City of Melville which expires on 30 September 2022. Further noting that the subject portion of land forms part of the Winnacott Recreation Reserve and is zoned “Public Open Space” under LPS6;***
- 2. Requests the Chief Executive Officer to instruct officers to commence a community engagement process detailing the request by Alchera Living Inc. for the City to relinquish its Management Order over the portion of the Reserve (currently subject to the temporary access easement) to facilitate Alchera’s proposed acquisition of the land parcel in freehold from the State Government;***
- 3. Requests that the Chief Executive Officer Report back to Council on the community engagement feedback and submissions with a final recommendation to Council on whether or not the City should relinquish its Management Order over the portion of the Reserve and the Chief Executive Officer to advise Alchera Living Inc. of Council’s decision; and***
- 4. If Council does not approve the relinquishment of the Management Order, the Chief Executive Office is to extend the term of the temporary access easement to Alchera Living Inc. for a period of time not exceeding the life of the existing “Weeronga Village” residential accommodation situated at 40-44 Worley Street, Willagee, subject to Alchera Living Inc. at its own cost constructing a living wall (along the northern boundary of the access easement adjoining Winnacott Reserve) including substantial community artwork which reflects the cultural and historical significance of the area.”***

Following community engagement, a further report was presented to the Council on 15 June 2021 (P21/3920) where it was resolved:

“That the Council:

1. Advise:

- a) ***Alchera Living Inc. and the Department of Planning Lands and Heritage that it endorses the requested relinquishment of the City’s Management Order over the portion of Winnacott Reserve currently a temporary easement, for amalgamation into the adjoining privately owned site.***
 - b) ***Alchera Living Inc. of the opportunity and need to work with the City’s Officers and the broader community to refine the proposed boundary treatments to the Weeronga Village site, Willagee.***
2. ***Supports the extension of the access easement for construction purposes only for future stages of redevelopment on Weeronga Village, 40 – 44 Worley Street, Willagee upon submission of a DA prior to October 2022 (the expiry of the access easement); and***
 3. ***Supports the accessway easement, with the fencing retained until the land acquisition process has been completed.”***

The sale of the subject land has progressed, and the land has since been amalgamated into the wider Alchera Living site. The proposed scheme amendment is a condition of the sale of the land between Alchera Living and DPLH.

CONSIDERATION

The Scheme Amendment proposes to rezone the subject land to ‘Residential’ Zone with a density of ‘R60’ consistent with the current zoning of the remainder of the Alchera Living site.

The decision to support the sale of the land and to remove it from Winnacott Reserve has already been made by Council. Sale of the land to Alchera Living has now progressed.

The Scheme Amendment application normalises the situation resulting from the disposal of the portion of the Reserve. The Residential R60 zoning is in keeping with the wider Alchera Living site. Adoption of the Scheme Amendment is recommended. The Scheme Amendment is also considered to fall within the definition of a “Basic” amendment and accordingly a public advertising period is not required.





It is noted that the general appearance of the subject land is at a lower standard than the remainder of the Alchera Living site (chain link fencing, no landscaping). In considering the current application it is recommended that the landowner be requested to address the standard of fencing and landscaping.

ENGAGEMENT

The proposed scheme amendment is considered to represent a “basic” amendment and accordingly no additional advertising is proposed.

A summary of the 2021 advertising associated with the disposal of the portion of Reserve is provided for information:

Letters to residents and sporting clubs within proximity of the site including all of Worley Street, Winnacott Street and the Archibald Street centre. Residents (154), absent landowners (73)

- Onsite signage
- Direct email to sample of Willagee residents
- About Melville advertising in Melville Gazette – 25th March 2021
- Melville Talks with submissions closing Monday - 19th April 2021
- City of Melville Facebook post

A total of 83 submissions were received with 44 (53%) supporting the proposal and 39 (47%) not supporting the proposal. Of the 44 (53%) supporting votes, 32 (73%) are Alchera Living residents, with 12 (27%) non Alchera residents. Of the 39 (47%) not supporting the proposal, 1 was an Alchera resident with the remaining 38 as non-Alchera residents. The supporting Alchera Living resident's submissions mostly reflected their desire to have another exit in case of emergency and the main gate was blocked.

No engagement has been undertaken in relation to the proposed scheme amendment. The access way has been in place since 2018, and the amendment represents a formalisation of an easement and condition of the agreement of sale between Alchera and the DPLH/Department of Lands. As such, it is considered a "Basic" amendment under the Part 5 of the Regulations in that it is *"an amendment to the scheme so that it is consistent with a region planning scheme that applies to the scheme area if the amendment will have minimal effect on the scheme or landowners in the scheme area"*. Note, the Western Australian Planning Commission (WAPC) may, upon application, instruct the City to undertake advertising if it considers the amendment a "standard" or "complex" amendment.

SUSTAINABILITY IMPLICATIONS

The negative sustainability implications have been previously reported in that the accessway has resulted in the reduction of POS from Winnacott Reserve, the removal of a mature tree and increase in hardstand area. The positive sustainability aspects include additional access and parking to a higher density retirement village which provides housing diversity in Willagee.

LEGISLATIVE AND POLICY ALIGNMENT

An amendment to LPS6 requires a resolution of the Council to initiate the process, including the commencement of advertising. Procedures are specified by the *Planning and Development (Local Planning Schemes) Regulations 2015*.

The Regulations state if the Council decides the amendment is "basic" then public advertising is not required and a report and recommendation is presented to the WAPC for consideration. A basic amendment includes changes which are of a minor or administrative nature, or which bring the scheme in line with other planning instruments.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no budget impacts incurred by this proposed scheme amendment.

CONSEQUENCE

Should the Council decide not to initiate the amendment, the applicant is able to seek the intervention of the Minister for Planning under Section 76 of the Planning and Development Act 2005. The Minister can order the City to proceed with public advertising and/or adoption of the amendment.

Council may consider that the amendment is beyond the definition of a "basic" amendment. In these circumstance the Council would be required to decide whether or not to initiate the scheme amendment for the purposes of advertising.

BRIEFING FORUM – FURTHER INFORMATION

At the Agenda Briefing Forum held on Tuesday, 10 February 2026 the following questions or requests for information were raised:

Question 1:

In your dealings with Alchera Living, have they actually indicated that they are willing to engage with the community and City about the proposed boundary treatments in this area and access way?

Response to Question 1:

As part of processing the scheme amendment application, we as officers have noted the poor appearance of the access way and have sought to seek improvements to the appearance of the land. To date, we have not had any support from the consultants that we're dealing with to achieve that, and therefore via the officer recommendation we are seeking to formalise that through a request.

Question 2:

Can you help me with some amendments to this motion?

Response to Question 2:

The scheme amendment process is relatively limited in what we can do, but we can use the procedure to formalise a request to the applicant, asking that they attend to what is currently a fairly poor outcome in terms of the interface to the park. The landowner concerned is likely to put in future development applications, and those applications might give us a better opportunity to enforce improvements. So yes, there would be an opportunity to expand on the officer's recommendation to submit a request to Alchera Living in this case and ensure the issue is well known. As future development applications are received by the City we could more formally explore opportunities for improvement.

Question 3:

Is there any way the landowner can use that access way they want for a road to put a development on there?

Response to Question 3:

The portion of land is owned freehold now by Alchera Living. It is effectively part of their land and is no longer part of the reserve, so the current reservation of the land as public open space does need to be attended to. It would be very open in the long-term for the landowner to explore development on that site.

For the medium-term, our understanding is that they intend to use the access way as an alternative driveway for further apartment construction on their site. The dwellings immediately adjoining the access way are probably the newest built form in that particular village, and indications are that there are no plans to redevelop that portion of the site. In the long-term it is freehold land, and subject to this amendment it would be zoned for development, although the reality is that would be some time later.

Question 4:

In relation to the report and officer recommendation, there is a line which says the proposed scheme amendment is a condition of the sale of the land between Alchera Living and DPLH. Does that mean if the scheme amendment was not approved then the sale of the land doesn't actually take place if it's a condition?

Response to Question 4:

To our understanding it was a requirement of the sale, but it wasn't linked to a requirement being met pre-settlement. Condition might not be the correct term to use, though it was an obligation of the owner to sort it out; it wasn't a requirement to be done before settlement.

Question 5:

Would Council have the option of declining to progress the scheme amendment, and requesting that they make improvements to the appearance of the driveway prior to us considering any request for a scheme amendment?

Response to Question 5:

The options for Council in dealing with this application are to, as recommended, adopt the scheme amendment as a basic amendment and refer it directly to the Western Australian Planning Commission. Secondly, Council could consider it a standard amendment and seek to advertise the amendment, or thirdly Council could also seek to not initiate the amendment, although by not initiating the amendment the landowner may seek recourse. There are also governance issues associated with leaving a portion of reserved land in private ownership, but it is an option for Council.

Question 6:

Can we amend part 2 by using the word "require" as opposed to "request", or are we limited in what we can expect them to do?

Response to Question 6:

The scheme amendment process limits our ability, hence why we've used the term "request". Should the request not be followed through by the landowner, we would still have opportunities as future development applications are submitted for other development on the site. We're hopeful that we can make the request and gain some improvements upfront.

Question 7:

If Council were not to support the officer recommendation, how will this impact Alchera Living?

Response to Question 7:

There would be little immediate effect, however there would be more with the long-term use of the land. As highlighted previously, it would result in a governance issue where we have a portion of privately owned land reserved for public open space, and this would create an anomaly and potential complications. In the short-term it wouldn't have a huge impact on the landowner, and officers expect that the landowner would explore other avenues to resolve the anomaly.

Additionally, under the consequences section of the report it states:

"Should Council decide not to initiate the scheme amendment, the applicant is able to seek the intervention of the Minister for Planning under section 76 of the Planning and Development Act, and the Minister can order the City to proceed with public advertising and/or adoption of the amendment."

Full support for Food Organics / Garden Organic Systems

Category – Environment

Motion

This National General Assembly calls on the Australian Government to provide \$200M support for Local Government and the Resource Recovery Industry to implement new, and improve existing, FOGO systems including by investing in infrastructure, market development and community education and behaviour change.

National Objective (max 100 words)

The National Waste Policy Action Plan (2024) includes targets of 80% average resource recovery rate from all waste streams and halving the amount of organic waste to landfill by 2030. For Local Governments, where it is feasible, one of the key approaches is implementing a Food Organic Garden Organic (FOGO) system. However, Local Governments ability to implement FOGO is undermined by contamination, limited processing infrastructure and market acceptance. Consistent support is needed from the Australian Government to address these issues.

Summary of Key Arguments (max 150 words)

Funding from some State Governments has assisted Local Government to implement FOGO and there has been Australian and State Government funding for some infrastructure development.

For Local Government to implement FOGO there are initial infrastructure costs as well as ongoing community education. Community education and behaviour change is vital to the success of FOGO to mitigate risks of contamination and ensure a quality end product. Without market acceptance and confidence in quality of the product, Local Government cannot implement FOGO. Emerging contaminants, like PFAS, cause further concerns with product use.

A sustained funding Program from the Australian Government would ensure Local Governments who have either implemented FOGO, or are progressing implementation, can address these issues and contribute to achievement of the national targets.

Motion Subject: Local Government as a key partner in Biosecurity

Category – Environment

Motion

This National General Assembly calls on the Australian Government to:

- Reform the National Environmental Biosecurity Response Agreement, and associated arrangements, to include Local Government as key partners
- Fund the long-term management and containment of the Polyphagous shot-hole borer (PSHB) to protect urban canopy and biodiversity across Australia.

National Objective (max 100 words)

Local Governments are on the front line of biosecurity. However, are not included in the national response structure or funding arrangements. This weakens any response effort, as decisions about feasibility and funding for eradication of new biosecurity threats (e.g. Polyphagous shot-hole borer) are made with very limited engagement with Local Government. Eradication of PSHB has failed and now long-term containment and effective management is the only option. If PSHB spreads outside the current Quarantine Area (QA) the potential impact on urban canopy and biodiversity across Australia will be considerable.

Summary of Key Arguments (max 150 words)

The National Environmental Biosecurity Response Agreements were established with the agricultural sector and currently include only Australian and State/Territory Governments and the agricultural sector.

As biosecurity threats extend beyond agriculture, including PSHB and H5 Bird Flu, the national framework must evolve to formally include Local Government as a key partner. Local Governments have critical on-ground expertise and experience, not utilising this undermines the effectiveness of any response.

This issue has been demonstrated in Western Australia with the PSHB response. The State Government were unable to share detailed information with the sector as the information is covered by confidentiality provisions in the national Agreements.

PSHB, an invasive beetle species, poses as significant risk to Urban Canopy and biodiversity and must be contained within the QA. To achieve this a sustained national response is needed.

This report provides commentary on the year-to-date variances identified in attachment 6002B –Statement of Financial Activity by Nature, for the period ended 31 December 2025.

In accordance with Regulation 34(5) of the Local Government (Financial Management) Regulations 1996, a local government is required each financial year, to adopt a percentage or value to be used in statements of financial activity for the reporting of material variances. The City’s Accounting Policy CP-025, indicates that this will occur each year when adopting the annual budget. When adopting the 2025-2026 Annual Budget, a level of 10% or \$100,000 (whichever is the greater) was adopted for the reporting of material variances for the 2025-2026 financial year. Variances less than 10% or \$100,000 are not considered material and are not detailed in this report.

Variances are based on ‘Actual’ income raised and expenditure incurred, compared to the Year-to-Date Revised Budget, and are shown in the Year-to-Date Budget Variance column in the tables below. The main reasons for the variances are outlined in this report.

In the tables below, positive variances are shown in black coloured font, and negative variances are shown in both parentheses and in red coloured font, i.e. (XXX.XX). These tables refer to the applicable nature and type variance.

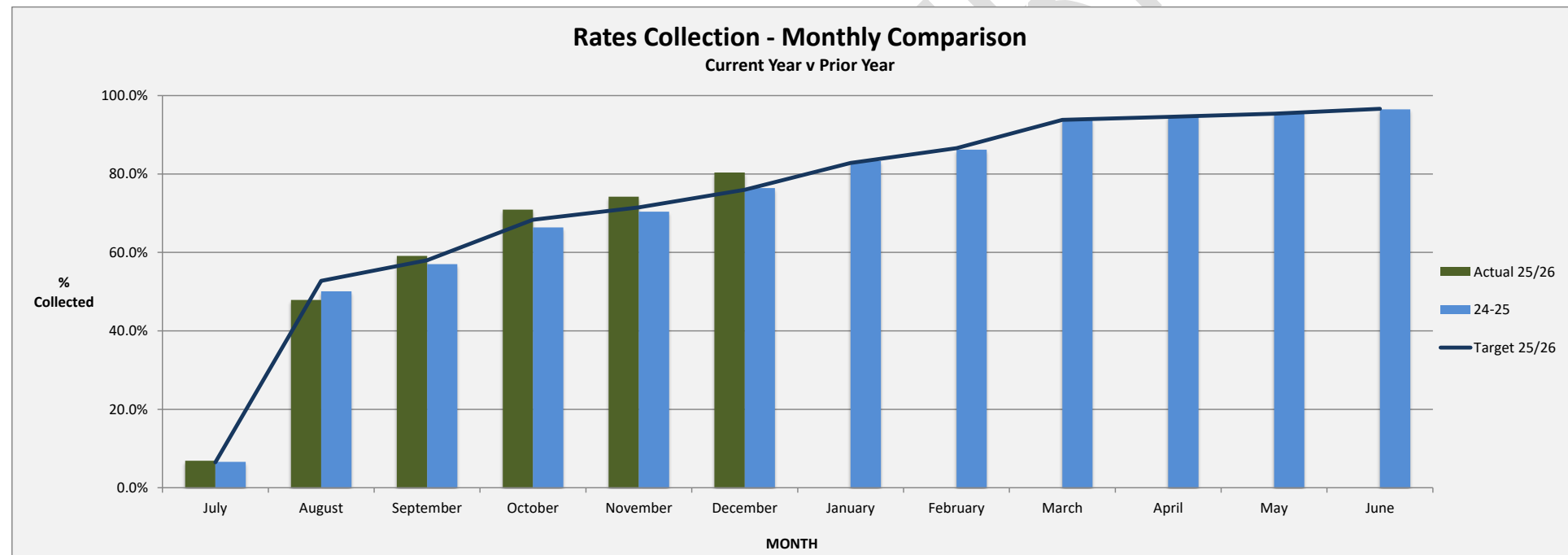

Remember Me Bench/Spaces - Bench/Spaces used as a means of assisting people to grieve for loved ones. The space would not include specific names rather a commemorative/reflective phrase and be funded by the City

Personal Memorials - A physical object such as a tree or memorial bench, which incorporates a named plaque, used as a way of commemorating the life of individual.

Policy Statement

1. General

In general, no personal memorials will be installed within City of Melville POS.

Four Remember Me Bench/Spaces will be installed and funded by the City at the following locations.

- Point Walter Reserve
- Jeff Joseph Reserve
- Deep Water Point
- Bicton Quarantine Park

2. Existing Personal Memorials

Personal memorials installed prior to the commencement of this Policy shall be retained in-situ, until they are no longer safe, fit for purpose or are required to be removed for operational purposes.

Additional plaques may be added to an existing memorial bench, at the discretion of the City.

