
PUBLIC OPEN SPACE DEVELOPMENT

The first two stages of the revitalisation project were completed in 2016, comprising 1.2 hectares of bush and parkland, known

today as the award-winning Carawatha Park.

The intergenerational park has played a key role in the transformation of the suburb, revitalising the former Carawatha Primary School site, a place the community feel very connected to, and providing a place for them to come together, be active, socialise and play.





RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT

The final stage of this project will deliver Willagee a 2.6 hectare high-quality residential development that connects to the bush and parkland, and complements the local character and natural surrounds of the area which the local community said they wanted to retain.

The housing development will provide a variety of new housing choices for the Willagee community and will be delivered by Satterley.