3. Other Memorials

War Memorials (like the Wireless Hill Memorial, Vyner Brooke Memorial, or Point Walter memorial Avenue) and Cultural Memorials (like the Stolen Generation Memorial) or new requests in this category are not included in this Policy.

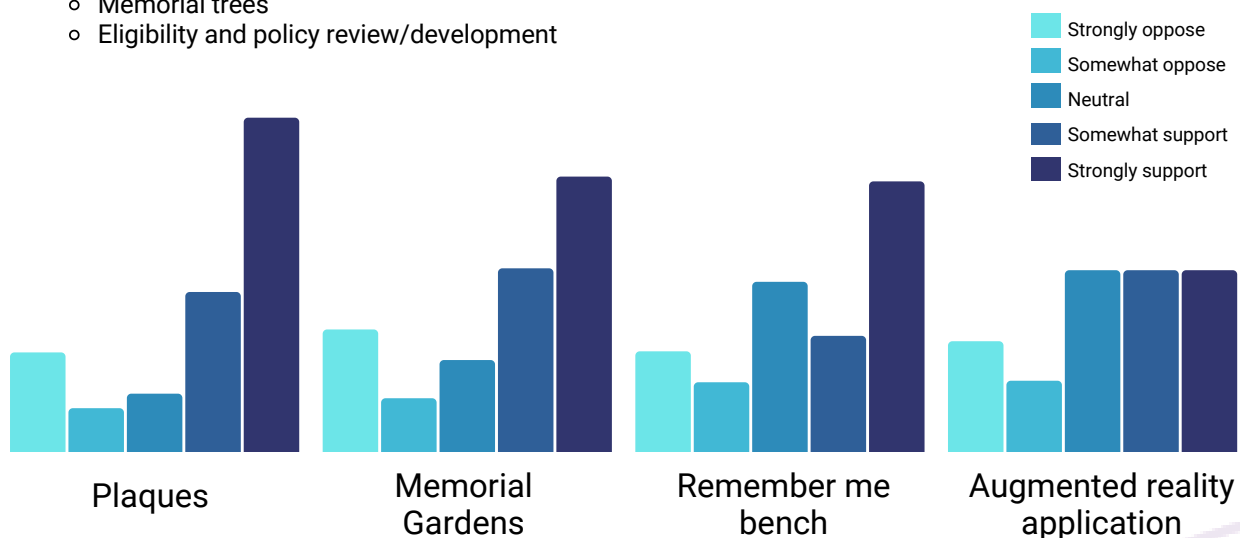

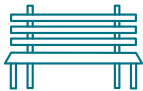
The community shared a wide range of opinions and suggestions. These have been grouped under three categories.

Local Government Examples: Investigate and consider other Councils memorial services and spaces.

"Glenelg in South Australia has a nice memorial arrangement at the pier. It has spots for multiple names. This could be an opportunity as it was respectful and aesthetically pleasing".

"Check out Mosman Park wall overlooking river. Residents can purchase a plaque to commemorate their loved ones. It is a beautiful spot and done so well"

"Fencing where residents are able to place what is called a love lock. A lock in remembrance of a deceased loved on/person with a connection to the area. Concept from Perth Bell Tower which has love locks on display"



Policy and Management: Suggestions for review of management and cost, including criteria, regulations and eligibility.

"Rather than just saying there are no more benches, council should look to create more opportunities for memorial plaques within our city public spaces e.g. along the edges of our river jetty's"

"There definitely needs to be a limitation on the number of benches and memorial plaques at public park locations as there was clearly a time when it got out of hand such as Quarantine Park Bicton where it has become a park of benches."

"I don't believe ratepayers money (even indirectly through just allocation of resources to arrange a plaque etc) or council resources should be invested in memorials."



Other Types of Memorials: Various suggestions for alternative memorial types to the four suggested.

"Creation of a bridge of memories in a park or foreshore which is constructed to enable adornment of heart shaped locks engraved with the name of a loved one who has passed".

"As I get older I feel this topic is quite significant. They don't need to be prominent but subtle and indiscreet. That should be possible. It just has to be of significance to the family/friends".

"Memorial seeds planted with a choice of a flower/tree".

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Executive summary

The City of Melville, in collaboration with Element Advisory part of SLR and Align Strategy + Projects, undertook preliminary engagement to inform the future review of the current Melville City Centre Structure Plan (MCCSP) (which will likely then be named the Booragoon Precinct Structure Plan (PSP)), and a Master Plan for the City's landholdings within the Structure Plan area.

The purpose of this early engagement ahead of a PSP was to:

- Help inform stakeholders of the PSP process
- Discuss what is expected of a Secondary Activity Centre
- Explore key opportunities and challenges for the planning process to inform future studies
- Determine aspirations for the area, understand sentiment and buy-in to inform future process
- Explore the opportunity for the City's landholdings in the context of the broader centre

The process was one of informing, knowledge sharing, listening and managing expectations. The key findings from this early engagement have helped to inform and develop scopes of work for both the PSP and Master Plan for the City's land.

'Where Are We Planning For?

There are several terms used within this report and the planning framework for the same area and planning tool.

The 'Melville City Centre' and 'Booragoon City Centre' (BCC) are used interchangeably to refer to the same area. A 'Structure Plan' or 'Precinct Structure Plan' are also used interchangeably, to refer to the type planning document that will define future built form and use for the area. The Melville City Centre Structure Plan (MCCSP) is the current plan in place, which will be reviewed as the next step in this process, to create a revised plan, likely to be called and referred to herein as the 'Booragoon City Centre Precinct Structure Plan' (BCCPSP).

Why Did We Engage?

The Booragoon City Centre is a designated Secondary Centre under State Planning Policy 4.2 and is set to undergo change, including the proposed Westfield Booragoon Shopping Centre and a new \$60 million Library and Cultural Centre. The existing MCCSP, developed in 2013, requires a review to guide future development, align with State and local planning objectives, and unlock opportunities for coordinated public and private investment.

We engaged in order to share knowledge and help inform stakeholders of this process, to help increase understanding and awareness ahead of a PSP process, and shape that process based on key findings. It was also to listen to early opportunities to help inform the future PSP and Master Plan approaches.

Key Findings

The key findings of the engagement were:

- **Planning and Process Clarity:** Stakeholders sought clear communication on planning boundaries, structure plan terminology, and coordination with other initiatives such as the Local Planning Scheme No. 6 review. Clarity was also sought on the nature and depth of the review required.
- **Redevelopment and Identity:** There were mixed views on the identity of the precinct (e.g., Booragoon vs Garden City), concerns over redevelopment delays for Westfield Booragoon Shopping Centre and views on the need for strong leadership and vision from the City.
- **Public Realm and Green Space:** Community and agency feedback highlighted the need for increased green space, tree canopy, and pedestrian-friendly public spaces for a diverse range of community needs. There was broad support for better integration with Wireless Hill across all stakeholders.
- **Density and Housing Diversity:** There was a desire for diverse housing types, including affordable and specialist accommodation, whilst maintaining the character of surrounding suburbs. Concerns were raised about infrastructure capacity and the impact of increased density.
- **Transport and Accessibility:** Feedback pointed to the need for improved public transport integration, better connectivity with nearby train stations, safer pedestrian and cycling access and early traffic planning at both a regional and local scale.
- **Economic and Social Activation:** Stakeholders supported a stronger day-night economy, more entertainment and dining options, and improved retail offerings to revitalise the precinct and attract investment.
- **City Landholdings:** The City is expected to lead by example, with a strong vision required for use of City landholdings which could be used for civic, cultural, residential and activation-based uses. A clear Master Plan is needed to guide development and attract investment.
- **Stakeholder understanding:** There are varied levels of acceptance and understanding about the review of the planning framework for the BCC. Many understand the need for a review, given the perceived lack of investment in the centre. However, there is further work to do in determining State direction on Secondary Activity Centre expectations, as well as helping stakeholders, particularly community, understand the role of a PSP in the planning framework, and the need for change, along with consideration of density.

Next Steps

The findings will be used to inform the scope of the Melville City Centre Structure Plan review and the development of a Master Plan for the City's land. Ongoing stakeholder engagement, particularly with State agencies, commercial landowners, and the broader community, will be critical to ensuring alignment and a shared vision for the City Centre's future.

1. Introduction

1.1 Purpose

On behalf of the City of Melville (the City), Element Advisory part of SLR (Element Advisory) in partnership with Align Strategy + Projects (Align), were appointed to undertake preliminary stakeholder engagement with key stakeholders regarding the Booragoon City Centre to inform scopes for the future comprehensive review of the Melville City Centre Structure Plan (MCCSP) and a Master Plan for the City landholdings.

This report details the outcomes of the preliminary engagement, analysing the results of workshops and key stakeholder meetings held with selected members of the local community, landowners, as well as the City's Executive Leadership Team and Elected Members. The findings of these workshops will be used to draft the scopes referred to above.

The purpose of this early engagement ahead of a PSP was to:

- Help inform stakeholders of the PSP process
- Discuss what is expected of a Secondary Activity Centre
- Explore key opportunities and challenges for the planning process to inform future studies
- Determine aspirations for the area, understand sentiment and buy-in to inform future process
- Explore the opportunity for the City's landholdings in the context of the broader centre

The process was one of informing, knowledge sharing, listening and managing expectations. The key findings from this early engagement have helped to inform and develop scopes of work for both the PSP and Master Plan for the City's land.

1.2 Project Overview

The Booragoon City Centre precinct is approximately 38 hectares, and encompasses the Westfield Booragoon shopping centre, substantial land owned by the City and a range of other commercial and residential landholdings. The precinct is a major retail destination for the region as well as being an important civic and commercial point of activity for residents and visitors including the City's administration offices/building. This aligns with its status as a 'Secondary Centre' under State Planning Policy 4.2 Activity Centres (SPP 4.2).

The area is subject to a number of proposals with the potential to significantly transform the precinct, including the expansion of Westfield Booragoon Shopping Centre, and the City's plans for a \$60 million library and cultural centre. It is important that this transformation is guided by an agreed, contemporary plan for the centre that is built around a clear and common vision.

Booragoon City Centre has been the subject of significant development interest since 2013, when the Melville City Centre Structure Plan (MCCSP) was developed. As the guiding planning framework for the area for the past decade, the MCCSP has shaped land use, development standards and urban design. The City intend to initiate a review to evaluate the existing framework and ensure that it aligns with future growth opportunities and addresses emerging challenges. The review is anticipated to commence during 2025.

Concurrently, the City has recognised the opportunity to have a clear vision for its own landholdings within the City Centre via a Master Plan, expected to explore potential redevelopment and community-focused projects.

The MCCSP set out a bold vision for the precinct in 2014:

“...that will see our current civic library site transformed into an exciting new cultural centre. The future Melville City Centre will be a place for people to gather and connect, experience culture, arts, events, entertainment and excellent dining, and will be a place to enjoy and celebrate with friends and family.”

The Booragoon PSP, through the review process, will replace the MCCSP and establish ‘a’ vision for ‘the’ future. Both the PSP and Master Plan will be guided by a range of statutory and strategic documents and processes and ensure a contemporary, fit for purpose planning framework for the Booragoon City Centre.

1.3 Project Scope

The scope of this preliminary engagement project has included:

- Preparation of a Stakeholder Engagement Plan (SEP) to guide and coordinate inputs and plan an engagement process with key stakeholders. This includes identifying stakeholders, communication methods, key messages, engagement activities, and a schedule of activities.
- Preparation of communications collateral and supporting the City to issue invitations and monitor and management RSVPs and attendance numbers across the engagement series.
- Planning, design and facilitation of key stakeholder workshop and meetings.
- Preparation of an engagement outcomes report analysing the findings from the engagement, and both workshops and briefings to Elected Members (EM) and City’s Executive Leadership Team (ELT).
- Utilising the outcomes of engagement for preparation of two scopes of work for a review of the MCCSP (and preparation of the Booragoon PSP) and preparation of a Master Plan for the City’s land.

2. Engagement approach and methodology

This section provides an overview of the activities undertaken, and provides details of the key themes that underpinned communications and the methods of communication used to promote the engagement process.

This section also details the project's engagement objectives, methodology and participation in engagement between December 2024 and July 2025 in accordance with an approved Stakeholder Engagement Plan by the City.

2.1 Engagement Objectives

The following engagement objectives were agreed with the City at commencement of the project:

- Ensure adequate communication channels to provide information and opportunities to be involved, now or in the coming review, for all relevant stakeholders.
- Provide stakeholders with clear information regarding the function and purpose of the PSP and Master Plan, its place within the planning framework, and the intention of the project.
- Identify stakeholders and understand the nature of their interest and potential to contribute towards the success of the project.
- Establish early in the project opportunities to have authentic conversations with people, particularly those the PSP Review and Master Plan will affect and relevant government agencies.
- Educate stakeholders as to the vision and opportunities within the Booragoon City Centre, and obligations for the PSP and State Government expectations. This includes Elected Members and Executive Leadership, particularly in regard to the City landholdings.
- Understand the issues, opportunities, concerns and constraints regarding the Booragoon City Centre. Ascertain how stakeholders would

like to be engaged in the future with regards to the Review process, including format and frequency of engagement.

- Record feedback and prepare an Engagement Outcomes report for the City to review.

2.2 Context Review

As part of the engagement planning process, the project team undertook a desktop review to understand the context for the project and highlight key issues relevant to the engagement process. These were documented in the Stakeholder Engagement Plan, noting the following key takeaways:

- **Built Form and Activity Centre role:** As a designated Secondary Centre under State Planning Policy 4.2 (SPP4.2) there are expectations of the Booragoon City Centre to contribute to State Government density targets for the broader City of Melville. The City is required to deliver 10,830 additional dwellings by 2031.
- **Local Planning Framework Review:** The City's review of Local Planning Scheme No. 6 (LPS6), includes testing draft proposals for increased density around the Booragoon City Centre. This has raised local community concerns about built form, heights, infrastructure, schools and traffic. The advertising for proposed changes to LPS6 occurred at the end of 2024 and was a current discussion within the community when majority of the engagement for this project occurred in early 2025.
- **Commercial and Retail Strategy:** Objectives to enhance Booragoon's retail and employment mix, with the proposed Westfield Booragoon expansion improving amenities but lacking strong street-level activation and with unknown timeframes.

- **Structure Planning and Future Review:** The current MCCSP expires in 2025, and requires a review to unlock development potential, improve mixed-use integration, and guide public realm upgrades.
- **Economic and Community Considerations:** A Land Economics Analysis has been completed concurrently to this project to inform commercial viability and development flexibility, and to investigate the importance of development settings to stimulate development activity in a future PSP.
- **Developments of interest:** Scentre Group at the end of 2024 applied to extend their current planning approval for Westfield Booragoon shopping centre and building the high street (approved by the WAPC on 24 February 2023) for another four (4) years to enable substantial commencement by 2027. The extension was determined by the WAPC on 15 May 2025 and granted for an additional four years. The City's Cultural Heart (library and cultural centre) is another key piece of investment slated for the area, with the original business case approved in 2015, community engagement in 2017 and an updated business case endorsed by Council in March 2024.

2.3 Stakeholders and Communication Channels

In order to effectively engage a diverse audience, a number of communication tools, messages and communications were prepared in collaboration with the City to identify, contact and engage with stakeholders.

2.3.1 Identifying Key Stakeholders

The City identified the following key stakeholder groups to be included in the preliminary engagement:

- State agencies
- Commercial landowners
- Community
- Elected Members
- City Executive Leadership Team and Management Leadership Team

Stakeholders within these groups were identified in collaboration with the City with a preparation of a stakeholder master list of contacts which included 19 State Agencies, and commercial landowners within the structure plan area identified through the City's database. Community members for the community workshop were contacted through random selection from the City's database to fill an expression of interest (EOI) form to participate. The randomised selection allowed the project team to ensure that the selection was from a diverse pool of respondents. Data for the commercial landowners within the precinct was limited, as many tenancies were in the ownership of strata companies, which proved challenging to reach the landowners themselves. Refer to section 4.1.1 for further details on the EOI process.

Following this, communications collateral was prepared and tailored to each stakeholder based on the level of contact and the workshop that they would be targeted for.

2.3.2 Communication Channels

Project information, updates and invitations were distributed to the community as described in Table 1 (below). The consultant team prepared content for the collateral with the City distributing the materials to relevant stakeholders.

2.3.3 Key Messages / FAQs

Last Updated: 10 January 2025

We're revisiting the Booragoon Precinct Structure Plan, formerly known as the Melville City Structure Plan, and we invited the community to help shape its future direction. Preliminary engagement for the Plan has taken place and a report on the findings is now being prepared.

To capture a broad range of perspectives and opportunities prior to drafting the Booragoon Precinct Structure Plan, preliminary stakeholder engagement sessions were held in February 2025. This included a series of workshops, with sessions tailored for the community (residents, landowners, businesses, and visitors), state government agencies, and commercial landowners. Feedback received from this stage of the consultation is now being reviewed.

For the past decade, we have followed the [Melville City Centre Structure Plan](#) as the guiding planning framework for the City Centre area. This review aims to transition that structure plan to the Booragoon Precinct Structure Plan (BPSP).

Creating this Plan helps ensure that development in this precinct will:

- Comply with state and local planning policies
- Promote sustainability
- Support community well-being
- Address transport, infrastructure, and public space needs

2.4 Engagement Activities

Engagement activities took the form of targeted engagement with:

1. A local community workshop with attendees who expressed interest in attending through the EOI;
2. 1x1 Meetings with Commercial Landowners within the PSP Area;
3. A workshop with multiple representatives from the following State Agencies:
 - a. Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage
 - b. Department of Fire and Emergency Services
 - c. Public Transport Authority
 - d. Department of Communities
 - e. Department of Education
4. Briefings and workshops with:
 - a. City's Elected Members; and
 - b. City's Executive Leadership and Management Team.

Following an initial meeting with DPLH, briefings were held with the City's Elected Members and Executive Leadership Team. This was then followed by separate workshops with state agencies and the local community.

A commercial landowners workshop was also arranged, however due to a low response rate and late cancellations, it was adjusted to a series of 1x1 meetings during the same timeslot. The agenda for these direct engagements were modelled on the workshop that has been planned for these stakeholders.

The details of the engagement activities held can be found in Table 2 below.

3. Key findings

This section sets out the main insights and themes from the engagement process inclusive of engagement with the community, key stakeholders, and the City of Melville EMES and ELT. It includes a summary of stakeholders future aspirations, opportunities, issues, potential risks, information gaps, and buy-in for the future of the City Centre.

The emerging themes of the engagement process are detailed below under three key headings which consider:

- The Booragoon City Centre;
- The City's Land within the Booragoon City Centre; and
- Future stakeholder and community engagement.

3.1 Booragoon City Centre

The role of the BCC as a Secondary Centre

- Most stakeholders understood the need for a review of the planning framework, particularly given the perceived lack of recent investment in the centre.
- There needs to be further clarity around the role of the BCC as a Secondary Centre in the context of the development already realised and underway at Canning Bridge (District Centre) and Murdoch (Specialised Activity Centre). This requires further engagement and direction from the State.
- There is a mixed degree of acceptance from stakeholders about the level of change that may be required to the planning framework, particularly regarding density and building heights. As discussed further in this section, there are mixed views around increased density both within and around the centre.

- Many stakeholders understood and could identify opportunities for increased vibrancy, amenity, service provision, social infrastructure and improved public realm.
- Although there is an initial understanding formed, there is more work needed with all stakeholders, particularly community, in communicating the scale and significance of the BCC, and City's landholdings, and the role they both play in the City's future.

Planning process

- Some stakeholders expressed uncertainty regarding the role and relationship between planning processes that affect an area of community, and the governance of these. They expressed a desire for clear communication about planning processes and expectations.
- There is an opportunity to review the boundary of the BCC as part of the BCCPSP.
- There is a need to determine early on (with DPLH input) whether the current structure plan (the MCCSP) requires a wholesale review or an update, and what information will be required to meet statutory requirements, and develop the BCCPSP.
- Planning terminology is confusing for many stakeholders. It is important to establish the right terms early on, whether it be an Activity Centre Structure Plan or Precinct Structure Plan (PSP) or redevelopment project, to support a clear narrative for all stakeholders.
- There is a need for a clear interface with the review of LPS 6 and other City planning projects and processes to avoid confusion and explain how the outcomes of one project may relate to or impact the BCCPSP.
- There is still some misunderstanding present about the ability for the planning framework to catalyse and shape investment and development, where some stakeholders don't

- understand the interplay between control and influence over development, land ownership, and the planning framework. This will be an important message to cover in the future process in order to receive meaningful feedback from stakeholders.
- Explore and incorporate different ways to communicate analysis throughout the project, such as:
 - 3D modelling to communicate built form and scale
 - Scenario modelling to inform the development of the PSP
 - The use of case studies and other benchmarks to understand outcomes in other precincts and the impact of different density models

Development and Redevelopment

- The BCC has had a number of names, including Garden City, Melville City Centre and Booragoon.
- The BCC is tired, and in need of redevelopment. Stakeholders expressed concern about how long it will take to see this change.
- Delays in the redevelopment of the Westfield Booragoon shopping centre has reduced community and other commercial landowner confidence in investment and redevelopment.
- There is an expectation that the Westfield Booragoon shopping centre redevelopment would be a leader and catalyst in the precinct to driver further redevelopment and investment, given the dominance of its footprint.
- The City's land is the second largest landholding in the precinct and presents significant opportunities to catalyse change.

The Lakes

- Commercial landholdings around the 'lakes precinct' are largely aging strata developments requiring redevelopment incentives or another catalyst in order to stimulate investment.
- The lakes themselves perform a drainage function which may not be fully understood.
- While the lakes are privately owned, they are used informally and perceived as public open space.

- The Lakes Association is a body of landowners surrounding the lakes area that have entered into an agreement with the City and various parties about management of the area.
- Further consideration is required to understand implications for access, ownership, and the broader Lakes Association agreement that sits upon the land.

Wireless Hill and adjacent State land

- The BCC's proximity to Wireless Hill is strategically important and presents an opportunity to create strong connections. This must be done in a sensitive manner to ensure continuity of bushland values and function.
- Acknowledgement that the City is considering initiating a process to convert the State land within the precinct to a Class A Reserve.

Public Spaces

- There are differing expectations across stakeholder groups about the nature of open and green space and public realm that should be provided within or in proximity to the BCC in future, noting:
 - The relevance of catering to all age groups and needs
 - Provision of urban spaces (public space and places to sit) as well as green spaces
 - A growing importance of open space provision commensurate with expectations of more density and residential growth
- Bushfire risk is an important consideration in land use and public space planning for the area.

Sustainability

- Stakeholders expressed expectations that new infrastructure, design initiatives and developments within a future BCC are more sustainable.
- Suggestions included microgrid connections, solar panels, urban greening, tree canopy targets, and the importance of tree retention.

Character and density

- Stakeholder views regarding where and how density is delivered, both within the precinct and surrounding suburbs and centres was varied with some stakeholders expressing strong support, and others strongly opposed.
- Key elements of the density discussion included:
 - The potential erosion of character in surrounding residential neighbourhoods
 - The importance of achieving a balance between density and maintaining character
 - There is a complex relationship between density within the precinct and the impact of density delivered in the broader activity centre catchment and other activity centres nearby. Understanding the broader context for density planning is important, particularly in terms of functionality, infrastructure planning and demands, and the stimulation of redevelopment or investment decisions of key landholders.
 - Balancing an increase in density in the context of other considerations such as tree retention and supporting affordable and diverse housing
- There were diverse views between community and State agencies regarding the impact of density on community and social infrastructure upgrades. For example, what level of density may trigger a demand for additional or upgraded education facilities.

Built form and buildings

- There is a requirement and expectation to improve built form outcomes in the BCC to be more interesting and aesthetically pleasing.
- Some stakeholders would prefer to avoid any further large towers.
- Housing diversity
- Many stakeholders recognise the need for more, and a greater range of types of residential development in the BCC.
- There is a desire for a mix of housing types to help accommodate all family dynamics, including more affordable and aged-care options.

- The current lack of housing diversity and affordability is linked to the limited range of housing types within the area.
- There are some concerns about displacement of existing demographics through any increase in affordable and social housing.
- Public transport
 - Public transport links and services to and from the BCC are limited to bus services which don't connect well into regional networks, specifically the nearby train line.
 - The PTA bus station is located on the edge of the BCC on privately owned land leased by the State (PTA).
 - The service should be retained, but also better integrated in any future redevelopment of the BCC to ensure it is connected from proposed activity (particularly after hours) in the proposed High Street.
 - Bus connections between the centre and nearby railway stations are not frequent or efficient enough to make the journey attractive.
 - Stakeholders desire for more transport options.
 - Transit oriented type development desirable, however heavy bus reliance may not truly enable this.

Accessibility

- Stakeholders would like to see an accessible centre, encouraging local walking and riding trips and reduced vehicle dominance.
- There is interest in pedestrian-friendly spaces, including suggestions about the proposed High Street being designed and operated as a pedestrian mall.
- Improved safety and accessibility to/ from the centre is important for some stakeholders.
- There is an interest in improving public realm and surrounding streets to facilitate better local journeys.

Traffic

- Prioritising early traffic modelling was considered important to understand broader transport networks and travel patterns in the BCC catchment, and to then understand the impact of any planning and growth on these networks.
- There are concerns about traffic impacts of increased development, and these need to be considered very early.
- Stakeholders noted successful centre redevelopment and growth was related to the ability to address traffic and parking issues experienced in other redeveloped centres.

Economic activity

- Westfield Booragoon shopping centre dominates the BCC in terms of the size of the landholding, retail land uses, and redevelopment decisions and timeframes.
- There is a desire for an improved day-to-night economy with food and beverage uses, high-quality retail, entertainment and hospitality.
- Stakeholders perceive a decline of the shopping centre quality, citing the loss of services such as the post office, and a poor-quality food court.
- Current retail facilities are tired in contrast to other shopping centres and recent upgrades that have been enjoyed in other locations. There is a perception that provision of services and amenities were previously better than what is currently there and it is 'not a Tier 1 shopping centre' anymore.
- In future a greater diversity of retail may be needed to accommodate changing demographics and compete with other centres.
- Stakeholders expressed an interest in economic and social activation through hubs of activity including cafes, retail diversity, entertainment and community uses.
- Further consideration is required regarding important attractors or features to meet tourism objectives.

Community uses

- Some stakeholders noted the need for more community uses given the role of the BCC as a 'city centre'.
- There is a lack of existing social infrastructure, limited spaces for youth, families and community activities.
- Social infrastructure, including education, will be important to consider in future as populations grow and change.
- Collaborative opportunities should be explored with developers to provide community infrastructure or grant funding opportunities to support infrastructure upgrades.
- There are opportunities to reinforce and explore physical connections to other City infrastructure, such as Leisurefit Melville which is an important asset for local youth.

3.2 City's land holdings

- There is an opportunity for planning and development of the City's land to catalyse other developments and deliver confidence and direction regarding change.
- A clear vision for the future of the City's land will demonstrate leadership and guide the development of the wider BCC.
- Priority uses to explore include civic, cultural, community, conservation, specialist residential, and activation-based uses.
- There was a strong recognition by stakeholders that collaboration with Scentre Group, State Government Agencies, joint venture partners and community groups would be important in setting and delivering on proposals over the City's land.
- City land must deliver long term public value, be well maintained, protect natural assets and align with strategic, social, environmental and financial goals.
- Immediate action to establish a vision is needed to inform upcoming decisions and maintain funding commitments.
- There are strong interdependencies between City land and Westfield Booragoon shopping centre, infrastructure planning, environmental connections (i.e., Wireless Hill) and broader investment attraction.
- The interface between Westfield Booragoon shopping centre and the City's Land is important, ensuring the proposed High Street is continued as a principle.
- Different funding models and opportunities to realise the proposed High Street should be considered.
- Clear governance is required for both the City Land and the BCC.
- Ensuring decision-making and planning for the City's land informs and is informed by future BCC planning. Running these processes concurrently ensures opportunities to align planning and decision-making, given the location and reciprocal impact of both precincts.

3.3 Future / further stakeholder engagements

Communication and messaging

- Future engagement with stakeholders needs to ensure clear communications and messaging regarding:
 - The role of a Secondary Centre and what the associated State development expectations are for this. Case studies may assist in this regard.
 - Planning processes, where and how stakeholders and have input, and who the final decision-makers are for each process.
 - How feedback received from other concurrent projects (particularly LPS 6 Review) would be considered through the PSP process or inform one another.
 - The need for and role of density in delivering vibrancy in centres.
 - The City's role(s) in planning for the BCC and its various interests (i.e. landholder, regulator and community representative) and why certain decisions are made along the journey.
- Transparent communication with stakeholders throughout the planning process is critical.

Stakeholder Groups

- Commercial landowners and business owners in the BCC were logistically hard-to-reach in the engagement forms that formed part of the Preliminary Engagement project. Consideration should be given to alternative methods and communication channels to reach these important stakeholders, noting:
 - Some commercial landowners are behind layers of strata
 - Neither group are in an accessible, central database
 - Business owners are particularly busy
- There are existing commercial and business groups and associations, such as Friends of Wireless Hill or the Lakes Association, and these may be suitable future forums to engage.

- Close and on-going liaison with Westfield Booragoon shopping centre/Scentre Group, particularly regarding the outcome of the 4-year development appeal extension, and their role as a major landholder in the centre is important. This also provides an opportunity to collaborate.
- Ongoing engagement and communications with the community is important and expected. A number of community participants are interested in having a voice early in the planning processes.
- Ensuring a diverse cross-section of the community are represented, including a diversity of youth, cultures, backgrounds and ages is important.
- First Nations voices are also important to embed cultural considerations and needs.
- Elected Members want to be involved in future planning and recognise the importance of ensuring a clear scope and process is developed and followed.
- There are opportunities to collaborate with adjoining local governments considering the role and catchment of the BCC.
- For engagement with State Agencies, ensuring that the decision-making or senior staff are attending or aware of progress is important.

Expression of Interest Process

The EOI form was emailed to a random selection of residents in the City =, beginning with 600 communications (500 across the City of Melville area and 100 within the Booragoon and surrounding suburbs area). Applicants were asked to provide the following:

- Name
- Contact details
- Connection to the Booragoon City Centre
- Demographic information such as gender, age, diversity information
- Whether they can attend the anticipated time of the workshop in February

- Why the applicant wished to attend the community workshop, and how they believed their input could contribute to the review of the Booragoon Precinct Structure Plan.

Element Advisory and Align evaluated the completed applications through a blind-selection process (names removed) to select 30 participants representing a cross-section of the following:

- Residents / ratepayers within the ACP area
- Local residents in surrounding suburbs / ratepayers (Booragoon, Ardross)
- Broader City residents / ratepayers (visitors)
- Business operators within the City

It was intended that following representation across the above, that participants also represented a range of gender, age and diversity backgrounds.

The final selection of 30 attendees for the workshop comprised a mix of the following demographic factors:

Workshop Overview

Workshops began with an introduction to the project, the purpose of the workshop itself, presentations that set the context, speaking to the current state and setting of the Booragoon centre today, and some of the future considerations and expectations for both precinct planning and a Secondary Centre. Following these presentations, interactive activities were run to seek feedback and input from participants.

Activity 1: Future Aspirations

Activity 1 asked participants what they would like to see and experience in the Booragoon City Centre in 2050, whilst prompts on the screen set the context for what might change in 25 years time (Figure 1). The activity required participants to jot down on post it notes their answers individually first. Then these answers were discussed amongst each table, and placed onto a worksheet (Figure 2) across six themes that align with precinct planning: Environment, Activities and Uses, Buildings, Streets and Public Spaces, Movement and Functionality, Community and Economy.

Future Aspirations Activity

Activity 1 asked participants what they would like to see in 2050, with context prompts displayed on the screen. They then placed their ideas under six broad themes to align with precinct planning: Environment, Activities and Uses, Buildings, Streets and Public Spaces, Movement and Functionality, Community and Economy.

Responses for Activity 1 were initially given against the six themes above. During analysis of workshop outcomes, they were themed against State Planning Policy 7.2 – Precinct Design ('SPP7.2') Design Elements (Table 4, below) to identify any gaps that may need addressing through the structure plan process.

Primarily, the participants future aspirations for the Booragoon City Centre focused on a desire for increased green spaces, parks and tree canopy, providing a link from Wireless Hill to the Booragoon City Centre and creating diverse, mixed-use spaces that could be used for all ages and demographics.

There were some concerns around increasing building heights and density, as well as many respondents citing concerns about the uncertain future redevelopment of Westfield Shopping Centre and ongoing delays over the years. This sentiment is linked to the recent Westfield application for extension of time for their development approval and recent LPS6 engagement for up-coding density in areas adjacent the centre (now subsequently approved by State).

The following is a snapshot of the responses from Activity 1. A table of responses assessed against the principles of SPP7.2 can be found in Appendix C.

Opportunities and Challenges Activity

In Activity 2, participants worked in groups at their tables to identify aspects of Place, People, and Plans and Policies that they think were important opportunities or challenges to consider in the planning process. Guiding prompts included looking into the land uses, land ownership, vegetation, social patterns, density targets and demographics.

Responses to Activity 2 highlighted opportunities for economic and social activation and the types of activities and facilities respondents would

like to see, such as childcare facilities, increased surveillance and improved walkways and paths, an increase in green spaces, and housing for a variety of age groups and demographics.

Challenges included concerns over the lack of infrastructure to support an increase in density, unlimited building heights, and concerns that development would displace groups in need. A summary of the key themes separated by Place, People and Plans and the Plans and Policies are tabled below.

State Agencies

This section provides a summary of engagement with State Agencies, including meetings and the State Agency workshop. Workshop details and a snapshot of the key responses are provided below, with a tabled version of the responses for each activity have been included for reference and can be found in Appendix C.

DPLH Meeting

A meeting with officers from DPLH and the project team was held in late-November 2024, to introduce DPLH to the project, discuss the expectations for the Booragoon City Centre and for the engagement.

In summary, the following was discussed:

Project Overview

- DPLH were provided background on the approach, including pre-engagement phase ahead of the structure plan review to be undertaken in 2025.
- Clarified expectations for Activity Centre Plans (ACPs) versus Precinct Structure Plans (PSPs) and their relationship to planning schemes, including the plan being changed from an ACP to a PSP to align with planning regulations and current terminology.

Booragoon Secondary Centre

- Acknowledgement of community dissatisfaction with proposals in LPS6 review and that feedback will inform the PSP review process.
- Discussion around potential boundary changes, which may form part of the process.
- Consideration needed for how the Booragoon City Centre contributes to broader housing targets.

Engagement Approach

- DPLH were invited to be involved in the engagement process including contributing key context and examples.

Future Aspirations Activity

Opportunities and Challenges Activity

In Activity 2, participants worked in groups at their tables to identify aspects of Place, People and Plans and Policies that they think were important opportunities or challenges to consider in the planning process. Guiding prompts included looking into the land uses, land ownership, vegetation, social patterns, density targets and demographics.

Responses for Activity 2 highlighted an opportunity to investigate the precinct boundary, improve transport infrastructure, provide a diverse and wide range of housing and improve greenery. Challenges highlighted the complexity with strata developments, drainage and water, the difficulty of retaining trees whilst increasing density and providing housing diversity and affordability.

A summary of the key themes separated by Place, People and Plans and the Plans and Policies are tabled below.

Further (Out of Session) Feedback

Additional feedback from DPLH was received due to officers from the Lands team being unable to attend the State Agency workshop, set out below:

- Crown land in the Booragoon City Centre is limited to Reserve 33422, which is comprised of two lots, 2674 and 2335 on Deposited Plan 185181. Reserve 33422 is set aside for the purpose of 'Public Recreation' with a management order in favour of the City.
- While this land is zoned 'Urban' in the Metropolitan Region Scheme, the effect of the Crown land tenure is that the reserve land can only be used for public recreation and ancillary/beneficial uses.
- DPLH have no issues with the City including it in the PSP area, but should it result in a proposed land use that is outside of public recreation and related uses, it would require consideration of alternative forms of tenure to be realised. It is encouraged for the City to engage with DPLH to discuss potential tenure changes.
- Any proposed commercial or residential uses would necessitate alternative forms of tenure such as freehold or leasehold, the consideration for which is market value, as a starting point.

In addition to the feedback received from the Lands team, officers at the Heritage and Property Services team of DPLH were contacted and asked to provide any preliminary feedback, set out below:

- Officers confirmed that the Booragoon City Centre intersects with the boundary of Aboriginal site Melville Scarred Tree (ID 18725), which is mainly in City of Melville landholding.
- Any proposed works that intersect with the boundary of the Melville Scarred Tree will require approval under the *Aboriginal Heritage Act 1972* (AHA).
- Whilst there have been previous developments on the subject land, limited Aboriginal heritage surveys have been completed; therefore, it is unknown if there is other Aboriginal heritage present and the proponents need to be aware of obligations under the Act.
- DPLH also advised that the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Inquiry System (ACHIS) should be checked regularly should new Aboriginal heritage be reported within the subject land.



Commercial landowners

Due to low RSVP numbers and late cancellations, the workshop with commercial landowners was rescheduled as a series of 1-on-1 meetings during the same workshop timeslot. Meetings were held with Scentre Group (Westfield Booragon owners) and two other commercial property owners within the precinct.

Points raised across these meetings has been summarised below, including:

- An interest to be involved in the Structure Plan review process
- With any density, a desire for it to be accompanied by open space for residents
- Enhance natural aspects such as gardens and landscaping, not just concrete
- An associated group of owners across the Booragoon Commercial Centre, Alcoa Building, the Gateway Business Centre and the City are parties to a deed over the Lakes area which is used informally as public open space.
- A need for coordination across multiple parties and stakeholders to facilitate development given it will take time to unlock any strata development
- Some landowners are waiting for a catalyst or incentive to redevelop due to the difficult nature of commercial strata, but keen to be involved in the future of the Booragon City centre
- Opportunities for more housing and accommodation, including a mix of options including for a younger demographic, students, retirement, luxury apartments
- Opportunity for co-location of uses (i.e. medical or wellness precincts)
- Opportunities to link to Wireless Hill Park for improved public open space access
- Opportunity to develop mixed-use style development with shops, bars, restaurants at ground floor and apartments above, as seen in Europe and Asia.



Executive Leadership Team

Briefing

A briefing was held with the City's Executive Leadership Team (ELT) on Thursday 23rd January 2025 at 9:30am at the City of Melville Civic Centre. The purpose of the session was to provide a briefing for the ELT on the preliminary engagement project ahead of undertaking the broader engagement, to determine early buy-in for the project, to provide context on some of the considerations for the Booragoon Centre and provide the opportunity for questions and answers with the project team.

Discussion with the ELT members during this session included:

- Support for the EOI process undertaken for the Community Workshop
- Considering interplay with neighbouring local governments given Booragoon's Secondary Centre role and broad catchment
- Additional support from the City may help to encourage DPLH involvement in the early engagement process
- Ensuring that the right attendees (senior level) are attending the State Agency workshop
- Catchment data for Westfield Booragoon may current exist, which could be helpful for the Structure Plan review
- Discussion around the future naming for the centre, including Booragoon, Garden City Westfield Booragoon etc. and that this should be considered early for the project, both in the naming for the project, the centre, and resulting plan
- Visioning for Booragoon will be important, understanding how people think of the city centre as a place and how we position it to be distinct from other centres
- That the City has a role to play in the activation of the centre
- The State-owned land adjacent Wireless Hill is going through a concurrent process to explore changing this to an A-Class Reserve, which should be acknowledged through the project, including indicating it as open space on mapping
- A further workshop(s) is desired by the ELT group to focus on the City's landholdings and Master Plan
- State density targets and requirements will be important to understand early



Workshop

A workshop with the ELT and Management Leadership Team (MLT) was held on Wednesday March 26th 2025 at 8am at the City of Melville Civic Centre. This followed the workshops with State Agencies, Community and Commercial Landowner discussions.

The purpose of the workshop was to:

- Establish alignment across the ELT and MT at the City regarding the priorities for the land owned by the City within the Booragoon City Centre; and
- To establish a clear direction regarding the need for and approach to a Masterplan over the land owned by the City of Melville, and how this should inform a Review of the Melville City Centre Structure Plan.

What to expect after the workshop

Workshop concludes - 11.00am

The workshop included an update on the Land Economics Analysis being undertaken as a separate but concurrent project to this Preliminary Engagement. The update included an introduction to the project, the process and findings so far. This update was in amongst several other short presentations on concurrent projects and considerations that provided contextual snapshots for the ELT and MT group.

Following these presentations, two interactive sessions were undertaken in the second half of the workshop.

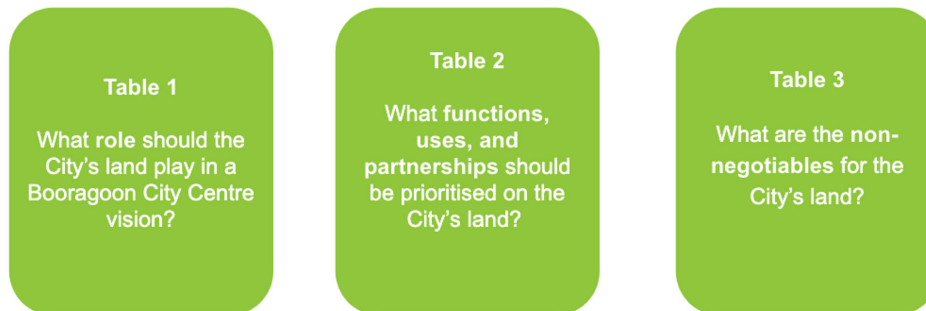


Figure 5. ELT/MT Workshop Activity 1 questions

Activity One was based on the ELT/MT members sitting in three groups across three separate tables, each with a different question (see Figure 5 below) in relation to identifying the strategic priorities of the site. Time was given for each group to answer each question through rotation of worksheets, allowing responses to build upon one another. Following the completion, key findings were shared amongst the whole group. Each participant was then given six sticky dots. They were then asked to place their sticky dots on the priorities they felt were the most important priorities or objectives, with voting collated at the end and reported back to the group.

Activity Two allowed for whole-of-room discussions about planning for the City's land, including the importance of establishing a vision, timing considerations and the biggest synergies and interdependencies with other projects and stakeholders (Figure 6).

Key Themes

The key themes arising from the workshop were:

City Leadership and Vision-Setting

- The City must take a proactive leadership role in shaping the future of Booragoon.
- The City's land should demonstrate commitment, lead by example and inform the vision for the broader area.
- A clear and strategic vision is vital to inspire investment, build community trust and align the stakeholders.

Activation and Place-Making

- Land should be used to stimulate development, activate public spaces and create a vibrant, high-quality city centre.
- This should include a mix of civic, cultural, residential, and entertainment uses to attract diverse users and make Booragoon a destination.

Financial and Social Return on Investment

- The City's land should deliver a balanced return financially (i.e., reduced rate burden), socially, environmentally and for future generations.
- Investments should be sustainable, guided by clear governance, and support the triple bottom line: community benefit, economic viability, and environmental stewardship.

Connectivity and Integration

- Physical and functional integration with the surrounding areas (i.e., Westfield, Wireless Hill) is essential.
- Enhance accessibility, manage infrastructure impacts and promote high-quality streetscapes that link people and places.

Strategic Partnerships and Collaboration

- Collaboration with state agencies, private developers, institutions, and community groups is critical.
- Strategic partnerships (e.g. with Scentre Group, State Government) will help leverage resources and align planning and delivery.

Action-Oriented Planning and Implementation

- The City must shift from reactive to proactive planning, with a clear roadmap and governance model.
- Urgency is recognised – decisions need to be made soon, even if a full masterplan isn't yet in place.
- A staged, scenario-based planning approach can help test ideas and maintain momentum.

Visioning and Master-Planning

- There is a need for a clear vision, with the masterplan guiding City decisions and include principles and scenarios to inform decision making.
- Establish clear governance structures with Elected Member involvement noting that the Council needs to make decisions in the short-term, even before the masterplan is finalised.
- A vision should ensure that there are long-term community benefits.
- Masterplan is needed to secure funding and guide delivery.

Elected Members

Briefing

A briefing was held with the City's Elected Members on Wednesday 5 February 2025 at 6:00pm at the City of Melville Civic Centre. The purpose of the session was to provide a briefing for the Elected Members on the preliminary engagement project ahead of undertaking the broader engagement, to provide context on some of the considerations for the Booragoon Centre and provide the opportunity for questions and answers with the project team.

Discussion with the Elected Members during this session included:

- Clarification about the community group composition and size, and whether Elected Members could attend to observe, which was allowed
- Queries around what makes Booragoon a Secondary Centre and what the State's expectations are for this, showing that further clarification is needed in this space
- Discussion around expectations for development of centres, given the City's previous experience where the State will determine last minute development controls, heights and plot ratio and that early conversations will need to factor this in
- The need to consider all that is happening within the City as a whole, rather than a piecemeal approach
- The interplay between the Westfield Booragoon (4 year extension request) acknowledging that outcomes for the centre would be impacted by their design and development
- Factoring in stakeholders (i.e. shop owners) who are unable to plan for the future due to Westfield extension

Workshop

A workshop with the Elected Members was held on Tuesday 1st July 2025 at 6pm at the City of Melville Civic Centre during one of the regularly scheduled Elected Members Engagement Sessions (EMES).

The purpose of the workshop was to:

- Share findings from preliminary engagement with key stakeholders as well as other informing studies and initiatives; and
- Gather perspectives and priorities from Elected Members on how to get the planning right for the Booragoon City Centre and how best to utilise the City's land within it.

Workshop concludes – 8.00pm

The workshop included an update on the key findings from the preliminary engagement project, including what was raised by a range of key stakeholders, the level of alignment on these issues, specific feedback regarding the 'planning the plan' and associated process, as well as key feedback on the City's Land, primarily from the ELT/MT group. This was followed by an update on the Land Economics Analysis project being undertaken as a separate but concurrent project to the Preliminary Engagement. The update included an introduction to the project, the process and findings so far.

Following these presentations, time was allowed for clarifications on the information presented before moving into an interactive session.

This was conducted as a whole-of-room discussion about the opportunities and challenges for 'planning the plan' for the Booragoon City Centre. The discussion focussed around three key areas: People & places, concurrent initiatives and projects, and the process itself (Figure 7 below).

Key themes:

The key themes arising from the workshop were:

- Opportunities for the area looked at creating opportunities for a range of community needs (First Nations culture, aging population, youth etc.)
- Physically, some of the opportunities looked at improving public realm of surrounding streets and delivering on medium density outcomes
- The interface between City Land and Westfield Booragoon was important to address in planning, and ensuring the High Street is well considered
- Clearly communicating with stakeholders through visual methods, scenario testing and explaining decision-making
- Setting a clear vision for the area within State Agency requirements, positioning it as a redevelopment project
- Understanding clear leadership, and expectations from the State around a Secondary Centre

<p>Who has been appointed to develop the Booragoon Precinct Structure Plan?</p>	<p>The review process is set to begin in mid-to-late 2025, and as such, no one has been appointed by the City to lead its development.</p>
<p>Who is the final decision maker?</p>	<p>The final decision for the Plan rests with the Western Australian Planning Commission (WAPC) in consultation with the City and relevant State agencies.</p> <p>The final decision maker for the Master Plan of the City's landholdings is the City of Melville.</p>
<p>How does this preliminary engagement relate to Local Planning Scheme No. 6 (LPS6)?</p>	<p>The preliminary engagement for the Booragoon PSP is a separate project from the LPS6 review. LPS6 covers the entire City of Melville and proposes changes to R-coding near the Booragoon PSP boundary, but not within it. While LPS6 includes density coding for the centre, it relies on the Melville City Centre Structure Plan for detailed development controls within that boundary. The formal review of the Booragoon PSP, which will update the Structure Plan, will begin later this year and will address development controls for the area. Purpose:

Clarification of expiry date for existing Melville City Centre Structure Plan.

Advice:

The Melville City Centre Structure Plan previously had an expiry date of 19 October 2025. The City had requested a two-year extension of the expiry date to facilitate completion of a review by 19 October 2027.

The two-year extension is referenced in report UP26/99. It has now been confirmed that whilst a two-year extension was sought, the Western Australian Planning Commission has approved a four-year extension (expiry date of 19 October 2029).

Consideration:

Confirmation of the Structure Plan expiry date does not change the Officer recommendation for this item. The review program should continue toward the 2027 target to address the development challenges identified in the report and to ensure the planning framework remains contemporary and responsive to major scheduled projects and ongoing development interest. The inherently lengthy nature of such reviews, including progress through the Decision Gates process and comprehensive community consultation, aligns with the longer extension now approved and is consistent with the timeframe that may have been required regardless.

Melville Design Review Group – Terms of Reference

Purpose

The Melville Design Review Group (MDRG) is to provide independent, expert advice regarding the design quality of development proposals identified in Local Planning Policy 1.2 – Design Review (LPP1.2) and in other circumstances in relation to any major development or other proposal required by the Council or any relevant Local Planning Scheme provision.

Authority, Accountability and Decision Making

Status of Advice

The MDRG is advisory only and does not have a decision-making function. The MDRG advises on the design quality of proposals against the Design Principles in SPP7.0 and supporting State Planning Policies, with reference to the LPP1.2 and policy provisions. The advice is not a planning assessment or a technical or compliance assessment against the Australian Standards or National Construction Codes.

Outside of the design review processes under this Terms of Reference, members of the MDRG are not to provide advice directly to an applicant, landowner, Elected Member or member of the public in respect to any proposal under consideration at a MDRG meeting.

Membership

The **MError! Bookmark not defined**.DRG is to comprise a pool of experienced, multi-disciplinary built environment professionals with the majority of pool members having demonstrated expertise in effective design review. In addition to professional qualifications and experience, other requirements include:

- the ability to analyse, evaluate and report on complex design issues,
- the ability to work in a multi-disciplinary team, and
- good written and verbal communication and negotiation skills.

Member expertise may include but not be limited to:

- Architecture
- Landscape Architecture
- Urban Design
- Planning
- Heritage
- Sustainability (including environmental design, systems ecology, urban water expertise)
- Accessibility and universal design
- Public and population health
- Transport planning
- Civil, structural and services engineering
- Public art

A person who is currently employed by, or who is an Elected Member of the City of Melville, is not eligible for appointment as a member of the MDRG.

Appointment to the MDRP pool is through an expression of interest process and will usually be for a term of 2 years. Prospective members will be highly regarded within their field and will be endorsed by two professional referees (independent professional peers) who can attest in writing to the suitability of the candidate for membership of the MDRG.

The City of Melville may terminate the appointment of any member of the pool prior to the expiry of the term of office if it is considered that the member is not providing a positive contribution to the intended function of the MDRG, if the member has not demonstrated a satisfactory level of attendance at meetings, or where there is a breach of the Code of Conduct or other legislative requirements.

In the event that a pool member resigns their membership, has their appointment terminated, or is unable to continue to serve due to other unforeseen circumstances prior to the expiry of their term of office, the City of Melville may appoint a replacement pool member with equivalent qualifications and expertise to serve for the remainder of the original member's term of appointment.

The Council may appoint one or more members as a MDRG Chair or Deputy Chair. Following appointment to the pool but prior to sitting on a MDRG meeting, it is the responsibility of each pool member to ensure they have completed any mandatory training required under the *Local Government Act 1995* (including code of conduct) and any other training identified by the City of Melville and that all conflict of interest requirements (including declaration and management plans) have been identified and provided to the City of Melville as required by the *Local Government Act 1995*.

It is the responsibility of each **Error! Bookmark not defined.**Member to ensure they:

- have a clear understanding of their authority, responsibility and accountability as stated in these Terms of Reference and relevant legislation,
- have the appropriate skills necessary to fulfil their role on the MDRG, and
- maintain the professional development, standards, and requirements of their profession (where required) during the term of their appointment.

A MDRP meeting shall comprise a maximum of 6 members with a Chair and five other panel members (one being a community representative).

A MDRP meeting may not proceed unless a quorum comprising a minimum of 3 members is present.

Design review sessions will be chaired by the MDRG Chair or by a pool member who has been appointed as a Session Chair.

Member Responsibilities

Group Members

All group members should:

- Provide independent, fair and reasonable professional advice relative to the SPP7.0 Design Principles and relevant State and local planning schemes and policies.
- Treat all discussions and information about applications with sensitivity and confidentiality.
- Respond to and comment on material presented, providing clear and constructive feedback.
- When invited to form a group for a project review, disclose any interests to the nominated local government officer and the MDRG Chair preferably prior to the meeting. for the record. Where a pecuniary interest exists, the member is not permitted to participate in any part of the meeting dealing with that item and a replacement pool member may be required.
- Read and ensure that they are familiar with all information provided prior to the session and prepare key points for discussion in advance.
- Request additional information prior to the review session, in accordance with the advised procedures, if required.

Chair and Deputy Chair/s

The appointed MDRG Chair or Session Chair will have extensive experience in design review and facilitation, and a proven ability to draw meaningful conclusions from the collective views expressed. Responsibilities include:

- Liaising with the nominated local government officer about the operation of the Session MDRG including advice regarding additional briefing material or requirements.
- Welcoming and introducing the Session MRDG members, proponents and any observers present in the meeting.
- Ensuring that the review session agenda is followed.
- Facilitating interactive discussion and participation between Session MRDG members, key local government attendees and proponents.
- Ensuring that discussions remain focused on the project being reviewed and that advice relates to matters covered by the SPP 7.0 Design Principles, and any relevant State and local planning policies and schemes.
- Ensuring consistency of MRDG advice between reviews.
- Verbally summarising the view of the Session MRDG at the conclusion of the meeting
- Managing any dissenting views from MDRG members where they may occur, ensuring there is sound reasoning when a dissenting view is expressed and that it is accurately captured in reporting.
- Reviewing the Design Review Report post meeting in consultation with the City's administration representative, ensuring that the content is in line with the review discussion and the form follows the standardised reporting template
- Briefing decision makers on MDRG advice (if required).

Meetings, Operation and Support

Eligibility for review

Referral to the MDRG will generally be in accordance with the criteria outlined in clause 3 'Referral Requirements' of LPP1.2 unless otherwise referred to the MDRG by the City's Principal Statutory Planner. Items which do not have the City as the responsible authority for assessment and reporting (i.e. MRS, Part 11B and other State Government application types) will not be referred to the MDRG for comment.

Design review sessions and reporting

The City of Melville administration will provide administrative support to manage the scheduling, preparation and coordination, of review sessions.

Reviews will be based on the 10 Design Principles from SPP 7.0 and undertaken in accordance with the model process outlined in the Local Government Design Review Manual.

Minutes will be taken by the City of Melville staff and then final minutes referred to the Chair for review and ratification. Once confirmation is received, minutes are to be forwarded to the proponent.

Minutes in respect of pre-application and technical matters will not be made publicly available. Minutes from formal internal referrals will be published via the relevant development application reporting process (Council Reports or DAP Reports).

MDRG reports will be as per Appendix 2 within this Term of Reference and be issued within 10 working days of the design review session, unless otherwise advised by the Principal Statutory Planner.

Frequency and timing of meetings

Review sessions will generally be held on a monthly as required basis (first Wednesday of every month) but can be scheduled at the any time in response to urgent matters. Advice of a scheduled review session, the agenda and information associated with each proposal shall be provided to MDRG members one week (7 days) prior to the intended review session date.

Meetings may run for up to three hours and a maximum of three project design reviews will be undertaken at each meeting.

Remuneration

The members of the MDRG will be paid sitting fees for each meeting attended.

MDRG members are to be paid per hour (ex GST) for the duration of the meeting, plus up to one hour of preparation per item as per the schedule below.

Hourly Schedule of Rates	Fee
Chairperson	\$329
Other MDRG Member	\$299

The Chairperson will receive an above-standard fee due to the additional responsibility of the role. It is expected that if there is a particular contentious design issue that the Chair will represent the MDRG at a DAP or Council meeting if required.

The MDRG members are to provide a cost breakdown per item and invoice the City within one month of the meeting date.

Should a member of the MDRG appear for the City as an expert witness at the State Administrative Tribunal, the member will be paid at a mutually agreed hourly rate consistent with the qualifications, experience and professional status of the member.

The fees paid to each member are to be market tested annually to ensure the City can attract and retain the required expertise to sit on the MDRG.

Code of Conduct

All MDRG members are required to abide by the City's Code of Conduct (Employees).

It is expected that MDRG members are fully prepared for each meeting, self-report any real or perceived conflicts of interest, act in the interests of the City, and act in a professional and respectful manner. Failure to adhere to the Code of Conduct and this Terms of Reference may result in removal from the MDRG.

Good design provides successful places that offer a variety of uses and activities while optimising internal and external amenity for occupants, visitors and neighbours, providing environments that are comfortable, productive and healthy.

7. Legibility

Good design results in buildings and places that are legible, with clear connections and easily identifiable elements to help people find their way around.

8. Safety

Good design optimises safety and security, minimising the risk of personal harm and supporting safe behavior and use.

9. Community

Good design responds to local community needs as well as the larger social context, providing buildings and spaces that support a diverse range of people and facilitate social interaction.

10. Aesthetics

Good design is the product of a skilled, judicious design process that results in attractive and inviting buildings and places that engage the senses.

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About this Manual

The **Local Government Design Review Manual (Manual)** provides practical, best-practice guidance for **Local Government Design Review Panels (LGDRPs)** in Western Australia. It aims to support consistent, high-quality design outcomes across jurisdictions, aligned with **State Planning Policy 7.0 Design of the Built Environment (SPP 7.0)**. The Manual serves as a comprehensive resource for all participants involved in local government design review, helping them navigate the process effectively.

► Application

Design review is a measure supporting the implementation of SPP 7.0.

The Manual provides best practice guidance for LGDRPs in Western Australia. It is acknowledged that Local Governments of different sizes and in different contexts may adapt processes in this Manual to suit their resourcing and expected demand for design review. Any existing local planning policies and terms of reference for the operation of LGDRPs should be updated to align with the Manual when they are next reviewed.

This Manual focuses on guidance for LGDRPs, but other panels, such as the State Design Review Panel and those run by other State government agencies, may have different processes and procedures.

To further support users, this Manual references a series of templates available [online](#). These resources offer additional tools to help ensure effective and efficient design reviews.

► Who is the Manual for?

The manual is for:

- Local governments establishing and operating LGDRPs.
- Panel members and Chairs of LGDRPs.
- Proponents and design teams whose proposals will undergo LGDRP review.
- Decision-makers and elected members considering proposals that have gone through an LGDRP process.

► How to use this Manual

The Manual has been structured to clearly outline roles and responsibilities of users and to ensure more efficient navigation.

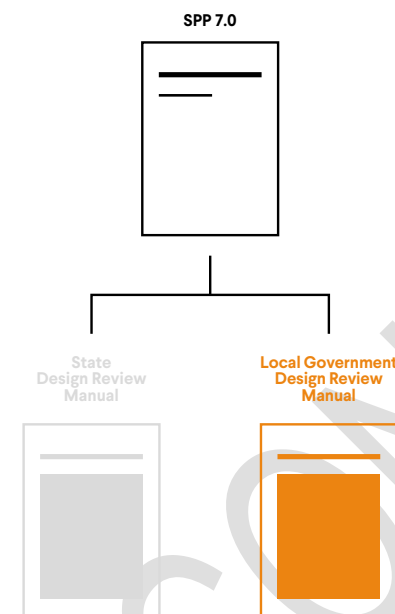


Figure 1 Local Government Design Review Manual relationship with SPP 7.0

Design Review Explained

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What is design review?

Design review is an evaluation process that raises the design quality of development proposals and built form planning instruments. Conducted by a panel of trained, multi-disciplinary specialists, design review brings additional insight and professional rigor to each proposal and promotes alignment with SPP 7.0 and related policies.

The benefits of design review are wide-reaching. For developers and design teams, it offers expert feedback and fresh perspectives, which are valuable for complex or unique proposals. For decision makers, it provides trusted, well-rounded insights that aid in assessing proposals and making balanced, informed decisions.

Design review has been demonstrated to enhance community spaces, and ensure development leaves a positive legacy for the community.

► Who benefits from design review?

Benefits for proponents

- Early confirmation of foundational design approaches before proposal variables are set.
- Improved value for money outcomes.
- Constructive, independent and multi-disciplinary design review provides a forum to test early decisions before there are impacts to cost and time.
- Support for good design and innovative design solutions.
- Improved proposal risk management.
- Promoting proposals to meet the objectives of SPP 7.0.

Benefits for local government

- Increased certainty in assessing design quality and applying discretion in recommendations and decisions where design quality is a factor.
- Access to a multi-disciplinary panel of experts where internal expertise in specific areas may not be available.

Benefits for communities

- Confidence that the design quality of a proposal's contribution to the public realm, and responsiveness to adjacent development and surrounding context has been considered.
- Assurance that an independent panel of design experts has provided advice on a proposal, against SPP 7.0.
- Improved social, economic and environmental benefits from development.

► Pillars for design review

All panels should be established and operated in line with these protocols to promote consistent outcomes across different local government areas.

Independent

It is conducted by individuals not connected with the proposal's promoters or decision makers, ensuring conflicts of interest are avoided or managed appropriately.

Expert

It is carried out by suitably qualified experts in design who can critique constructively. Review is most respected when conducted by professional peers of the proposal design team, as their expertise is understood and accepted.

Multi-disciplinary

It combines perspectives of architects, urban designers, planners, landscape architects, and other specialist design experts to provide a comprehensive evaluation tailored to the specifics of a proposal.

Accountable

The Panel and its advice must clearly benefit the public.

Transparent

The Panel's remit, membership, governance processes, and funding are in the public domain.

Proportionate

It is used on proposals whose significance warrants the investment needed to provide the service.

Timely

It takes place early in the design process, to offer the best time and cost benefits for proponents.

Advisory

The Panel does not make decisions, rather it offers impartial expert advice on design to inform assessment and recommendations to decision makers.

Objective

It appraises proposals according to reasoned and objective measures, considering the principles of SPP7.0, rather than the individual taste and subjective preferences of panel members.

Accessible

The advice arising from design review is clearly expressed in terms that design teams, decision makers and the public can understand and use.

Consistent

The advice received across subsequent design review sessions for the same project is consistent. Panel members remain the same across sessions or, when this is not possible, are well-briefed and respectful of previous advice.

Good design and the planning system

Planning aims to create places that work well for everyone in a community. Performance-based planning enables decisions to be made that are mindful of the context and uniqueness of the place and how the proposal fits within that. This requires skilled assessment by expert planners and, often, the exercise of discretion by decision makers to achieve outcomes that avoid a 'one size fits all' mindset. A good design review process can support decisions that benefit both the community and the environment.

► About good design

Good design is more than just looks. It's about making spaces that are functional, sustainable and responsive to their surroundings. A well-designed place is adaptable, cost-effective and enriching for users and the broader community. Good design adds value by improving local neighbourhoods and leaving a positive impact for future generations. Good design endeavours to reconcile multiple concurrent and often competing objectives that vary according to the circumstances of each proposal. A rigorous, considered and contextual design process should prioritise these competing objectives to develop a cohesive, site-responsive design. By carefully balancing various needs, spaces that are practical, beautiful and meaningful can be created.

► State Planning Policy 7.0 Design of the Built Environment

SPP 7.0 defines what 'good design' means in Western Australia, establishing a framework that brings quality to every aspect of our built environment. By setting clear expectations, SPP 7.0 aims to create spaces that enhance economic, environmental, social, and cultural well-being. To ensure consistent design across the State, SPP 7.0 outlines 10 interconnected core Design Principles that guide all aspects from planning to building. These principles collectively present a shared vision for high-quality design across Western Australia.

The principles form the basis for design review discussions. Individual principles may not apply equally to all proposals at every stage, due to their location or type. However, as the principles are interconnected, their individual application may positively influence other aspects of the design.

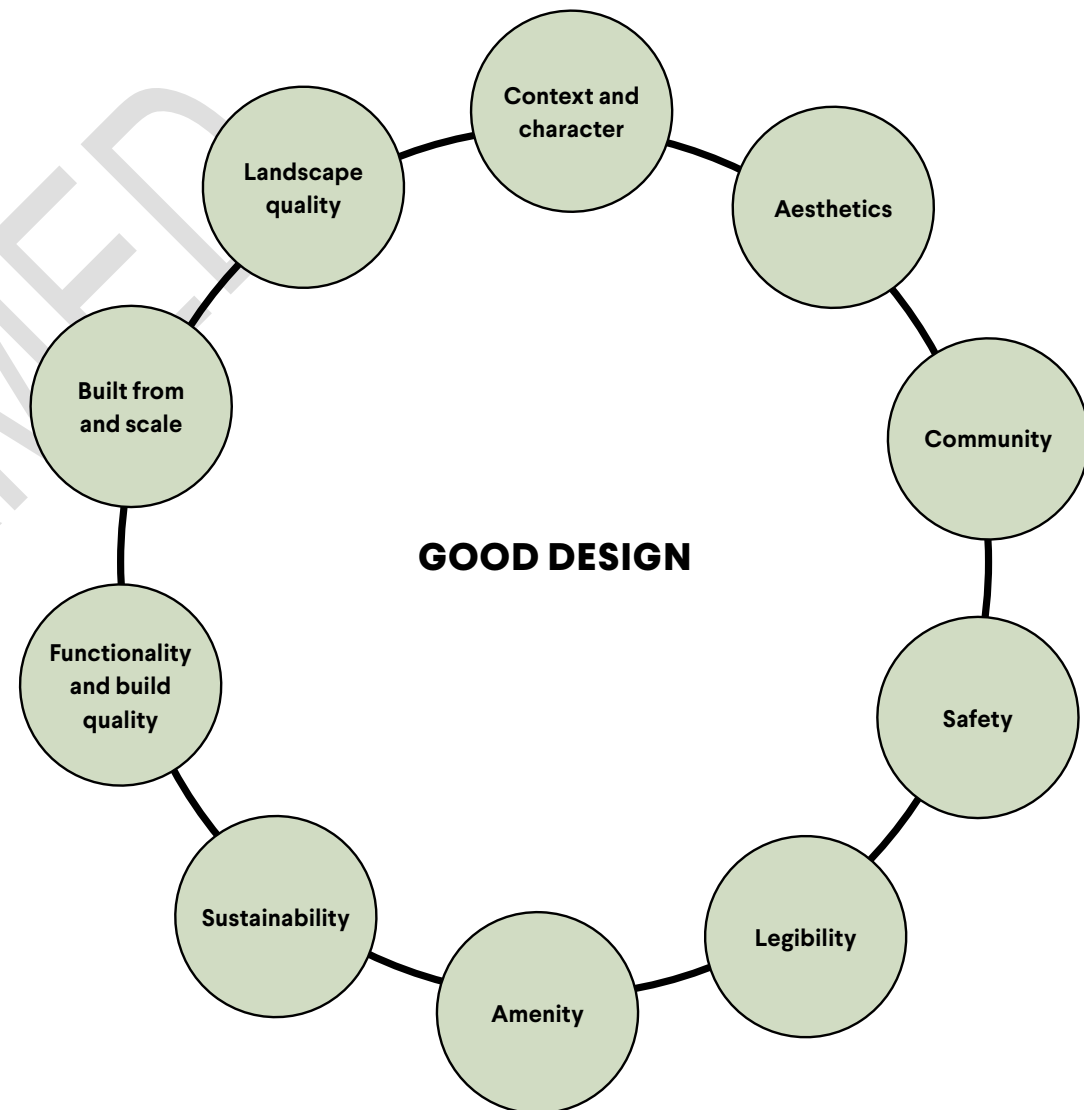


Figure 2 Interconnected design principles

Role of a Local Government Design Review Panel

The role of a LGDRP is to provide advice to decision makers in accordance with its Terms of Reference, on the design quality of a proposal against the SPP 7.0 Design Principles and supporting State Planning Policies, while considering relevant local planning schemes and policies.

Information regarding design review (including Terms of Reference, any Local Planning Policy and other information) should be published on the Local Government's website.

► Proposals eligible for LGDRP consideration

Design review eligibility should be outlined in a Local Planning Policy to ensure a consistent approach for all proposals.

Recommended criteria for design review

Unless excluded, projects that meet the following criteria should be considered for design review:

- Multiple and grouped dwelling developments comprising 15 or more units/tenancies (dwellings and/or commercial).
- Development that is 4 or more storeys in height.
- Development located within the Town Centre zone (or another specified zone or locality).
- Development of a property on the State Register of Heritage Places or a Local Government Heritage List established under the Local Planning Scheme unless the proposal excludes a works component or does not require a planning approval under the Local Planning Scheme.
- Works undertaken by the local government if required by the Chief Executive Officer/ Director Planning.

Excluded from local government design review panel consideration:

- Single house
- Two to fourteen unit grouped dwellings
- Warehouse
- Industrial development
- Public works undertaken by a public authority other than the local government
- Projects eligible for referral to the State Design Review Panel or any other design review panel.

Other projects may be referred by the Chief Executive Officer/Director Planning.

The [Design Review Eligibility Matrix](#) can assist the Chief Executive Officer/Director Planning in determining whether a specific proposal should go through the design review process, receive design advice, or if no review or advice is needed. This should be used when varying from the general eligibility criteria.

The Matrix's indicators should be interpreted according to the specific context of a local government area. It is recommended that indicative benchmarks for the indicators are set through a Local Planning Policy to ensure a consistent approach for all projects.

In some instances, for example the City Centre in the City of Perth, the above criteria will require adjustment to suit the context.

► Status of design review

Design review panels are advisory; they do not make decisions. The Panel's advice is one of several inputs considered in a thorough assessment process.

Panel advice does not represent a planning assessment nor provide a technical or compliance assessment against the Australian Standards or National Construction Codes.

In some cases, it may be appropriate for a local government to seek specialised input on a project through its usual internal referral processes when assessing a development application. If the required expertise is not available on staff and an external provider is utilised, local governments should refer to the Local Government Act 1995 and the Local Government (Functions and General) Regulations 1996 before undertaking procurement. Local governments who are members of the Western Australian Local Government Association (WALGA) can also access a procurement toolkit that includes purchasing and contract management templates and assistance at [Procurement Advisory Services | WALGA](#).

DESIGN REVIEW IS NOT:

- A planning assessment against SPP 7.0.
- Design advice provided by a single individual, or a City or Estate architect.
- A peer review (either by individuals or a group) engaged by the proponent.
- A compliance check carried out at building permit stage.

► What is the difference between a design review and design advice?

Design Review is a process of review conducted by a multi-disciplinary panel of qualified professionals established by a regulatory authority and typically addresses an entire proposal rather than specific elements.

In contrast design advice is typically provided by appropriately qualified individuals based on a need to address a focused element or concern. For example, design advice may be sought from a landscape architect relating to a specific landscape element of a proposal.

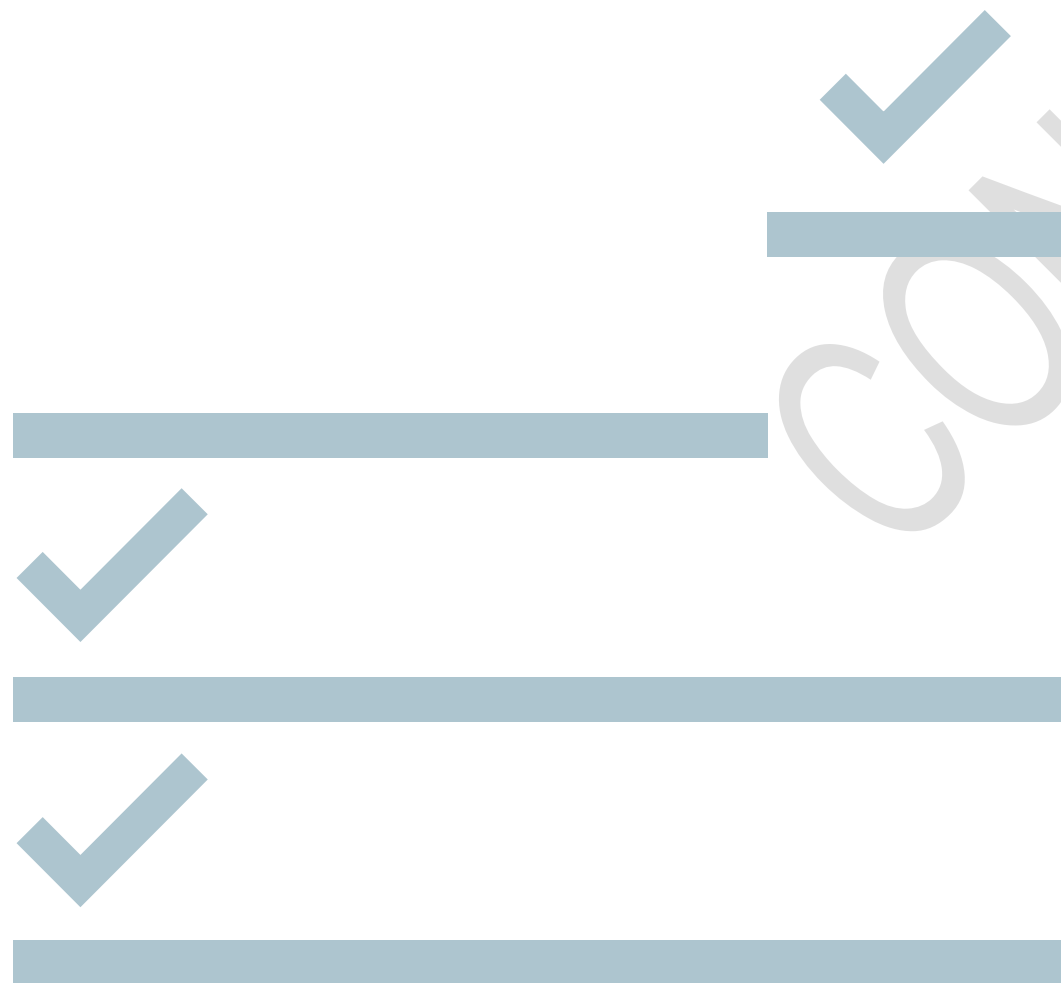
In many cases, referral to a Design Review Panel may not be necessary or practical, but design advice can still be valuable particularly where specific elements of a proposal would benefit from specialised input. Design advice may be especially helpful in the development of design guidelines, local planning policies, or standard and precinct structure plans.

Design advice can be:

- Provided by an appropriate qualified individual such as an Estate Architect, appropriately qualified local government officer (including City Architect or Landscape Architect), or an appropriately qualified professional procured by the local government.

Undertaken as part of a pre-lodgement process (if offered by the local government) or integrated into the standard referral process.

Guidance for effective design review



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The design review process

Engaging with design review

When a proposal is likely to require design review, the proponent and local government should discuss the process and timing of reviews as early as possible, to ensure design review is integrated in a helpful and timely manner.

The number of reviews required will depend on the complexity of the proposal and the quality of the initial design. However, two to three design review sessions are generally recommended. The design review process adds value early in the life of a proposal, when improvements to a proposal can be made without impacts to cost and time.

The first design review should occur during concept design stage, enabling proponents to benefit from advice while the design is still flexible enough to accommodate changes. Subsequent review scheduling will be based on the time required to respond to feedback. The final review will usually be undertaken after lodgement of the application and informs the statutory assessment and decision making processes.

While design review panel meetings and procedures are not open to the public, the final report should be written in a manner that is suitable for publication as it will provide advice and recommendations to a planning decision maker (typically the local government or a Development Assessment Panel).

Where an applicant seeks amendments to approved plans and the local government considers further advice is required, the local government may determine that this is sought as design advice rather than further referral to its Design Review Panel. In this case, the individual providing design advice should not be a member of the project specific Design Review Panel and should have access to the original plans and the final Design Review Panel advice/report.

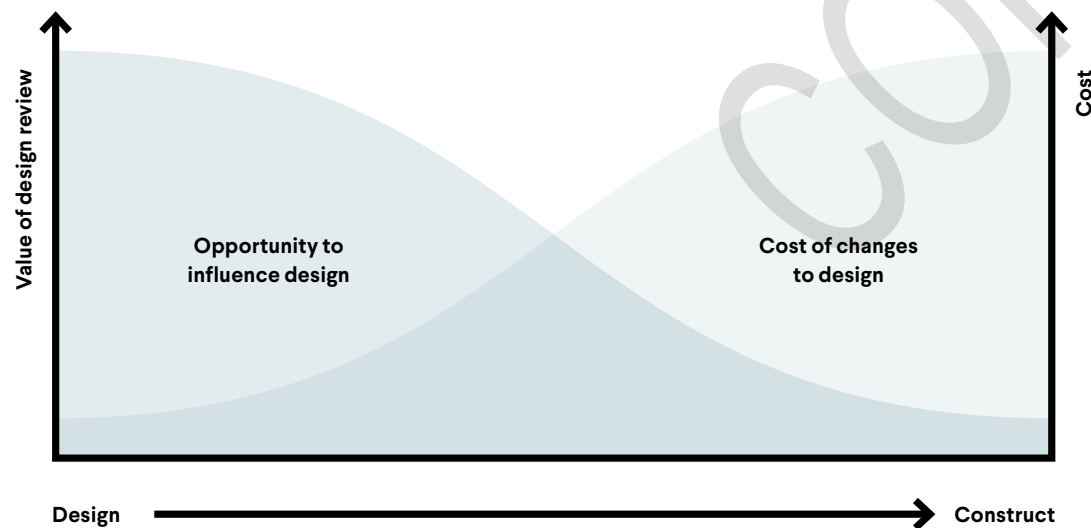


Figure 3 Design review timing

Overview of participants

Every person involved in the design review process plays an important role. Design review is most likely to be successful when roles are clearly understood, and individuals commit to the process.

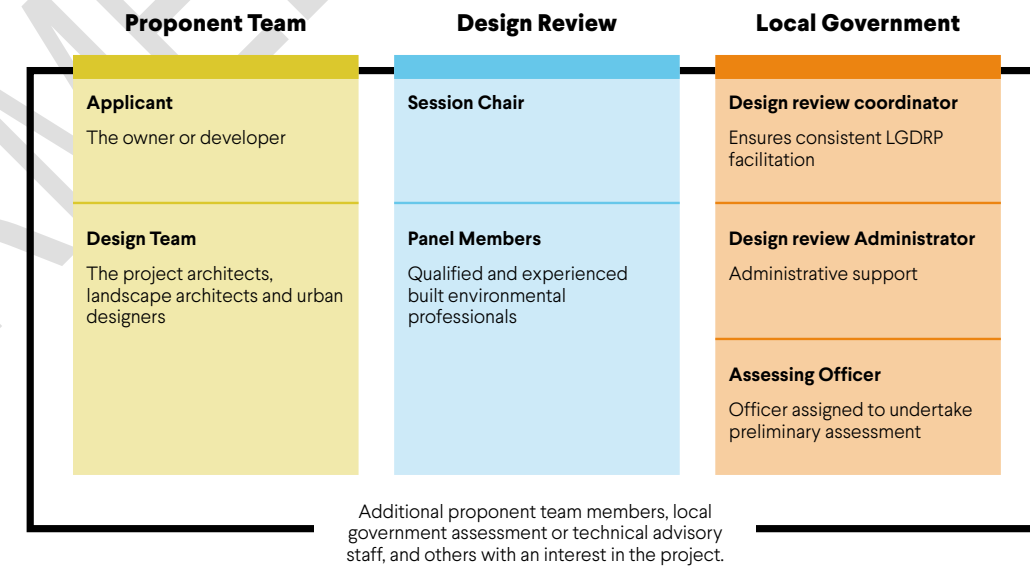


Figure 4 Design review participants

2.1 The design review process

How to get the most from design review

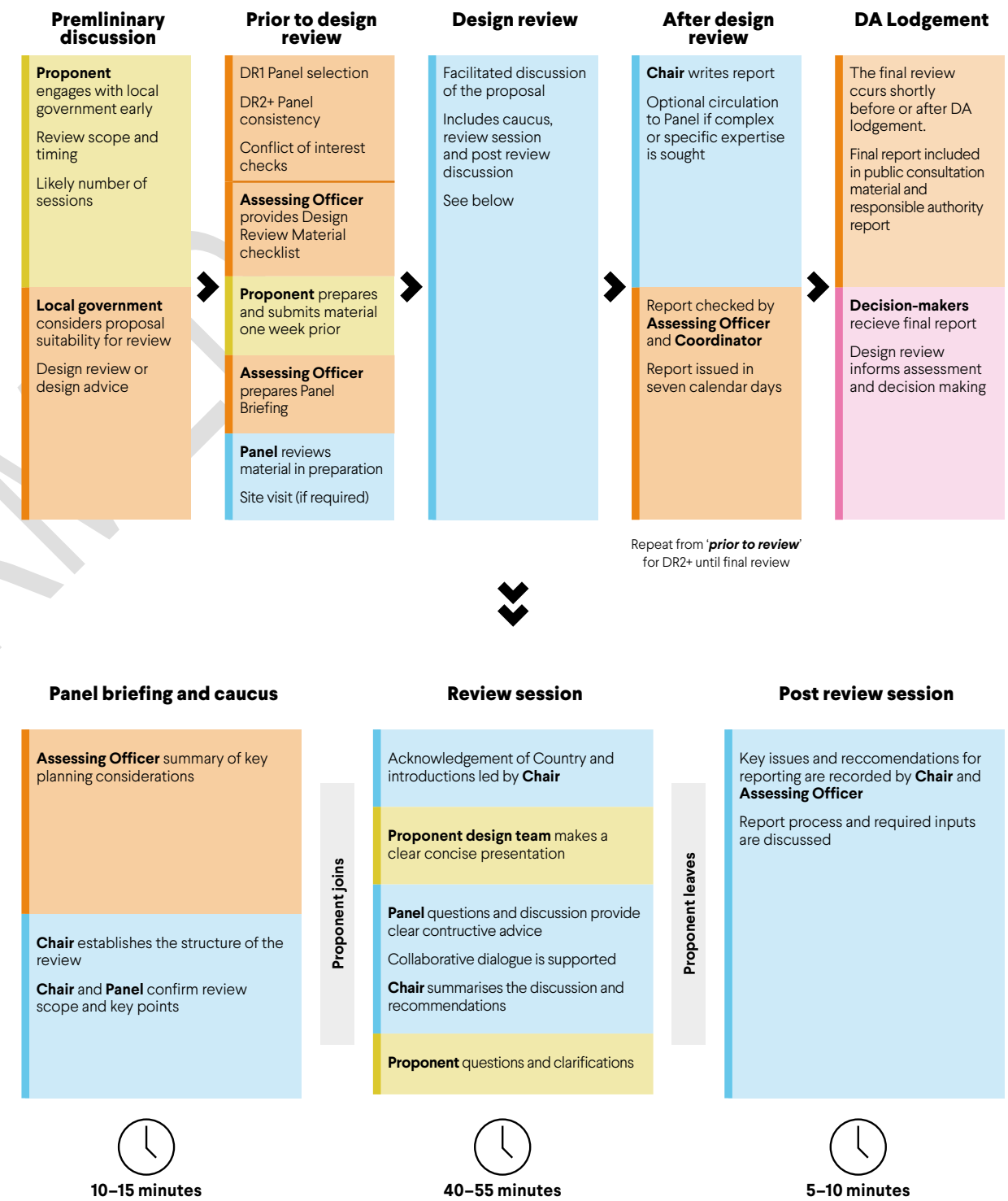


Figure 5 Quick guide to effective design review

Design review is a structured process that evaluates the design quality of proposals through a series of discrete sessions, offering valuable feedback at key proposal stages. Figure 5 illustrates a typical design review cycle, however the number of sessions may vary based on proposal complexity and requirements. This flexible, session-based approach allows each proposal to be refined and improved before reaching the development application stage.

To achieve the best results, all participants should approach the process with a collaborative mindset and openness to constructive feedback, enabling designs to be refined to better serve both community needs and proposal goals.

A DRP may review several proposals in a sitting. Each proposal review will follow a similar process.

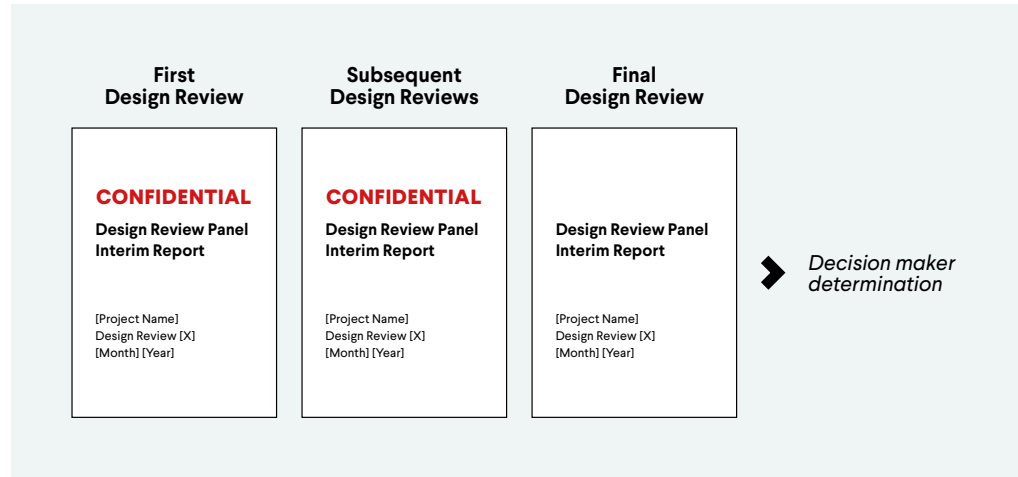


Figure 6 LGDRP reporting formats



Reports

After each design review session, a Design Review Report should be issued within 7 calendar days unless otherwise specified due to complexity of reporting or need to circulate to the Panel prior to finalisation. In such cases, the report should be issued no later than 14 calendar days after a review. Depending on the stage of the review process, this report will be either 'Interim Report' or 'Final Report.'

Interim Report

Reports for any reviews before the final review should be referred to as 'Interim Reports' as they do not represent the final position of the Panel. For this reason, interim reports should be treated as confidential so as not to misrepresent the Panel's position or cause unnecessary confusion.

These reports are shared with the proponent to help refine the design as it evolves, focusing on key areas of support and areas to meet good design standards under SPP 7.0. It is intended to guide the proponent and should inform their responses in subsequent reviews.

Maintaining confidentiality of design review information and material encourages open dialogue and the exploration of ideas between participants.

Interim Reports should not be included in any publicly available documents, such as development applications, consultation packages, public meeting agendas or media, unless otherwise agreed prior to release.

Final Report

The Final Report is the output of the last design review and aims to inform decision makers of the design quality of a proposal. Along with other technical advice, it is one of the factors considered in the assessment of an application. Where relevant, the Final Report may reflect on the entire design review process where it is considered helpful for the decision maker. Final Reports may be referenced in the final documentation presented to the decision maker and in any briefings to elected members or other decision makers as well as public advertising and development applications. As with all professional and technical advice, it is generally better to provide a full copy of the Final Report as an attachment to an assessment report (or other public document) with an appropriate summary and reference within the report.

When an Interim Report becomes the Final Report.

Sometimes it is hard to determine whether a review will be the final one. A review process may finish early for several reasons, making the last Interim Report the final record of the design review process.

In this scenario it is suggested that the Final Report be accompanied by a letter from the Chair stating that the interim report is considered the final report. This letter can provide context about previous review and offer clarity to the decision maker.

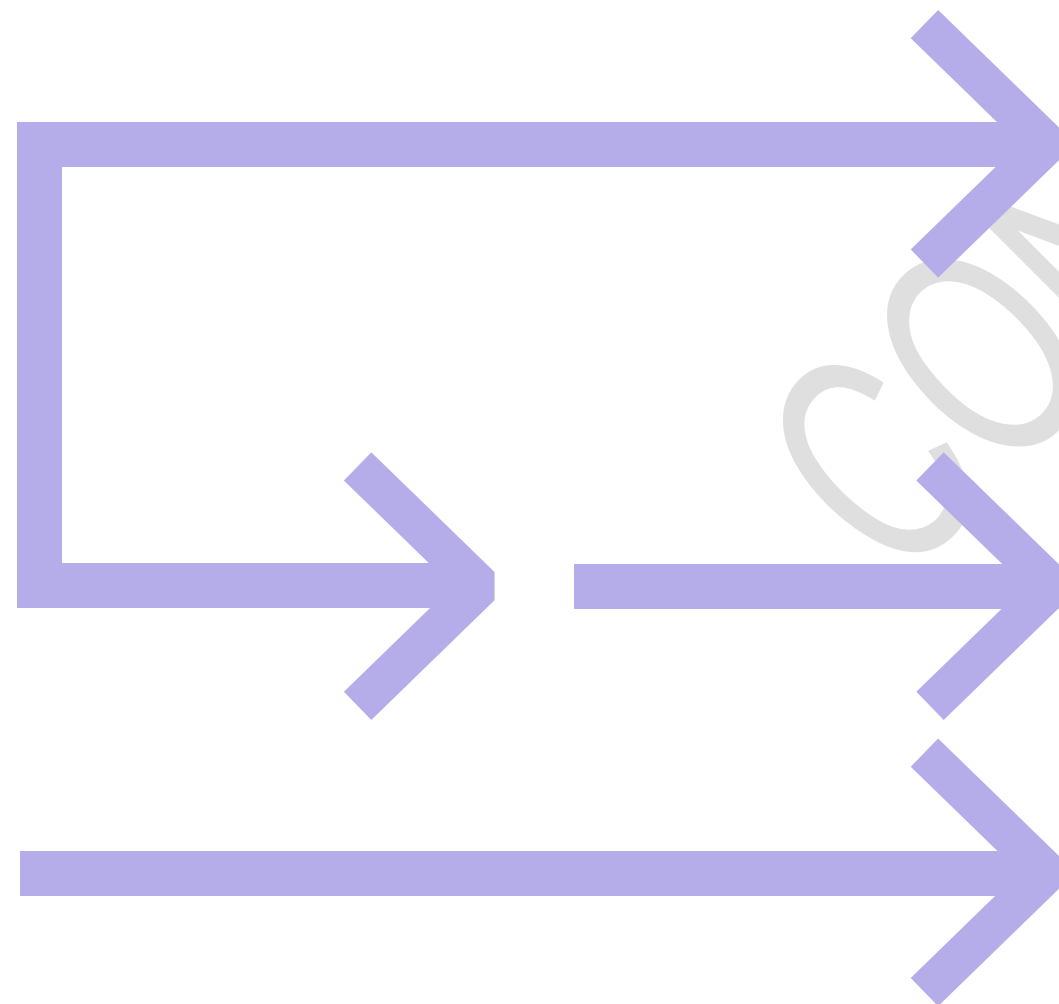
When a Final Report becomes an Interim Report

In other situations, a review process may have concluded with a Final Report issued, but subsequent changes to the proposal may require an additional review session. If this occurs before a planning decision is made, the Panel may either confirm that it has no further advice to provide or may issue an Addendum to the Final Report covering the amendments made to the proposal after the Final Report was produced. Where an Addendum is produced, the local government should update the cover page of the Final Report to notate the issue of an Addendum and the date issued.

When an Interim Report is required for public consultation

In some cases, it may be necessary or appropriate to include an Interim Report as part of consultation material. If the local government requires this, the proponent should be informed before the consultation process commences and, preferably, agree. In this circumstance, the Interim Report should include be labelled 'Interim Report for consultation purposes only' and be accompanied by a statement that the review process is not finalised.

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Establishing and appointing a panel

Design review panels should be established when there is a recurring need for independent advice on the design quality of proposals. The type of panel, frequency of meetings and number of members may differ in accordance with the identified needs of the administration.

► Governance

The local government is responsible for the funding, establishment, operation and management of its DRP.

As outlined under *Pillars for Design Review* in Part 1, it is important that the LGDRP is impartial and apolitical. The Panel should be established as an independent body with an appropriate Terms of Reference and/or Local Planning Policy, and in accordance with the governance requirements of the *Local Government Act 1995*.

Once the decision to form a LGDRP is made, the type of panel should also be determined. Sufficient staffing and funding should be committed in line with the type of panel and volume of reviews expected.

A Panel may be selected from an established and pre-vetted common pool (if available) that can offer access to a wide range of design professionals reducing costs in establishing an individual panel pool for each local government.

Local government staff resourcing is critical to successful DRP operation. Gaps in staffing should be identified and addressed as part of the establishment of a LGDRP.

Funding

Adequate funding is required for the appointment (or re-appointment) of the panel pool and operational costs, including member remuneration and staff resourcing. Decisions made regarding the frequency of meetings and the number of panel pool members will impact the costs associated with the LGDRP. Requirements for the panel pool size and meeting frequency will differ between local governments, however, should generally align with the identified panel types below.

► Types of Panels and Sessions

Panel types are dependent on the level of development activity and local government classifications. When assessing the requirement for a panel, consider the table below for the best suited panel type.

3.1 Establishing and appointing a panel

➤ **Appointing an LGDRP**

When establishing the Design Review Panel pool or recruiting new Panel pool members, it is important to follow an objective and transparent appointment process.

Local governments should not appoint decision makers (including its own elected members) or employees to a Panel pool. Members of the public without relevant design or built environment qualifications and experience should not be appointed.

➤ **Panel Pool expertise and structure**

The panel pool size and composition should be determined by considering the likely number of reviews, requirements for subject expertise and possible conflicts of interest. Panel pool members can be selected from a Design Review Common pool established by the State (where available).

Having a larger pool expands the range and calibre of expertise available for a variety of project types, increases panellist availability as well as reduces the potential for conflicts of interest.

The panel pool should consist of sufficient members to accommodate the type of panel and class of local government. One Chair and one to two deputy Chairs should be nominated. This will help ensure availability and consistency in review processes and advice. Specific selection criteria relating to chairing should be included when appointing a Panel.

It is recommended that alongside diversity in member expertise and project experience, the Panel composition considers diversity in gender, age, and background. Caution should be exercised in appointing Panel pool members who are residents or landowners in the local government area due to a higher potential for conflicts of interest.

Panel pools are to include experts in the following disciplines related to design and built environment.

Essential:

- Architecture
- Landscape architecture
- Urban design

One or more of the following specialists:

- Heritage Architecture
- Aboriginal cultural heritage
- Sustainability (including environmental design, systems ecology, urban water expertise)
- Accessibility and universal design
- Transport planning
- Planning
- Public art
- Civil, structural and services engineering.

This may also be met when a member is qualified in more than one discipline

Expressions of Interest (EOI) for panel membership should be sought from suitably capable professionals to determine a short-list of applicants. Clear selection criteria should form the basis of the EOI. Alternatively, and where available, a Panel may be selected from a pre-qualified common pool.

A LGDRP should clearly outline:

- Remuneration rates and standards for Panel members and Chairs
- Estimated time commitments for Panel members and Chairs
- Terms of Reference and/or Local Planning Policy (if available)
- Meeting calendar (if known or set)

3.1 Establishing and appointing a panel

Selection criteria

Undertaking a rigorous and transparent process in the establishment of a panel pool is critical to the process. This can be achieved through clear selection criteria. In addition to the inclusion of a brief professional profile, the following recommended selection criteria should be included:

Panel members

- Appropriate professional qualifications and expertise in the built environment including relevant specific project work.
- Where relevant, evidence or demonstrated eligibility for registration with an appropriate professional body or organisation.
- Ability to work constructively and collaboratively in a multi-disciplinary team.
- Understanding of the State's Planning Framework, relevant local government policies and development controls.
- Ability to analyse, evaluate and offer objective and constructive feedback on design quality issues of complex development applications and strategic planning matters. (This may be evidenced through board, practice or panel experience, or other means of peer review, including publications and relevant educational experience).
- Knowledge and understanding of probity requirements including conflicts of interest and confidentiality.
- High-level written and verbal communication skills and the ability to communicate clearly with design, development and planning professionals.
- Understanding of the local context and key issues that face local governments.

Additional criteria for Chairs

- Ability to lead and facilitate meetings, including time management and strong verbal communication skills.
- Ability to manage strong or conflicting views in meetings.
- Highly developed written communication skills.

Assessing applications

Having an appropriate selection panel will assist in assessing applications and making recommendations for appointment to the LGDRP. The selection panel should include appropriate local government officer representation and at least one member with expertise in design review. If required, a member with design review experience may be sought externally to the local government.

A template [Expression of Interest Assessment Matrix](#) has been developed to assist in the assessment of applications.

Interviews

In some instances, interviewing candidates may be desirable, particularly when considering the appointment of a Chair or Deputy Chair.

It is recommended to follow the same interview process for each shortlisted applicant to maintain fairness and rigor. This includes:

- Set questions
- Interview length
- Interview panel (usually the full selection panel)

Finalising the selection process

Once the panel pool members are selected, their expertise and experience should be recorded in the [Session Panel Curation Matrix](#) for ease of session panel curation.

Following the completion of the selection process and any associated legislative requirements, all details of the appointment, including remuneration and time commitment, should be confirmed in writing and member induction scheduled.

Member induction

An induction process should be undertaken when new panels are established, or when new members are appointed.

Induction topics should include:

- Introduction of panel members, local government officers, and their roles and responsibilities.
- Training requirements, including opportunities for new members to observe a design review session.
- Introduction to the SPP 7.0 Design Principles for guiding the design review process.
- Overview of the *Design Review Pillars*.
- Explanation of administrative procedures including agenda circulation, minutes and reports, how to make requests for additional information and attendance at site visits.
- Access to relevant policies and documents, including the Terms of Reference.
- Governance requirements such as confidentiality, conflicts of interest and media protocols.

- Overview of significant current or upcoming proposals, redevelopment areas, and anticipated activity zones, with a focus on strategic intent and design quality.
- Review session schedule.
- Payment arrangements.

Panel remuneration

Panel members should be paid appropriately for their time. This includes preparation, the review session and contributions to reports. An hourly rate is recommended, providing flexibility for meeting duration dependent on the number of items or the complexity of proposals that may require more time in preparation and/or reporting.

The Chair rate should recognise the additional responsibility of the role. Additional time spent by the Chair editing and preparing reports should be paid accordingly at the hourly rate.

Sufficient preparation time should be allowed and allocated per review item, not per meeting. If site visits are required by the local government, they should be remunerated.

Remuneration rates should be outlined in the panel's terms of reference.

Design Review Panel pools should not include:

- Community members without design qualifications or experience.
- Elected members or local government officers employed by the municipality.

Terms used

Chair: The design review panel member appointed as Chair. They will usually be the Session Chair for a project review unless they are unavailable or have a conflict of interest.

Deputy Chair: one to two design review panel members appointed as Deputy Chairs. They can be the Session Chair for a project review depending on availability, conflicts and expertise.

Session Chair: A Chair or Deputy Chair who will chair a design review session for a specific project. The Session Chair should remain the same for all reviews of a project unless completely unavoidable.

Minutes: Administrative minutes capture details of the design review session including attendance, apologies, meeting time and duration.

Design Review Report: A record of the Panel's critique and advice against the SPP 7.0 Ten Design Principles. It is not a verbatim record of the design review session.

Design Review Panel Pool: A discrete selection of panel members identified to provide design review services to a local government or joint local government Design Review Panel.

Design Review Common Pool: A multi-disciplinary pool of pre-qualified professionals to resource Design Review Panels.

Design Review: A process of review conducted by a multi-disciplinary panel of qualified professionals established by a regulatory authority and typically addresses an entire proposal rather than specific elements

Design Advice: Professional advice provided by an appropriately qualified individual typically relating to a specific design element of a proposal.

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1.0 Introduction

Lateral Planning acts on behalf of Alchera Living (Inc), the landowner of Lot 50 (No. 40-44) Worley Street, Willagee (**Lot 50**).

This Report has been prepared in support of a request to initiate an amendment to the City of Melville Local Planning Scheme No. 6 (**LPS6**) pursuant to s 75 of the *Planning and Development Act 2005*.

The amendment seeks to rezone a portion of Lot 12759 (No. 33) Winnacott Street, Willagee (**Lot 12759**) from 'Public Open Space' to 'Residential' with a density coding of 'R60', consistent with the current zoning of Lot 50. Alchera Living (Inc) is the contracted purchaser of the portion of Lot 12759 which is proposed to be rezoned.

This report includes a description of the following matters:

- Location of the Scheme Amendment Area;
- Description of the existing land uses;
- Overview of the relevant planning matters; and
- Explanation of the proposed amendment.

1.1 Background and Context

Between late 2017 and late 2019, Alchera Living (Inc) progressed with a development at the northwestern corner of Lot 50. As part of this development, the landowner negotiated the registration of an easement over the southern portion of Lot 12759, adjoining Lot 50, for the purpose of providing vehicle access to an existing car park during construction.

After completion of the construction, Alchera Living (Inc) negotiated the purchase of the easement area from the State of WA. A Contract of Sale was entered into by the landowner of Lot 50 and the State under Section 87 of the *Land Administration Act 1997* which was subject to two conditions:

1. That the portion of Lot 12759 affected by the easement is subdivided away from Winnacott Reserve and amalgamated with Lot 50. This process is currently underway by the Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage.
2. That the purchaser makes an application to rezone the portion of Lot 12759 affected by the easement (referred to as the **Scheme Amendment Area**) from 'Public Open Space' Reserve to 'Residential' Zone with a density coding of 'R60' to be consistent with the current zoning of Lot 50.

The purpose of this Scheme Amendment Request is to fulfill the purchaser's obligation under the contract.

2.0 Description of Site

2.1 Location

The Scheme Amendment Area is located within the municipality of the City of Melville, in the suburb of Willagee, approximately 11.9km south of the Perth Central Area. The Scheme Amendment Area has a frontage of 6.1m to Worley Street.

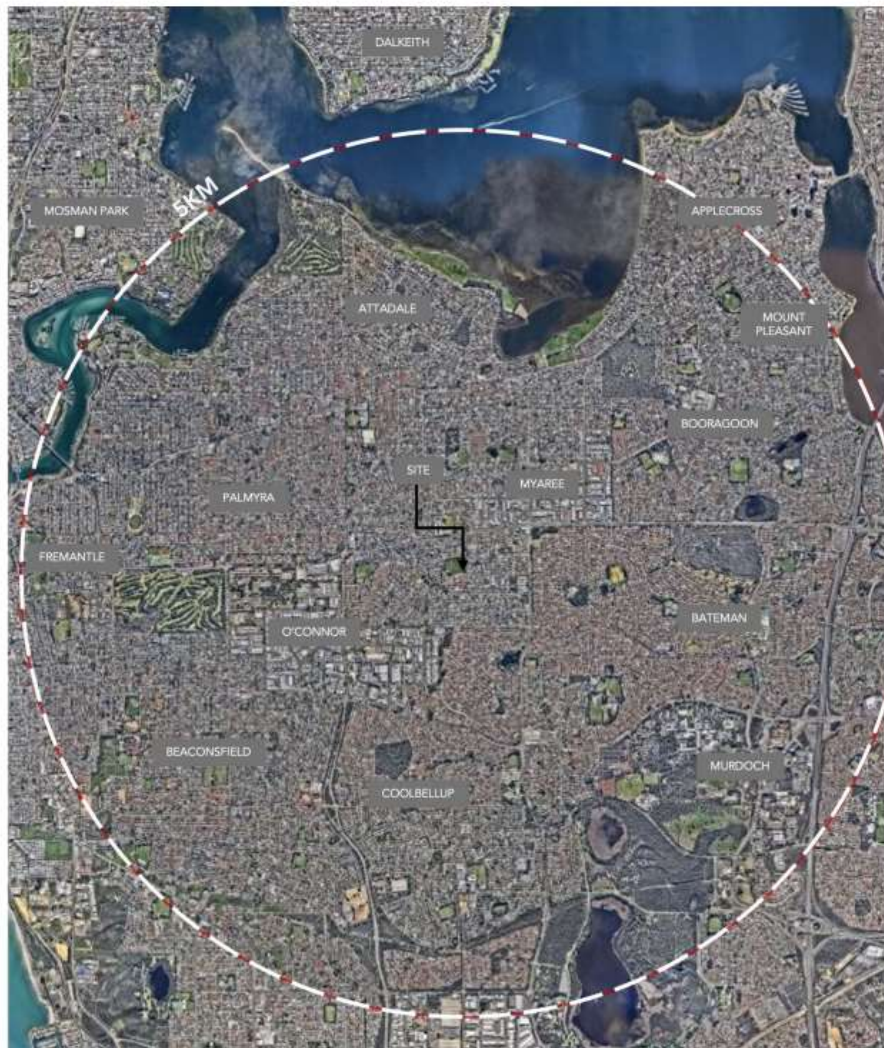


Figure 1: Regional Location

2.2 Cadastral Information

It comprises part of one allotment, with a total land area of 487m².

2.3 Existing Improvements

Lot 12759 is occupied by Winnacott Reserve. Lot 50 is occupied by an existing retirement village operated by Alchera Living (Inc).

The Scheme Amendment Area is occupied by an existing vehicle accessway. The accessway provides vehicular access to the existing retirement village on Lot 50 from Worley Street.

2.4 Environmental and Heritage Considerations

Given the type of amendment, formal environmental reporting has not been undertaken. A desktop review of the Scheme Amendment Area's environmental characteristics is summarized below, which confirms there are no environmental considerations impacting on the proposed amendment.

2.4.1 Bushfire Prone Areas

A review of the Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) bushfire prone area mapping has identified that no portion of the site is classified as being bushfire prone.

2.4.2 Contaminated Sites

A review of the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation (DWER) Contaminated Sites Register indicates that the Scheme Amendment Area does not contain a registered contaminated site. There are also no known contaminated sites within proximity of the site.

2.4.3 Geomorphic Wetlands

A review of the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA) mapping database indicates that the Scheme Amendment Area does not contain any geomorphic wetlands.

2.4.4 Heritage

2.4.4.1 Aboriginal Heritage

A search of the Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage (DPLH) Aboriginal Heritage Inquiry System indicates that there are no known areas of Aboriginal Cultural Heritage significance in proximity to the Scheme Amendment Area.

2.4.4.2 State and Local heritage

A search of the inHerit database has identified that the Scheme Amendment Area does not contain any sites of state or local heritage significance.

3.0 Town Planning Considerations

3.1 Planning and Development Act 2005

The proposed Amendment to LPS6 is prepared under Section 75(b) of the *Planning and Development Act 2005* and in accordance with the relevant provisions of the *Planning and Development (Local Planning Schemes) Regulations 2015 (Planning Regulations)*.

3.2 State Planning Framework

3.2.1 State Planning Policies

3.2.1.1 State Planning Policy No. 5.4 – Road and Rail Noise

The northern portion of Lot 12759 is located within the trigger distance of Leach Highway, which is an identified 'Strategic Freight / Major Traffic Route' under State Planning Policy No. 5.4 – Road and Rail Noise (**SPP5.4**). The Scheme Amendment Area (and Lot 50) is not located within the trigger distance. As SPP5.4 does not affect the Scheme Amendment Area, no further investigations or assessments are required to support this proposal.

3.3 Regional and Sub-Regional Planning Framework

3.3.1 Perth and Peel @ 3.5 Million

The Perth and Peel @ 3.5million framework (**Regional Framework**) outlines the strategic vision of a population of 3.5 million people, with an emphasis on sustainable urban growth, efficient infrastructure planning, and environmental stewardship across four (4) sub-regions in the Perth and Peel regions.

Under the Regional Framework, the Scheme Amendment Area is located in the Central sub-region.

3.3.2 Central Sub-Regional Planning Framework

The Central Sub-Regional Planning Framework (the **Sub-Regional Framework**) focuses on guiding infill growth and infrastructure planning.

Under the Sub-Regional Framework, the Site is located within the 'Urban Zone – Developed'. The purpose of this Scheme Amendment is to formalise the transaction of land between the owner of Lot 50 and the State. This will formalise an existing access point to the existing development at Lot 50.

3.3.3 Metropolitan Region Scheme

The Scheme Amendment Area is zoned 'Urban' pursuant to the Metropolitan Region Scheme (**MRS**).

The purposes and function of the 'Urban' zone is to provide for areas in which a range of activities are undertaken, including residential, commercial, recreational and light industry. The proposed Scheme Amendment is consistent with the 'Urban' zoning.

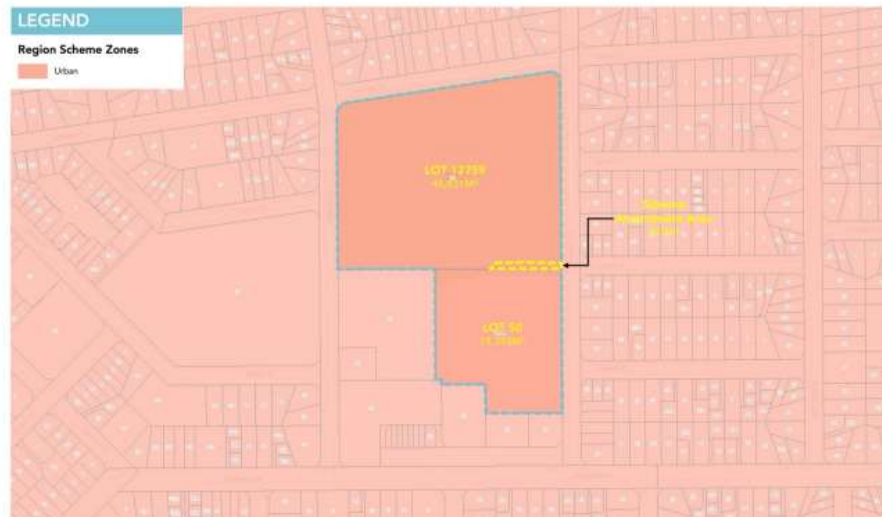


Figure 4: Metropolitan Region Scheme Zoning

3.4 Local Planning Framework

3.4.1 City of Melville Local Planning Strategy

The City's Local Planning Strategy (**Strategy**) was endorsed by the Western Australian Planning Commission (**WAPC**) in February 2016 and formed the basis of the LPS6, gazetted in May 2016. The Strategy defines a framework of land uses and activities and provides a broad statement of intent to guide integrated and sustainable planning in the City of Melville.

The Strategy identifies the Scheme Amendment Area for 'low to medium density residential development' adjacent to the Willagee Neighbourhood Centre. Specifically concerning residential growth in the City of Melville, the Strategy explores ways to reduce the dominance of low density residential and increase the portion of medium and high densities. This is to be achieved by encouraging the intensification of activity centres and making use of the potential public transport nodes and corridors.

Lot 50 has a residential density of 'R60'. The Scheme Amendment Area is proposed to have the same density coding at Lot 50. The proposed Scheme Amendment is consistent with the Strategy by promoting medium to high-density residential development, particularly near an activity centre (Willagee Neighbourhood Centre). The amendment supports housing diversity,

local business viability, and sustainable urban growth by leveraging off the existing infrastructure in the locality, all of which is consistent with the Strategy's objectives.

3.4.2 City of Melville Local Planning Scheme No. 6

Under the provisions of the City of Melville Local Planning Scheme No. 6 (LPS6), the Scheme Amendment Area is currently reserved 'Public Open Space'.

The LPS6 reservations and zones which are applied to the Scheme Amendment Area are shown below.

The Scheme Amendment proposes to rezone the Scheme Amendment Area to 'Residential' Zone with a density of 'R60' consistent with the current zoning of Lot 50. As noted previously, the Scheme Amendment Area is being amalgamated with Lot 50 as part of a Section 87 Contract of Sale between the owner of Lot 50 and the State Government. The purpose of the Scheme Amendment is to formalise the existing access from Worley Street to the existing development on Lot 50.

3.4.3 Local Planning Scheme No. 6 – Report of Review

The Local Planning Scheme No. 6 – Report of Review (December 2021), prepared by the City of Melville assesses the relevance of the City's Local Planning Strategy and Local Planning Scheme No. 6, setting out the broad intentions for updates to assist in meeting the City's infill target for 18,000 new dwellings by 2050. Instead of repealing and replacing the current LPS6 with a new local planning scheme, the City has decided, in agreement with the WAPC, to update it.

The City has prepared a residential infill model around consolidating residential density around activity centres and along transport corridors. The City's residential infill model does not propose any changes to the density of Lot 50, any change of zoning of Lot 12759 or the Scheme Amendment Area.

The proposed Scheme Amendment does not affect the City's goal to achieve greater density in these areas. The purpose of this Amendment is to formalise the existing access from Worley Street to the existing development on Lot 50 and this request is required in order to meet the Lot 50 landowner's obligation under the Section 87 Contract of Sale.

4.0 Proposed Scheme Amendment

4.1 Proposed Rezoning

Pursuant to Section 75 of the *Planning and Development Act 2005*, the proposed Scheme Amendment seeks to amend LPS6 by requesting the City of Melville:

1. Resolve, pursuant to Section 75 of the *Planning and Development Act 2005*, to adopt an amendment to the above Local Planning Scheme by:
 - a. Rezone portion of Lot 12759 (No. 33) Worley Street, Willagee from 'Public Open Space' to 'Residential' with a density coding of 'R60'.
 - b. Amend the Scheme Maps accordingly.

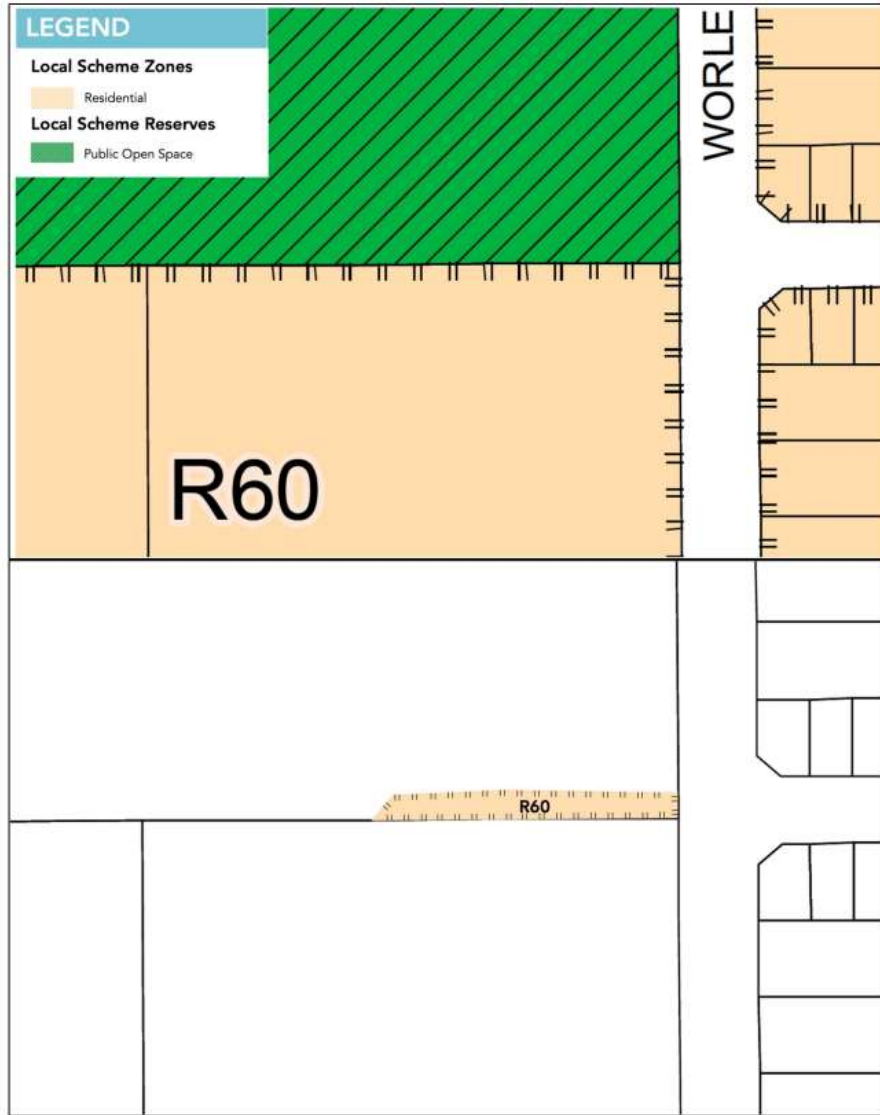


Figure 6: Existing and Proposed Zoning



4.2 Rationale for Proposed Scheme Amendment

While lodgement of the Scheme Amendment is a precedent condition of a Contract of Sale under s 87 of the *Land Administration Act 1997*, the Scheme Amendment has minimal implications for the relevant planning framework.

The following points set out the key planning rationale in support of the amendment:

- The proposed amendment will formalise an existing access point to the existing development at Lot 50.
- The Scheme Amendment Area is zoned 'Urban' under the MRS and will have minimal effect on the scheme or landowners in the scheme area.
- The Strategy identifies the Scheme Amendment Area for 'low to medium density residential development' adjacent to the Willagee Neighbourhood Centre. Specifically concerning residential growth in the City of Melville, the Strategy explores ways to reduce the dominance of low density residential and increase the portion of medium and high densities. This is to be achieved by encouraging the intensification of activity centres and making use of the potential public transport nodes and corridors. Lot 50 has a residential density of 'R60'. The Scheme Amendment Area is proposed to have the same density coding at Lot 50. The proposed Scheme Amendment is consistent with the Strategy by promoting medium to high-density residential development, particularly near an activity centre (Willagee Neighbourhood Centre). The amendment supports housing diversity, local business viability, and sustainable urban growth by providing continued access from Worley Street.
- The Scheme Amendment proposes to rezone the Scheme Amendment Area to 'Residential' Zone with a density of 'R60' consistent with the current zoning of Lot 50. As noted previously, the Scheme Amendment Area is being amalgamated with Lot 50 as part of a Section 87 Contract of Sale between the owner of Lot 50 and the State Government. The proposal rezoning is a conditional requirement of that Contract.
- The proposed Scheme Amendment does not affect the City's goal to achieve greater density around activity centres. Therefore, the proposal does not impact on the City's current review of LPS6.

4.3 Amendment Classification

For amendments to a local planning scheme, the Planning Regulations require the resolution of the local government to specify whether, in the opinion of the local government, the amendment is a complex amendment, a standard amendment or a basic amendment and include an explanation for forming that opinion.

To assist the City, the Applicant is of the view that pursuant to Regulation 35(2) of the Planning Regulations, the proposed Scheme Amendment is considered to be classified as a basic amendment for the following reasons:

- The purpose of the proposed Scheme amendment is to fulfill an obligation of a Contract of Sale under Section 87 of the *Land Administration Act 1997*.
- The proposed Scheme Amendment is consistent with the MRS and will have minimal effect on the scheme or landowners in the scheme area.

5.0 Conclusion

This Report has been prepared to support a request to amend the City of Melville Local Planning Scheme No. 6 (**LPS6**) by rezoning portion of Lot 12759 (No. 33) Worley Street, Willagee (**the Scheme Amendment Area**) from 'Public Open Space' Reserve to 'Residential' Zone with a density coding of 'R60'. The proposed zoning of the Scheme Amendment Area is consistent with the adjoining Lot 50 (No. 40-44) Worley Street, Willagee (**Lot 50**).

This Report has demonstrated that the proposed Scheme Amendment is consistent with the relevant planning framework, as follows:

- It supports the strategic objectives of the Perth and Peel @ 3.5 Million and the City of Melville Local Planning Strategy by encouraging urban consolidation and higher density living options by ensuring continued access to the development on Lot 50 from Worley Street.
- The proposal aligns with the current density coding of Lot 50.
- The proposed amendment will formalise an existing access point to the existing development at Lot 50.
- The Scheme Amendment Area is being amalgamated with Lot 50 as part of a Section 87 Contract of Sale between the owner of Lot 50 and the State Government. The proposal rezoning is a conditional requirement of that Contract.

Environmental and heritage consideration, including bushfire risk, contaminated sites, and Aboriginal and local heritage, have been reviewed with no significant issues identified, confirming the Scheme Amendment Area's suitability to be rezoned and land transacted.

In summary, the proposed Scheme Amendment represents a well-considered proposal that will enable the retention of an existing access point to development at Lot 50 with minimal impacts to landowners in the Scheme area. We therefore respectfully request the City's endorsement to progress the Scheme Amendment.
